

Thomas Richard Henry Out- papers in North Carolina. lines His Personal Views.

(By Thomas Richard Henry in The Toronto Telegram) To the people of the British Empire, the blessings of a continued peace seem to be somewhat diluted because of a

The horrors of war seem to be somewhat forgotten in the sacrifices to avoid it.

For our part we are always willing to pay a high price for peace, even if we did expect Mr. Chamberlain to drive a better bargain than seems to be indicated at the moment. However, we don't know what may be in the Chamberlain mind-And Europe is not yet marching.

There are several sidelights in this business that we find very interesting. For instance, we are interested in discovering how unhappy the United States is about the whole thing.

Editorials all over the country bitterly denounce Great Britain and France for not taking a firm attitude and defending "poor little" Czechoslovakia by force of arms if necessary. We get the impression that the editors of the United States would be will-

ing to sacrifice every English soldier and every French soldier, every English pound and every French franc, in defending a country created by Woodrow Wilson and an act of parliament We are not criticizing the U.S. policy however, in declaring it will not en-

than national peril. As a matter of fact, we are in sympathy with the idea.

We only think that if the Americans try to elect somebody to fight for them. We are a little tired of John Bull being expected to look like Don Qui-

It seems that Great Britain fell down badly and lost a lot of prestige when she didn't defend Ethiopia against Mussolini, when she didn't defend China against Japan, when she didn't defend somebody against somebody in Spain-and now Czechoslovakia As we say, we are in sympathy with the U.S. ideas on aloofness. We have no dseire to see Great Britain police the world.

We would like to see her fight when -and only when-the Empire is in

But that is the rub-when and where pire's peril.

If Britain's decision of a time and place not to fight makes the U.S. editors feel too indignant, they can form a foreign legion and attach themselves to their ex-President's almost ex-coun-

Meantime we don't know just how we feel about Mr. Chamberlain's Alphonse and Gaston act with Hitler. We don't know all the factors that he weighed We only hope that all his critics, who would rather see a war than give in to Hitler, will rush to the recruiting sta-
