

The funeral was held today in Burlington, where his father, the late W. S. Carter, is also buried.

Gordon was born 33 years ago in Penetanguishene, Ont., the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Carter. At the age of four he came to Cochrane from Smith's Falls with his family and has since resided in the northern town.

Ordered to take a complete rest by doctors last week, Gordon went to visit his uncle in Burlington and died suddenly of heart failure Tuesday night.
