

# PORCUPINE WIN NORTHERN TEMISKAMING GROUP TITLE

## Defeated Hollinger 1-0 Here Saturday In Deciding Game

### Seventh Inning Run on Sparkling Squeeze Play by Wink Dowling Sends Abbie Moreau Home With Winning Marker. Winners Outthit in All Three Games of Series But Win Two Out of Three.

Porcupine Miners won the championship of the northern section of the senior Temiskaming Baseball League here last Saturday afternoon when they defeated Hollinger in the third game of the series by the narrow margin of 1-0. The two teams entered Saturday's tilt after winning a game apiece in two previous starts.

It was a tough loss for the Hollies, who outthit their opponents in all three games. They collected seven hits to five in the first game and lost out 3-1. They won the second game 7-5 on thirteen hits to nine by the Porkies while in Saturday's battle they again outthit the winners by seven to five, but dropped the contest by a shutout, 1-0.

The deciding game produced the best baseball of the entire three-game series. Nels Avery, on the mound for Hollinger, while he is credited with the loss, outpitched Dominic Senese, who

hitting up his second straight play-off victory.

Porcupine won the game in the seventh inning, Abbie Moreau crossing the plate on a squeeze play that was perfectly engineered by the veteran "Wink" Dowling. Moreau singled with one out and advanced easily to third on a double by Slim Long. Dowling came to bat and with the start of the first pitch, Moreau started from third. Dowling dumped the ball to the right of the pitcher's box and Avery had to be content with making the play at first base, having no chance to get Moreau at home. Murray then struck out to end the inning, Long dying at third.

It was Porcupine's home game, and in the first half of the seventh Hollinger had men on first and second with one out when Thompson hit into a double play to end a promising bid.

An attempted squeeze play that went wrong put the damper on another Hollinger attack in the fourth. Darragh opened up with a single, went to second on Ford's sacrifice and to third on a single by Romualdi. Moreau unearthed the venerable hidden ball trick to nip Romualdi off the bag and Darragh failed to get back to third when Thompson missed the pitch on attempt to squeeze the run in from third.

Porcupine spotted men on third and second base with one out in the fifth, but Romualdi threw out Murray and Senese at first to cut off any chances for a run.

A large crowd witnessed the game and displayed more enthusiasm than at any time during the season. The pitchers were given almost air-tight support, each team being credited with one error only.

## Hollinger Wins Ennis Cup Game

### Trounce McIntyre Last Night to Retain Chance for Ennis Cup Honours.

Hollinger maintained a mathematical chance to go into a tie with Lake Shore for the Ennis Cup when at McIntyre Stadium last night they cooled off Ike Solomon's aggregation with a 12-2 lacing. The game was played with a cold, uncomfortable wind carrying a wintry blast across the field and only a few of the more case-hardened fans remained to see the debacle finish.

As far as the Ennis Cup date jumbling can be unravelled at the moment: Hollinger will have to win and Lake Shore lose their remaining game of games, which would seem to give the Kirkland outfit an edge of the lead pipe variety.

Hollinger made no mistakes in last night's affair and jumping off with a two run introduction in the first inning, amassed a total of an even dozen by the end of the seventh. McIntyre failed to score until the last of the ninth.

Fred Callery, who pitched six innings for the Macs was given a rough passage on a combination of hits and errors. Four of the first five men to face him in the jump-off inning singled to produce two runs. A hit batsman, an error, passed ball and a double steal gave the Hollies another in the second and they added four more in the fourth. The bases were filled on two errors, a

base on balls and a fielder's choice with one out. Scarlett popped to short but Lawton drew a pass to force in a run. Jack Darragh followed with a line triple to centre to clear the bases, Gilbert in the centre pasture barely touching them all with his fingers as he leaped into the air.

Three hits, an error and Scarlett's sacrifice sent two more across the plate in the sixth and as the seventh started Zampell came in to pitch. The portly left-hander with the evil eye looked just the same to Hollinger and before the inning was over the Timmins squad had scored three more on three hits and an error to bring their total to twelve.

Dorey pitched steady ball all the way for Hollinger, allowing eight hits. He got out of a bad hole unscathed in the sixth when the Macs loaded the bases on three singles with none out. Hann then fled to right. Cybulski popped a foul to the catcher and Zampell lifted an easy one to Thompson at third.

Cybulski and Quinn singled for McIntyre in the last of the ninth, advanced to second and third with two out on an interference play on Bill Cooke and scored on a single by Fred Callery. Wood then forced Callery at second to end the game.

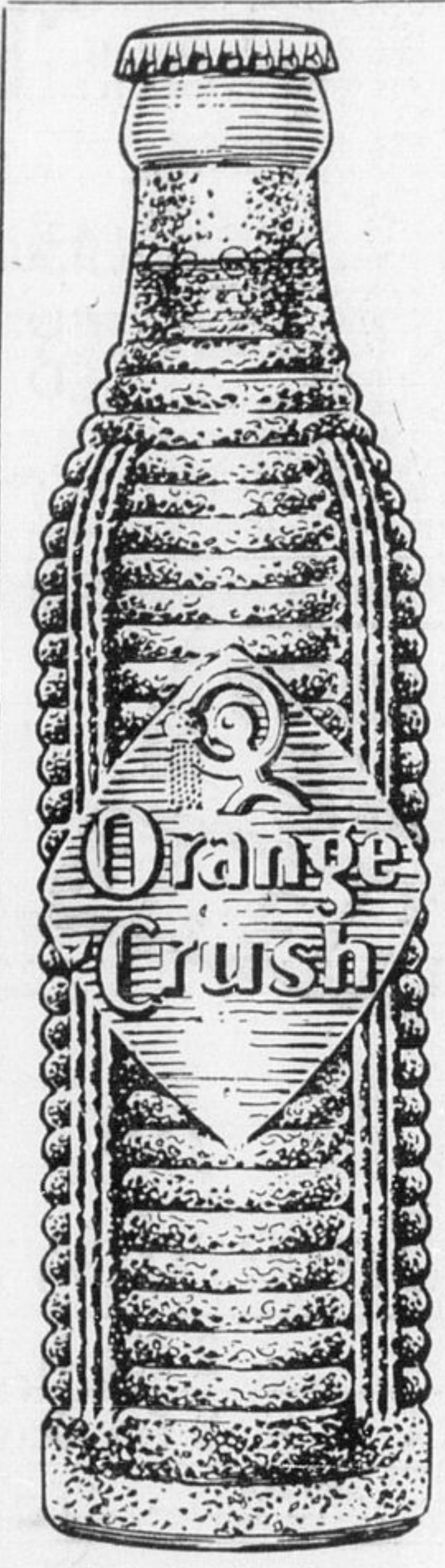
Doug May's triple in the sixth started Lake Shore on their way, driving home Forster with their first run. He scored on a long fly.

## Hollinger Even Play-Offs By Defeating Porkies 7-5

### Timmins Team Force Third Game for Championship of Northern Section of Temiskaming League with Victory Over Porcupine Last Thursday Night. Oltean Wild but Strikes Out Nine.

Clipping the offerings of Bill Meade for thirteen safe blows, Hollinger defeated Porcupine Miners last Thursday night 7-5 to tie up the play-offs for the northern section of the senior Temiskaming Baseball League at a game apiece. Porcupine won the first game 3-1.

It was one of those hit, run and error games and had the fans on edge from the time the first ball was pitched. Oltean, who discarded catcher's tackle to go to the mound for Hollinger, had trouble with his control and pitched himself into trouble frequently. He walked six and fanned nine, Meade whiffing eight and issuing four free passes.

Porcupine jumped into a 1-0 lead in the first frame, but Hollinger tied it up in the second. They added another in the third to take the lead and from this point were never headed. A double by Dorey, a base on balls and two errors gave the Hollies another pair in the fourth, but the Porkies came right back into the contention in their half of the inning when they combined two bases on balls with a couple of singles for a pair of runs to climb within one of tying the score. Hollinger widened the breach with a soft run on a single and two errors in the sixth, but the Porcupine squad gained another run in the seventh when Thompson missed a toss to third base that was made to order for a double play.

The eight was the turning point.

Hollinger combing Meade's pitches for four singles, with a base on balls and a fielder's choice thrown in for two runs. The bases were loaded when McKay lined out to Moreau for the third out.

The three-run deficit didn't seem to affect the never-say-die Porkies and in their half of the eighth, they pushed another run over on Moreau's double and singles by Long and Murray. A smart double play, Ford to Romualdi to Lawton, put the quietus on a promising rally.

Oltean struck out the entire side in the last of the ninth, but Dominas and Schultz, who singled in between strikeouts, were on first and second when the last out was registered.
