## Schumacher Manse Scene of Wedding

Other Items of Interest from Schumacher and District.

Schumacher, Aug. 17.—(Special to The Advance)—A quiet but pretty wedding took place in the United Church manse on Friday morning by Rev. F. J. Baine, when Helen Mary, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Luchen, became the bride of Albert William Roach, son of Mrs. and the late Mr. Roach, of South Porcupine. The bride, given in marriage by her father, chose an afternoon dress of dusky rose crepe with bolero jacket to match, and wore a brown felt hat, with matching accessories and wore a corsage of sweet peas and snapdragons. She was attended by her sister, Lily Luchen, as bridesmaid, who wore a beige shark-skin dress, and brown accessories, and corsage of pansies. Mr. Sam Roach, brother of the groom, acted as best man. The Minister was replying to criticism of the amendments recently made by Premier Mitchell Hepburn of Ontario and certain mining interests.

In order to clear up misunderstanding as to the application of the new provisions to mining enterprise, he said, representatives of the industry would be invited to confer with C. Fraser Elliott, Income Tax Commissioner, on the drafting of explanatory departmental rulings.

### Beyond Comprehension

Mr. Ilsley said Premier Hepburn's charge that the amendments constituted an affront to the Rowell Commission was "beyond my comprehension." The Commission was a fact-finding body investigating the financial relations between the Dominion and the Provinces with a view to making recommendations primarily as to ways and means of securing a better equilibrium between the governmental responsibilities and the revenue sources of the various governing bodies in Canada.

It is clear from the very wording of this clause that its sole purpose was to prevent tax evasion. I do not think that any one would consider that this government had done its duty if such a transaction were allowed to go free of any tax either in the hands of the company or in the hands of the shareholders of the company.

It has been alleged that the new clause involves discrimination against the mining industry. This charge is also without foundation. The clause is wholly general in its terms and applies to companies in all lines of business.

Insofar as the mining industry is concerned, any liability that would have existed under the general terms of the law before the amendment continues to exist in exactly the same manner and to the same extent.

### Principles Involved

The principles involved in the general law and which are, as principles, unaffected by Section 32B might shortly be stated as follows:

distributes any assets to its shareholders without sale or at a sales price substantially below the fair market price, "which assets if sold at the market price would create income of the corporation within the meaning of the Act," the Minister of National Revenue shall have power to determine the fair market price of such assets and the company shall be deemed to have sold such assets at the price so determined and thereby to have received income subject to tax and the distributable portion received by the shareholder or member shall be deemed to be a dividend.

### Prevent Tax Evasion

It is clear from the very wording of this clause that its sole purpose was to prevent tax evasion. The particular case which made it necessary to introduce such a clause was that of a company engaged in the buying and selling of securities, in other words, a trading company, and which, for some years has paid without question the corporate income tax on its net profits, but which now proposes to wind up and distribute to its shareholders the securities held in its portfolio without effecting a sale of such securities at current market values which are substantially higher than the book cost to the company.

Or, on the other hand, if that which is acquired is, by work, labor and capital, improved with the intention of selling it as a profit, and it is so sold, then the profit would appear to be taxable on the principle of carrying on business with a view to profit on the very thing that is done.

Or, on the other hand, if that which is acquired is, by work, labor and capital, improved with the intention of selling it, but of developing it to the point of self-production, out of which production a profit is expected to be made, then, if during the course of the development, or after it has come into the production stage, the thing acquired should be sold at profit, the profit would be a capital gain and not income subject to tax.

Therefore, it is clear that each case must be determined in the light of its own particular facts to ascertain whether that which is secured is an interest or a capital gain . . .

It is clear from what has been said that Section 32B does not impose any special or discriminatory taxes, or indeed any new tax, on the mining industry. Nor is it true, as has been alleged, that the government has been guilty of a breach of faith because of any promise that may have been made not to impose any further taxes upon the mining industry during the lifetime of this Parliament.

That promise was to the effect that this government would not impose any special or discriminatory taxes on the mining industry . . .

The Commissioner of Income Tax has just returned from Europe. He is preparing rulings in accordance with principles which have been outlined above, but before they are published, he will confer with the appropriate representatives of the prospecting and mining organizations in order that the misinterpretations which have been prevalent in regard to the new section 32B may be dissipated.

### No Reflection on Probe

In conclusion, I may refer briefly to the contention that the passing of the two amendments to the Income War Tax Act which have been discussed above constitute an affront to the Royal Commission on Dominion-Provincial relations. From what has already been said, the baselessness of


this statement should be obvious.

## CANADA NORTHERN POWER CORPORATION PLANT AT WAWAITIN FALLS,



The Wawatim Falls generating plant on the Mattagami River, is one of the most important units in the system operated by the Canada Northern Power Corporation and is united with smaller plants at Sandy Falls and Lower Sturgeon in supplying power to the Porcupine Camp. In addition, power is also brought into the hook-up from Quinze River in Quebec, a tributary of the Ottawa. At the left may be seen the huge switchboard controlling operations at Wawatim, while at the bottom are views of the two types of generators in use, the pair at the left being of newer design than those at the right. A staff of twelve men is maintained at the plant which has a capacity of approximately 12,000 horsepower. At Sandy Falls 4,000 horsepower is produced and double this amount at Lower Sturgeon.

### Capital Gain Not Taxed

"Capital gains never were and are not now, and I recommend should never be taxed under the income tax measure," was the emphatic declaration of C. F. Elliott, Commissioner of Income Tax, in reporting to the Minister of National Revenue Saturday in criticisms directed against the two amendments to the Act, last session.

"The definition has not been enlarged, no new taxes have been imposed, no discrimination has been effected against the mining industry or any industry," Mr. Elliott insisted.

The Commissioner suggested that as there was some misunderstanding in the mining industry as to the intent and effect of the amendments, a conference be held between representatives of the industry and officials of the department before actual promulgation of the explanatory rulings.
