Province Purchases Howey Power Lines

Red Lake Distribution System Also Included.

Kenora, Aug. 24.—A bill of sale, dated Aug. 11, 1938, by which Howey Gold Mines Limited transfers to the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario the Howey transmission line from Ear Falls to Red Lake and the Red Lake distribution system, has been registered at the office of the Clerk of the District Court for the District of Kenora, it was learned here this week.

The Howey transmission line, built nine years ago, is defined as the three-phase, wood-pole electrical transmission line from Ear Falls to Howey Mine, a distance of 40.6 miles, and includes the telephone system carried on the poles. The price paid to Howey for the transmission line is set out at \$60,000. The Red Lake distribution system is defined as being the plant and works for the distribution of electric power in and about the town of Red Lake, but does not include the telephone circuits carried on these poles. The purchase price is given as \$10,000.

Recommendations Go to Municipal Association

Timmins Council Seek Compulsory Sewer Installation, New System of Audits and Assessment Act Change, Occupational License of W. P. Wilson at Mattagami River Reported as Cancelled. Other Matters Decided.

Compulsory installation of sanitary conveniences, the introduction of a system of municipal audits and a change in the present method of delivering assessment notices by registered mail, are the recommendations from Timmins Town Council that will be discussed at the annual meeting of the Ontario Municipal Association to be held in Toronto on August 31, September 1 and 2. The municipality will be represented by Councillor Bill Wren, chairman of the finance committee, and Town Treasurer A. L. Shaw.

The first recommendation is a request that the Ontario Government amend the municipal act giving the sanitary inspector of a municipality power to compel property owners to install sanitary conveniences. It is felt that without this power a town or city is unable to regulate sewage disposal within its borders, to the detriment of the health of the citizens at large.

The second recommendation is a request to the Department of Municipal Affairs to institute a system of municipal audits or surveys, whereby the Council may request the Department to make a survey of conditions in a municipality, with or without an audit, the Department to supply a written report of the analysis.

The local Council is also asking a change in the Act eliminating the regulation with respect to the delivery of assessment notices by registered mail, which it is claimed is costly and inefficient. It is suggested that municipalities be allowed to use ordinary mail for this purpose.

License Is Cancelled

Mayor J. P. Bartleman announced that the Deputy Minister of Lands and Forests has advised Timmins Theatres Ltd., and W. P. Wilson, proprietor of Riverside Pavilion, that their license of occupation for sixty-six feet of property along the west bank of the river from the bridge south to a point approximately at the turn of the stream, has been cancelled. According to the instructions given by the department, Mr. Wilson is prohibited from making any charge for bathing in the river, the public to have free access to the sixty-six foot strip at all times. The cancellation of the license for the sixty-six foot river frontage does not in any way prevent Mr. Wilson from charging for parking cars on his own property, Mayor Bartleman pointed out.

Occupational licenses for ground on which a number of bathhouses are located north of the bridge will not be renewed after expiration. Owners will be required to move the structures to new locations. When this is completed the town will take steps to improve the river bank so that the public will have bathing facilities from the bridge to the new municipal picnic grounds several hundred yards north.

Mayor Bartleman suggested that a board of some kind should be appointed to supervise the entire river area. Councillor Wren felt that a previous suggestion to form a Town Planning Commission should be followed, members of which could take over the river project as well as a comprehensive housing plan for the entire town.

Methods Criticized Councillor William Roberts made formal objection to the awarding of a \$10,000 sidewalk contract to the Mascoll Construction Company by Councillors Wren and Brunette, without first getting formal approval of council. Mr. Roberts claimed that a newspaper report was the first intimation he had received that the contract had been let.

Councillor Wren admitted that he and Councillor Brunette had awarded the contract to the Mascoll Company, the only firm that tendered on the job. He pointed out that the contract price was under the estimated cost submitted by the engineer's department and felt that there was no reason to further delay the work pending a full meeting of council. "The construction of sidewalks has already been delayed for three months awaiting approval of the Municipal Board and the time is getting short," Councillor Wren pointed out. He also drew Councillor Roberts' attention to the fact that new uniforms had

Kirkland Lake, Aug. 24.—Darting across the Ferguson highway, near Dane, 10 miles south of Kirkland Lake, Noella Desjardins, six, on Saturday suffered injuries from which she died later in hospital here. She was struck by a car driven by George Stone, Kirkland Lake.

The smaller sister, following behind, was struck by the fender of the Stone car.

An inquest will be held this week.

North Bay, Aug. 24.—It is a common enough occurrence for men to catch fish, but when the fish turns around and catches the man, it is really something.

That is precisely what happened to Jack Leve, of Sudbury, recently while fishing for bass near his summer camp on Trout lake. Mr. Leve unexpectedly caught a muskie and as he landed it, the fish caught him... on the left arm. The fish was not a whopper but still a good size. It topped the scales at 16½ pounds and measured three and one-half feet long. Mr. Leve landed the fish in his canoe without the aid of a gaff or net, and didn't even capsize his frail boat.

When he first brought the fish up to the canoe, he tried to land it with his hands but had his arm bitten by the fighting muskie. After 15 minutes of playing the fish was landed.
