Twenty Years Ago

From The Porcupine Advance Files

The sad death of a little girl over two years of age was chronicled by The Advance twenty years ago. Aghetina, the little daughter of Antonia Pennazzi, fell into a big basin of boiling water that was left on the floor for a minute or two while some other work was being attended to. The child was badly burned on the back, thighs, and legs, but medical help being hastily summoned it was hoped that the youngster's life might be saved. The shock and burns, however, proved fatal. There was a very large funeral, sym-

pathy for the bereaved family being especially marked. The Italian band attended in a body, playing the funeral marches to the last resting place of the little girl.

Twenty years ago The Advance urged all to go berry picking. "Save the wild fruit this year," said The Advance. "The raspberries are delicious! The blueberries will soon be ready! Tame fruit is not as plentiful as last year, while the need for fruits for jam for the soldiers overseas and for the sailors is pressing in these days of war. To pick the wild berries, consequently, is to consult the best interest of patriotism and the pocketbook at this time."

In one article twenty years ago The Advance told of a whole series of accidents and incidents happening in town. One child fell into a pail of boiling water and died from the scalds and shock. Another youngster fell from a high chair and had a narrow escape from fatal injury. A woman, suffering from mental derangement, made an unexpected and unprovoked attack with a club upon a young man who happened to pass her house. Another woman had to be arrested for parading the streets with a rifle threatening to shoot anybody and everybody in sight. A young man at the Hollinger took a drink from a bottle on a shelf, thinking the clear liquid to be water, but it proved to be a solution containing cyanide. Prompt medical attention saved that young man from joining his forefathers. Two small children secured some patent medicine tablets which they swallowed. Again the good doctors of the camp avoided a tragedy, though the children were very ill. Another woman suffering from mental depression swallowed a portion of Gillet's lye and was very badly burned about the mouth and throat. She was taken south for further treatment after her life had been saved here.

There were over 500 at the Odd-fellows' picnic at Wilson's farm, Golden City, twenty years ago. The crowds came from Timmins, South Porcupine, the Dome, Schumacher, and other points, the trains being overloaded and autos, buggies and stages also being used to take the crowds to the scene of action. At one time there were 51 autos on the roads or grounds near the picnic, this being a record number of automobiles to be gathered together at time here twenty years ago, though would mean little traffic for these days. There were races, sports novelties on the grounds, with boat-bathing also enjoyed. Colom-orchestra furnished good music for day. A booth on the grounds did a business in serving refreshments, completely sold out more than during the day. South Porcupine feated Timmins at baseball by a score of 10 to 0. The Advance termed "un-memorable." Another noteworthy picnic twenty

years ago was the annual Provincial Government Demonstration Farm picnic at Monteth. About forty from Timmins attended the event and reported it as most enjoyable and successful. The inspection of the farm was one of the big pleasures of the day for all. There were practical addresses on the soil, stock-raising, dairying, etc., given by experts. The experts advised stock-raising, dairying and poultry-raising as good lines for this North Land. Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, then Minister of Lands and Forests and Mines, promised in his address the co-operation of the Government in all helpful plans for North Land agriculture. Hon. Mr. Henry, appointed Minister of Agriculture a short time previous to the event, was unable to be present. In this connection it may be noted that The Advance gave considerable publicity to the three weeks' course in domestic science offered at Monteth to young ladies of 16 and over. The course was free and only \$15.00 being charged for board at Monteth for the three weeks.

Many may imagine that the matter of hold-ups, maked robberies, etc., is a recent importation into Canada, but those with good memories know this is not so. The Advance twenty years ago told of two masked highwaymen with guns holding up 35 Canadian Northern Railway labourers near Parry Sound and securing about \$5,000.00 in cash.

The men robbed were chiefly alien enemies. The alien enemies in this country kept the authorities so busy in one way or another that time was never available to track down the masked highwaymen that did the Parry Sound trick. The alien enemies in this country during the war nearly all made big money. They would not trust their money in the banks here as a rule, but carried it around on their persons, often in body belts. One alien arrested here for drunkenness had about a hundred dollars in his pockets when searched. When he sobered up, he wanted to get out on bail. For a joke one of the police told the man if he could produce \$500 he could likely get out at once. The police were sure the man had no money on him as he had been thoroughly searched. The fellow turned his back to the police, and shortly produced the \$500.00 in bills, and it developed that he had a further \$700 hidden on his person. Another Austrian was carrying nearly \$2,000.00 when arrested for some minor breach of the law.

The Advance twenty years ago reminded the judge who allowed Consvoitch to go on suspended sentence when convicted of seditious utterances, that the said Consvoitch was again under arrest for illegal activities at Brantford. Consvoitch was the orator whose arrest at Timmins caused what was called the "riot" here. Consvoitch was in trouble several times during the

war, and The Advance was inclined to be bitterly sarcastic in asking why he was able to perform as he did.

In reporting the police court proceedings twenty years ago, The Advance said, in part:—"Thursday seemed to be an unlucky day for alien enemies here, who have been acting up to their national characteristics. The big fellow known as "the King of the Bulgarians" was sentenced to one year's imprisonment for bringing girls to Timmins for immoral purposes. When he heard the sentence he lost his important bearing and came near to collapse. Another Bulgarian was given four months for complicity in the trading in immoral women. An Austrian was let go with a warning, the evidence not being conclusive, on the charge of allowing his auto to be used for immoral purposes. A Bulgarian baker was fined for selling lightweight bread. An Austrian millman was fined for taking wood from a lot without authority."
