

HUNDREDS ENJOY SCHUMACHER EVENT

Noted Croatian Leader to be Here Again This Week

Dr. Krnjevic, Secretary of the Croatian Peasant Party to be Guest This Week for a Few Days of Fellow-Countrymen in Schumacher. Banquet at Pearl Lake Hotel.

Dr. J. K. Krnjevic, general secretary of the Croatian Peasant Party, and a gifted member of the Croatian National Parliament, is again to be a visitor to the Porcupine District, as the guest of friends in Schumacher and Timmins. On his previous visit here, Dr. Krnjevic, who was then the Croatian representative to the League of Nations Assembly, impressed all with his sincerity as well as his undoubted talent. He was delighted with his visit to Canada on that occasion, and the pleasure was mutual as he made many friends not only among his fellow countrymen but also with other Canadians whom he met. While in Schumacher, Dr. Krnjevic will address the Croatian people on more than one occasion this week and it is also expected that he will be the guest of honour at a banquet similar to the one given him on his previous visit. Dr. Krnjevic speaks several languages very fluently. In addition to his native tongue he is a talented speaker in English, French and German. Although he was 35 years old before he attempted to learn English, he speaks this language in very able and eloquent way.

Makes Sanitary Inspection

A. E. Berry, of Ontario Department of Health on Tour of Porcupine Camp.

A. E. Berry, director of the Sanitary Engineering Division of the Department of Health, Toronto, has been on an inspection trip in the Porcupine yesterday and to-day.

Yesterday Mr. Berry visited South Porcupine where he discussed with Township officials various problems concerning sewers and sewage disposal.

In Timmins he made a tour of inspection of the waterworks pumphouse, sewage disposal plant, incinerator, municipal dumping ground and the new sanitary sewers that are under construction.

Work Progressing on New Water Main

One Third of New Auxiliary Line from the Pump House to Commercial Ave. Finished.

The new twenty-inch auxiliary water main which will run from the pumphouse to the corner of Commercial avenue and Davidson street is now about one-third completed.

From the pumphouse to the east bank of the creek the new main will be laid in the exact location of the former ten-inch main which is being dug up and pipes salvaged. The trustee used to carry the pipe over the creek is to be strengthened to accommodate the extra weight.

In order to minimize the danger of damage in time of Spring floods, the main will be laid in a new course. Commencing at the bridge the pipes will run in an angle toward Bannerman avenue, along Bannerman to Davidson and thence along Davidson to Commercial. It is expected that the work will not be completed for at least three weeks.

Special Plan to Clean up High-grading in North

Kirkland Lake, Aug. 18.—(Special to The Advance)—Although not confirmed officially, a report from what is believed to be a reliable source and reaching here from Toronto intimates that the provincial authorities are to make a special effort to tackle the problem of "high-grading" in the Northern Ontario gold camp areas, and that Inspector Frank Gardner, at present in charge of district headquarters of the provincial force at Belleville, will be assigned to the task.

Details of the proposed scheme have not been worked out, so far as could be ascertained here, and it could not be learned what strength the detachment of men on the job would reach. It is known that consideration to a scheme of this nature is being given attention at Queen's Park and also that Inspector Gardner, who was stationed at different points in the Temiskaming and Cochrane districts for some years, had paid a visit north recently.

Banting Institute Subject of Address

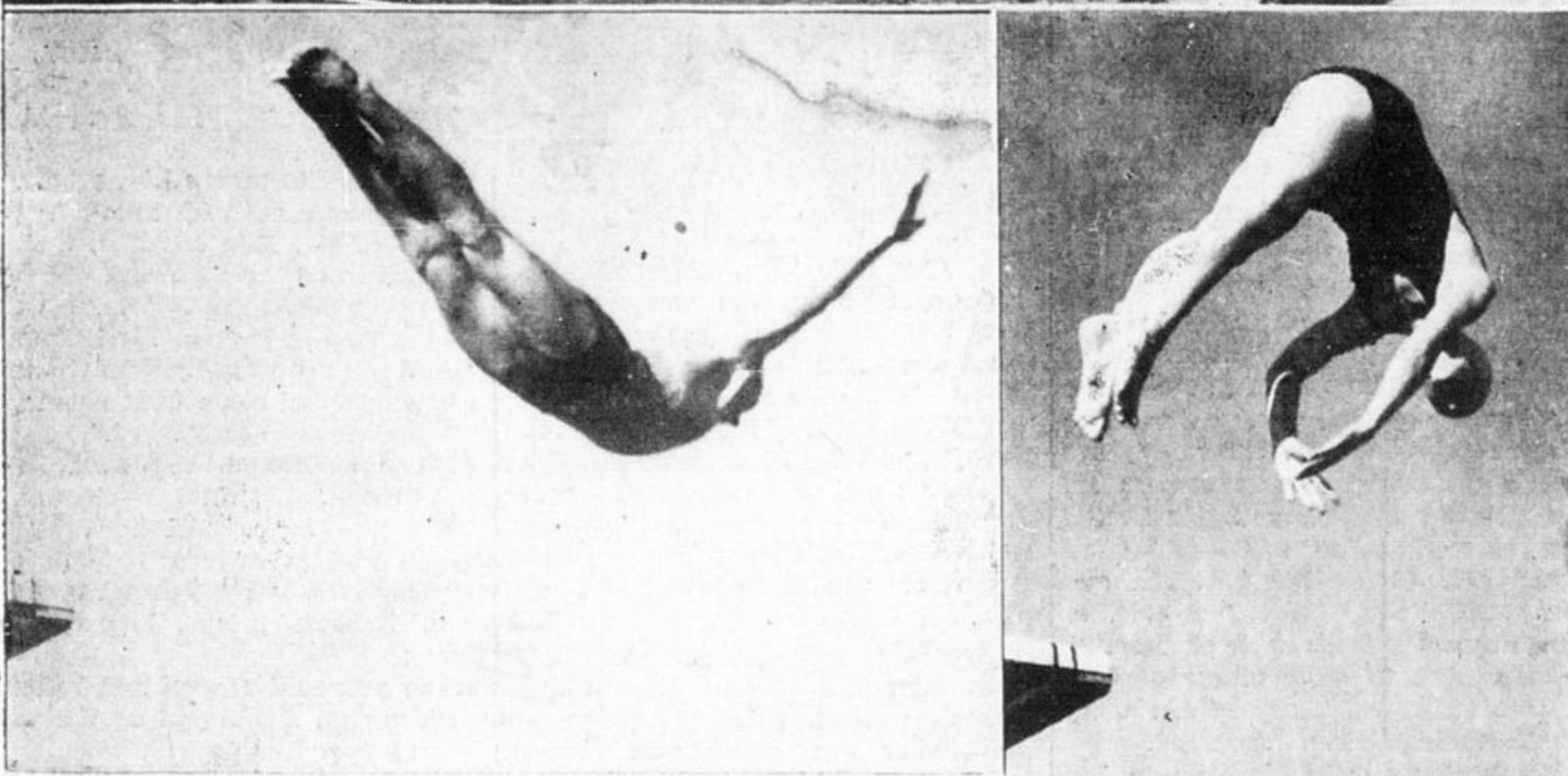
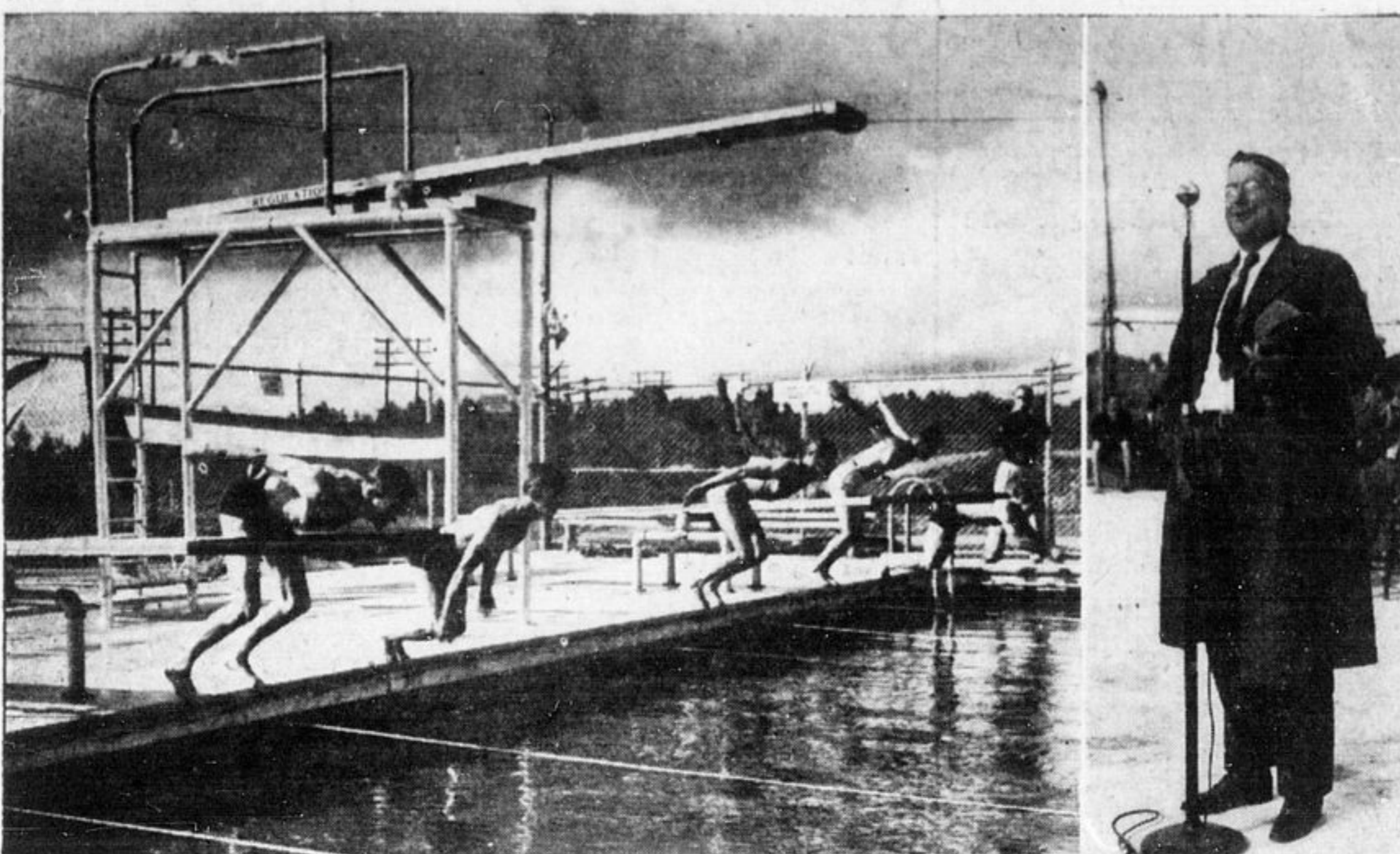
Dr. R. P. Smith, South Porcupine, is Speaker at the Weekly Kiwanis Meeting.

Horticultural Show Timmins, Aug. 29-30

Fourteenth Annual Exhibition Here of Flowers and Vegetables.

The fourteenth annual exhibition of flowers and vegetables under the auspices of the Timmins Horticultural Society will be held in the Timmins skating area, Balsam street, south, on Monday and Tuesday, Aug. 29th and 30th.

This year's exhibition, despite some unfavourable weather and the visit to the district of both the tent caterpillar and the army worm this season, the 1938 show is expected to be the best yet. Many who have been exhibiting for years expect this year to outdo all previous exhibits, while there are also quite a number of new exhibitors who should have excellent exhibits for this year's event. Advance indications point to a record docket for the Fall Assizes of the Supreme Court of Ontario which open in Cochrane on October 4. Two murder charges are scheduled to be heard, one against Dan O'Keefe, of Driftwood, and the other against Lewis Lee, of Hooker Creek, near Matheson, who is alleged to have shot and killed his neighbour, Harold Johnston recently. Frank Butkovic, Timmins youth, will again go on trial on a charge of manslaughter arising out of the death of Augustine Kader, who died of a gunshot wound allegedly caused by a rifle fired by Butkovic. The two boys were playing on the outskirts of town when the accident happened. Butkovic has appeared twice previously and the jury has disagreed both times. All three accused are represented by Dean Kester, K.C. Mr. Justice Chevrier has been named by the Supreme Court to preside over the assizes.

The general sessions of the peace will open in Cochrane on November 22. Olo Fabbro and "Nickie" West, charged with theft of \$41,000 in gold precipitates from the refinery of Dome Mines last June, will appear at the assizes for the District of Nipissing in North Bay, which open on October 3. The hearing will take place in North Bay in view of the fact that the pair were arrested in Nipissing District.
