Longpre Committed on Murder Attempt Charge

Will Appear at Cochrane Assizes as Sequel to Wounding of Albert Desormeaux in Shooting Affray. Huckabone is Remanded for Week. Assault Charges are Dismissed.

Edward Longpre, held in custody since July 28, was committed for trial by Magistrate Atkinson in police court here Tuesday afternoon on a charge of attempted murder, arising out of a shooting affray that sent Albert Desormeaux to hospital with a serious abdominal wound. Desormeaux, who was discharged from hospital a week ago to-day, was the chief witness for the crown. Longpre was represented by Anase Seguin.

Paul English, important Crown witness, who accompanied Desormeaux to Longpre's house in Mountjoy Township on the night of the shooting, could not be located in time for to-day's hearing and had been sought by Provincial Constable Harold Gall in the Kirkland Lake district. The magistrate considered that Desormeaux and Provincial

Constable James Toppenden had presented enough evidence to warrant a committal and made an order to this effect.

Desormeaux told of meeting Longpre in Timmins on the afternoon of July 28. After they had visited a local hotel together, they got into a taxi and Desormeaux said that he was going to get his clothes from Longpre's farm. As they were driving along Longpre noticed a lady friend and the taxi was stopped. The woman refused to accompany Longpre, she and Desormeaux hiring another taxi and proceeding to the farm where she had also been staying. Paul English had accompanied Desormeaux and the woman and on their arrival another car was in front of the house, presumably the taxi used by Longpre.

Desormeaux testified that he had rapped at both the front and back doors before entering the house through a window, accompanied by English. He lit a lamp and as he walked toward the kitchen, he told the court that Longpre fired from close range, the bullet striking him in the lower abdomen. After being hit he ran upstairs. A few seconds later he heard a second shot but couldn't tell where it had been fired.

Provincial Constable James Toppenden, who went to the scene of the shooting in response to call, told the court of meeting Longpre walking along the road some distance from the house. The accused, who was carrying a pistol at the time, told the officer that he had just shot a man who had broken into his house. He thought that he had hit the man in the legs after firing the first shot over his head.

Robbery With Violence
The same element of doubt guided the magistrate when he dismissed a charge of robbery with violence preferred by Mose Maltais against Jack McDonald. Details of an alleged attack by McDonald on Maltais during which he was alleged to have stolen \$36 from his pocket were equally confusing. A half brother of the accused, Andrew McDonald, who was also present at the time, said that he saw Maltais pushed to one side but his brother walked out of the place immediately. He claimed that Maltais had followed a third man out of the room who had also been a member of the party and accused him of taking the money in question.

Withdraw Wounding Charge
With the approval of all parties concerned, a wounding charge against Alex Melnick was withdrawn on payment of costs.

Cases Adjourned
Two charges of assault occasioning actual bodily harm, one preferred by George Ticalo against John Evans and the other by Alphonse Thivierge against Noble Larche, were adjourned for a week.

Dorothy Dural, of Deloro Township, was fined \$100 and costs on a charge of having liquor in her possession without a permit. The premises were also declared public for a period of one year.

Reckless Driving
