## Heavy Penalties for Speeding at Cobalt

Halleybury, Aug. 29.—(Special to The Advance)—Sequel to an exciting after midnight pursuit of three cars containing participants in a commercial get-together gathering at Cobalt, two New Liskeard men and one from Halleybury paid fines of \$50 and costs apiece, and each had his license suspended for a month, when the cases were disposed of before Magistrate Atkinson here on Friday afternoon. Accused were Harold Price, New Liskeard, who fought his case, and Rene Blanchard, of Halleybury, and Eli Gignas, of New Liskeard, who pleaded guilty. Ten other men had been charged with obstruction of the police, at the instance of Provincial Constable R. O. Stromberg, but these cases were withdrawn by Crown Attorney J. B. Robinson.

Evidence given in court disclosed that, according to the officer, one of the accused had passed him in his car while the constable was doing 70 miles an hour in an effort to head off the others, and further that at one stage of the chase the policeman's car, with Chief Clarence Connelly, of Cobalt, on one running board, was flanked by two cars, both allegedly speeding. One of these eventually went into the ditch at North Cobalt and it was claimed, while Constable Stromberg pursued another machine, the half score individuals subsequently charged with obstruction gathered about Chief Connelly and tried to prevent him carry out his duty. The affair, which happened in the early hours of August 11, followed on a gathering held by a number of district men and which, according to police, broke up amid considerable noise on Cobalt streets.

## Death of Jas. G. Carter at Cochrane Last Week

Cochrane, Aug. 27.—The eldest son of one of Cochrane's best-known pioneer families, James Gordon Carter of Cochrane died at the home of his uncle, Spencer Smith, in Burlington on Tuesday, August 23. The funeral was held today in Burlington, where his father, the late W. S. Carter, is also buried. Gordon was born 33 years ago in Penetanguishene, Ont., the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Carter. At the age of four he came to Cochrane from Smith's Falls with his family and has since resided in the northern town. Ordered to take a complete rest by doctors last week, Gordon went to visit his uncle in Burlington and died suddenly of heart failure Tuesday night. He is survived by his mother, three sisters, Mrs. W. S. Paul, of Pamour; Mrs. J. Harrison of Bradford, and Reta, who is at home, and three brothers, W. S. Carter, Peter and Walter of Pamour.
