# "SALADA" ICED TEA

## Thinks Nothing Better Than Good Potato Salad

And Nothing Worse Than a Poor One, Says Domestic Science Expert. It's a Fairly Simple Dish to Prepare, but What is to be Done Should be Done Right.

Nothing is better than a good potato salad and nothing is worse than a poor one. Of course, I realize that there

may be differences in taste so perhaps I had better merely talk about the kinds of potato salad that I like.

First of all there are the potatoes

themselves which must not be over-cooked. I think that they are better boiled in their jackets and peeled as soon as they are cool enough. The potatoes will cook better if they have been chilled in the refrigerator before they are sliced or diced, as you prefer. I will allow you that much leeway. I like to mix the potatoes plus some minced onion with a little French dressing and allow them to stand for some time before I add the other ingredients. For these I choose diced cucumber, and sometimes diced celery. Sometimes I use diced dill pickles instead of cucumber, especially in the winter time.

Now about the dressing. What is known as boiled dressing thinned with sour cream, is marvelous with potato salad. So also is the cooked dressing, which has a basis of bacon fat, and I do like bits of cooked bacon mixed with any kind of potato salad. I also like sliced hard-cooked egg for a garnish unless deviled eggs are served with the salad.

If I use mayonnaise for the dressing, I like to blend whipped cream, flavoured with tarragon vinegar with it. You may, if you like, use an extra amount of French dressing for marinating and simply serve mayonnaise as a garnish on the salad or you may pass it at the table.

And have you ever served hot potato salad? This is a savory accessory for a cold meal.

### Potato Salad

- 4 cups cold boiled potatoes
  - 1 chopped onion
  - 1 cucumber or 2 pickles
  - 1/4 cup French dressing
  - 4 sliced cooked bacon
  - Cooked salad dressing.
- Dice or slice potatoes, add the onion and sliced cucumbers or pickles. Mix with the French dressing which should be very well seasoned and minced bacon and let stand in refrigerator 1 to 2 hours. Mix with the salad dressing, serve on lettuce, and garnish with parsley. Celery cut into cubes, or celery seed may be used with the other ingredients if desired.

- ### Cooked Salad Dressing
- 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1 teaspoon mustard
  - 2 teaspoons sugar
  - Cayenne
  - 1 tablespoon flour
  - 1 egg or two yolks
  - 1/2 cup milk
  - 1/2 cup vinegar
- Mix the dry ingredients and add to the egg. Add the milk gradually, and then vinegar and cook over hot water, stirring constantly until thickened.
- ### Quick Meal
- Vegetable soup
  - Sliced hard cooked eggs
  - Potato salad with bacon
  - Corn on the cob
  - Sliced peaches.
- Coffee.
- ### Method of Preparation
- Boiled eggs.
  - Dice cold boiled potatoes.
  - Mince onion, make French dressing and mix with potatoes.
  - Cook bacon.
  - Boil water for corn
  - Dice cucumbers.
  - Slice peaches.
  - Prepare lettuce.
  - Peel eggs and chill.
  - Cook corn.
  - Open can of soup and heat.
  - Combine salad.
  - Make coffee.

**Thousands Helped by the Travelling Hospital**

Toronto, Aug. 24.—Serving new mining fields, isolated railway towns and frontier settlements, the Red Cross railway hospital car for the past 11 years has constituted one of the most colorful units of the outpost hospital service in Northern Ontario.

Not only have 42 operations been performed in the car and some 550 patients cared for, but 750 northern children have been treated at clinics as a result of 2700 school-child inspections, and 2800 health and nursing visits have been made to settlers' homes.

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### DEVIL'S FOOD CAKE

1/2 c. butter	1/2 c. sour milk
1/2 c. brown sugar	1/2 c. boiling water
2 eggs	1 tsp. baking soda
2 1/4 c. flour	1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt	1/2 c. cocoa
1 tsp. vanilla	

METHOD: Cream butter until light, gradually add sugar, cream well. Add beaten eggs, vanilla. Sift and measure flour, add salt and baking powder and add alternately to egg mixture with sour milk. Dissolve baking soda in cooled boiling water, fold in, beat well. Pour into well buttered pans, bake at 375° about 25 mins. Put together and ice with Seven Minute frosting or Chocolate Butter Frosting.

Chocolate Butter Frosting  
Melt 1 1/2 squares chocolate with 2 tbsp. butter. Blend in 2 tbsp. sifted icing sugar. Add 4 tbsp. cream. Gradually add about 2 c. sifted icing sugar, beat well. Add 1/2 tsp. vanilla.
