## Trucker Is Charged After Car Ditched

Alleged to have been forced off the Back Road near the Delnite-Aughtie corner Tuesday night, a car driven by Charles Rucker, 154 Avenue road, Timmins, crashed into the ditch after travelling a distance of seventy feet on the shoulder and turned over on its side. Rucker was uninjured as were two passengers, R. C. Bride, 7 1/2 Cherry street, and E. L. Drew, 24 Toke street. When the car finally came to a halt in the dense bush alongside the road, the three men crawled to safety. The vehicle missed hitting a stump by inches but a large boulder had to be removed to get the machine back on the highway.

According to Provincial Constable Jim Warrell, who investigated the accident, the driver of the car claimed that a truck owned by a local dairy and driven by Frank Muskal, 181 1/2 Cedar street north, cut in too close after passing and forced him to take to the ditch. Muskal will face a charge of reckless driving.

## Success of Students at Albert College

Dr. Bert Howard, principal of Albert College, Belleville, Ontario, has announced the results of matriculation examinations which have been received from the Department of Education for Ontario. Throughout the school, the remarkably high average of over 75 per cent, was achieved by students on all papers written. The results of the University work in affiliation with Queens University, were also outstanding and proved entirely satisfactory to the Board of Queens.

With the opening of the fall term on September 14th, Albert College will have completed a programme of extensive renovations and additions which were begun some time ago. The ladies' residence has been completely re-decorated and laid throughout with hardwood floors, glass rooms have been re-designed for greater efficiency and the dormitories have been remodeled for further conveniences.

Dr. Ellis, M.A., Ph.D., former professor at Northwestern University, Chicago, will have charge of the French Department, while Mr. Schoades, B.A., (Hons.), will instruct in the Commercial Department. Miss Ruth Howard, B.A., (Hons.), will lecture in English, and will also assume the duties of Physical Instructress. The entire staff at Albert College, without exception, possess the Ontario Department of Education certificates and qualifications for high school teachers.

In the field of sport, the football and hockey season is being anticipated by the assurance of outstanding material for the teams. Six students who have had valuable experience on senior rugby teams in London and Toronto have already registered, while excellent hockey prospects are included among students who have registered from Northern Ontario centres.

## Changes in Plan for Town Health Nurses

**Additional Nurse Allows Division of Work Among the Nurses.**

Timmins, Sept. 7th, 1938  
 To the Editor of The Advance, Timmins.

For the information of the parents of the Public and Separate Schools of Timmins I desire to make the following announcement:

With ten schools and a population of approximately 25,000 people, it became necessary to add another health nurse to our health and school department in the person of Miss L. Hall to carry out the school and public health work. Now that we have three nurses, some equal distribution of the work had to be planned. This necessitated that the ten schools be divided between the three nurses and also dividing the town into three districts for home visiting. After consulting with the assessment department as to the areas and densities of population, the following plan was arrived at:

Miss Keith — Central, Mattagami, Moneta schools. District — North—Limits; South—Railway; East—Mountjoy (west side); West—Gillies Lake.

Miss Richer—St. Charles, St. Joseph, St. Anthony, St. Michael's schools. District—North—Hollinger Lane; South—To Railway; East—River; West—Mountjoy avenue.

Miss Hall—Blrch, Jacques Cartier, Holy Family schools. District—North—To Town Limits; South—Hollinger and Fourth (N. Side); East—Mattagami River; West—Cedar Street (East side).

Up until the present time many phases of the work have been neglected but now with the addition of another nurse and a car and the dividing of the town into districts it is hoped that we may be able to carry out the generalized progress as advised by the provincial department of health and this program includes:

Health Supervision of Infants (in the home and in child health conference).  
 Preschool (in the home and in child health conference).  
 School (in the school and in the home).  
 Adult.  
 Prenatal.  
 Postnatal.  
 Illness in the home.  
 Prevention and control of acute communicable disease.  
 Social welfare of the people.  
 Co-operation with the service clubs in helping underprivileged families.  
 As the town continues to grow and the school attendance increases it will become necessary in the very near future to add a fourth nurse to carry on the ever-increasing service for the mothers and children of the town.

## Further Danger of War Now Over Czechoslovakia

Despatches to-day suggest increased danger of general war over Czechoslovakia. Alleged attack on German Sudeten deputies is given as excuse for breaking off negotiations looking to a settlement. The general council of the British Trade Union Congress and the national executive of the Labour Party in a joint meeting at Blackpool, England, denounced Germany and demanded the immediate calling of parliament and a showdown to make it clear that Britain will unite with France and Russia to resist any attack on Czechoslovakia.
