

# Building Public Opinion on Value of the Forests

Films and Address Under the Joint Auspices of Canadian Forestry Association and Ontario Dept. of Lands and Forests, Show Large Audience at Timmins What the Forests Mean to Canada.

Forcefully bringing the need of prevention against forest fires to the attention of his audience, Mr. R. A. Carman delivered a very interesting and enlightening address on this subject to a large audience of adults and children who crowded the courtroom at the town hall on Friday evening. The address and presentation of films which followed it, were part of the programme of the Canadian Forestry Association and the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests, Forestry Branch, to make Canadians "forest conscious," and to make them realize that they must help to protect these forests from destruction.

"Carelessness on the part of humans," said Mr. Carman, "is the cause of nine out of ten fires." This destruction of forests, causes unemployment, leaves a barren land that will not attract tourists, destroys the streams and kills the fish, causes floods, and in many other ways brings about loss. "The tourist is coming into the North Country for his health; and he chooses a spot that is scenic and where there is fresh water and shaded spots for fish," said Mr. Carman. If these fish are destroyed by fire refuse, and if there are no cool streams shaded by trees, the tourist will not stop but will find another place to camp. These were only a few of the reasons that Mr. Carman mentioned in emphasizing the need for forest preservation.

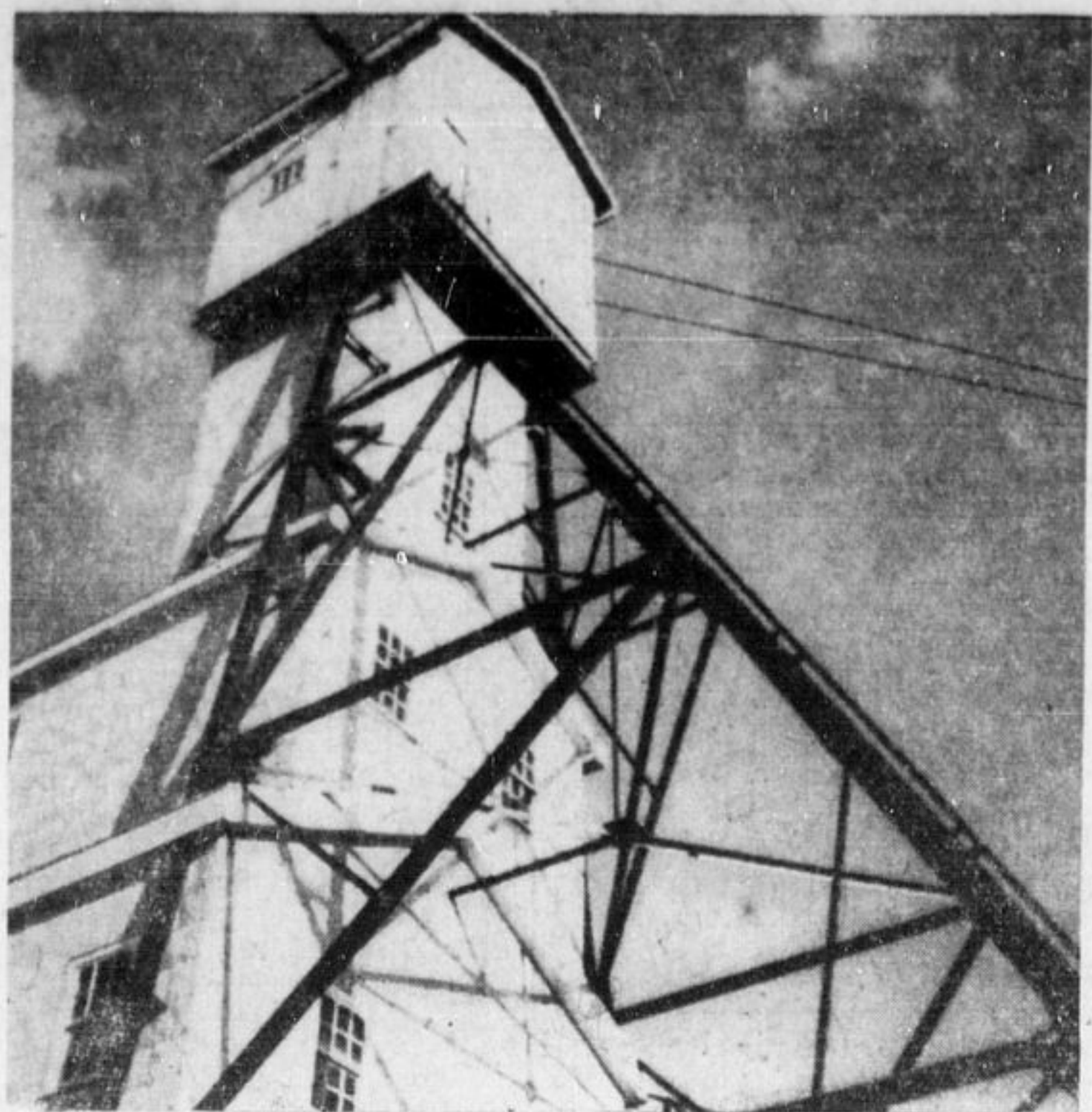
A number of films, including: "Forest Dollars", which showed the ranger's look-out tower, a Canadian lumber camp, pulp and paper mill, the beauty of the forest, reminding the people that "only God can make a tree," but humans can wantonly destroy it, and closed with the words "On Guard Canadians, these mighty forests belong to you"; "The International Nickel Mine at Sudbury", showing the mining of the nickel, the different process it goes through, and the many uses that are made of it; trailers such as "Prevent Forest Fires", which showed the manner in which people may assist in preserving the beauty and the use of the forests; "Forests and Streams", telling about the effect of the fire on the streams and fish; "Forest Fires Or Game", impressing upon the audience the thought that they would have to choose between taking a little more time and care when camping, and thus enjoying the forest game, or carelessly destroying the setting for sport that nature has provided; as well as "Snow Time, Aesop's Fables," and Walt Disney's "Mickey in Arabia," were greatly enjoyed by the large audience, that gladly withstood the intense heat, to attend this educative and interesting lecture and showing of films.

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### DEVIL'S FOOD CAKE

- 1/2 c. butter
- 1/2 c. brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 c. flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1/2 c. sour milk
- 1/2 c. boiling water
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 c. cocoa

METHOD: Cream butter until light, gradually add sugar, cream well. Add beaten eggs, vanilla. Sift and measure flour, add salt and baking powder and add alternately to egg mixture with sour milk. Dissolve baking soda in cocoa with boiling water, fold in, beat well. Pour into well buttered pans, bake at 375° about 25 mins. Put together and ice with Seven Minute frosting or Chocolate Butter Frosting.

### Chocolate Butter Frosting

Melt 1 1/2 squares chocolate with 2 tsp. butter. Blend in 2 tbsp. sifted icing sugar, Add 4 tbsp. cream. Gradually add about 2 c. sifted icing sugar. Beat well. Add 1/2 tsp. vanilla.
