

# DOME FOOTBALL TEAM LOSE BYRNE CUP TO LAKE SHORE

## Kirkland Lake Team Staged Strong Comeback Saturday

Dome Overcame Two Goal Deficit Only to Have the Lake Shore Score Three in Last of Second Half to Win Round by Score of 6-4. Dome Without the Services of Three Regulars.

Scoring three goals late in the second half to tie the game at 3-3, Lake Shore football team defeated Dome on Saturday in the finals for the coveted Byrne Cup at South Porcupine. Lake Shore won the first game in Kirkland Lake a week ago Saturday 3-1 and copped the silverware with a score on the round of 6-4.

Dome, without the services of Willie Hampton and Fernie owing to injuries and with Cooper out of town, didn't show any of the dash and colour that carried them to the finals of the Dominion Cup in Winnipeg. On the day's play Lake Shore looked the better team and deserved to win by a wider margin.

Dome scored the only goal of the first period, Barnes blasting the ball past Souter on a penalty kick. Dome were first given a free kick on a hand ball by McMinn and it was only a second later that referee Pat Larmer awarded a penalty kick when Williams handled the ball inside the line. Barnes made no mistakes.

Lake Shore should have had several goals in the first half but erratic shooting robbed them of the opportunity. Syme was right in twice and kicked the ball over the top of the nets. Manuel did the same thing, with Houston also falling down on another close-in drive.

After cutting down the Lake Shore lead to one goal, Dome came out strong in the second half and only three minutes had elapsed when they tied the score, Chambers dribbling the ball past Souter after taking a pass from Willie White.

The clock stood at the twenty-seven minute mark when Jim Lone sent Dome into the lead on the round score when he scored on a pass from his brother, Henry Lone.

The goal seemed to jolt the Lake Shore club into action and in less than a minute they scored twice to take the lead again on total score. Syme broke through all alone to make a perfect job of the first counter and passed to Manuel for the second. He scored again with three minutes to go when Barnes and Baxter got into a mixup. Barnes stopped the ball and passed it back to Baxter, expecting that he would kick clear. Syme swooped in from nowhere and pounced on the ball for a soft goal. After Lake Shore regained the lead, Dome seemed to fade from the picture entirely and while they were still battling when the final whistle blew, Lake Shore were taking no chances of having their lead overtaken.

## Late Baseball Finals To End Warns President of E.O.B.A.

Temiskaming League Will Have to Declare Winner Not Later Than August 31, or Eastern Clubs Will Refuse To Come North For Championship Series, Says Eddie O'Meara.

Eddie O'Meara, of Ottawa, President of the E.O.B.A. served official warning last week in Kirkland Lake during the Lake Shore-Smith's Falls finals that in future Temiskaming League teams will have to declare a winner not later than August 31 if they hope to get eastern teams to come north for championship play-offs.

"The E.O.B.A. constitution is going to be enforced to the limit in future years so that there will be no baseball finals played in unseasonable weather," Mr. O'Meara declared. "The third week of September is too late for baseball in the north country and the present series was a financial flop with the Smith's Falls club taking it on the chin because of the delay in completing the Temiskaming league schedule.

"The constitution calls for all leagues to have a winner declared by August 31 and unless it is adhered to the success of the E.O.B.A. finals cannot be guaranteed. It costs too much money to bring a team north to have to depend on weather conditions. If the baseball fans are going to be given a break in the north country as well as in the east they should not be expected to look at the finals under unfavourable conditions," he continued.

"At the next annual meeting of the E.O.B.A. in Ottawa next April a hard and fast rule will be inserted in the club constitution which will guarantee all clubs protection on this point and will have to be a revision of the split in gate receipts so that part of the visiting team's expenses will be guaranteed, so as to identify them against total loss as in the present instance," said the president.

"Regardless of any contrary opinion, if the point I advocated along this line last year had been adopted there would have been no fiasco in 1937 and the visiting club this year would have been protected," he declared.

"While the 1938 series will be a failure financially it gives the association executive an opportunity to see baseball conditions first hand in the north country and the trip here is therefore useful from that standpoint. We hope to enlarge our territory next year so as to have an all-northern group and eventually play-off with the Ontario Baseball Association for the provincial championship. They are anxious to play this year but it looks as though weather conditions will not permit," said Mr. O'Meara.

"Both Secretary J. Hamilton Lowray and myself have enjoyed our stay in Kirkland Lake, which looks like a section of the Ottawa Valley with so many former residents of the Capital and district in residence here. We have been particularly impressed by the hospitality and courtesy shown to us by the officials of the Lake Shore and Wright-Hargreaves Mines and their athletic officials," he concluded.
