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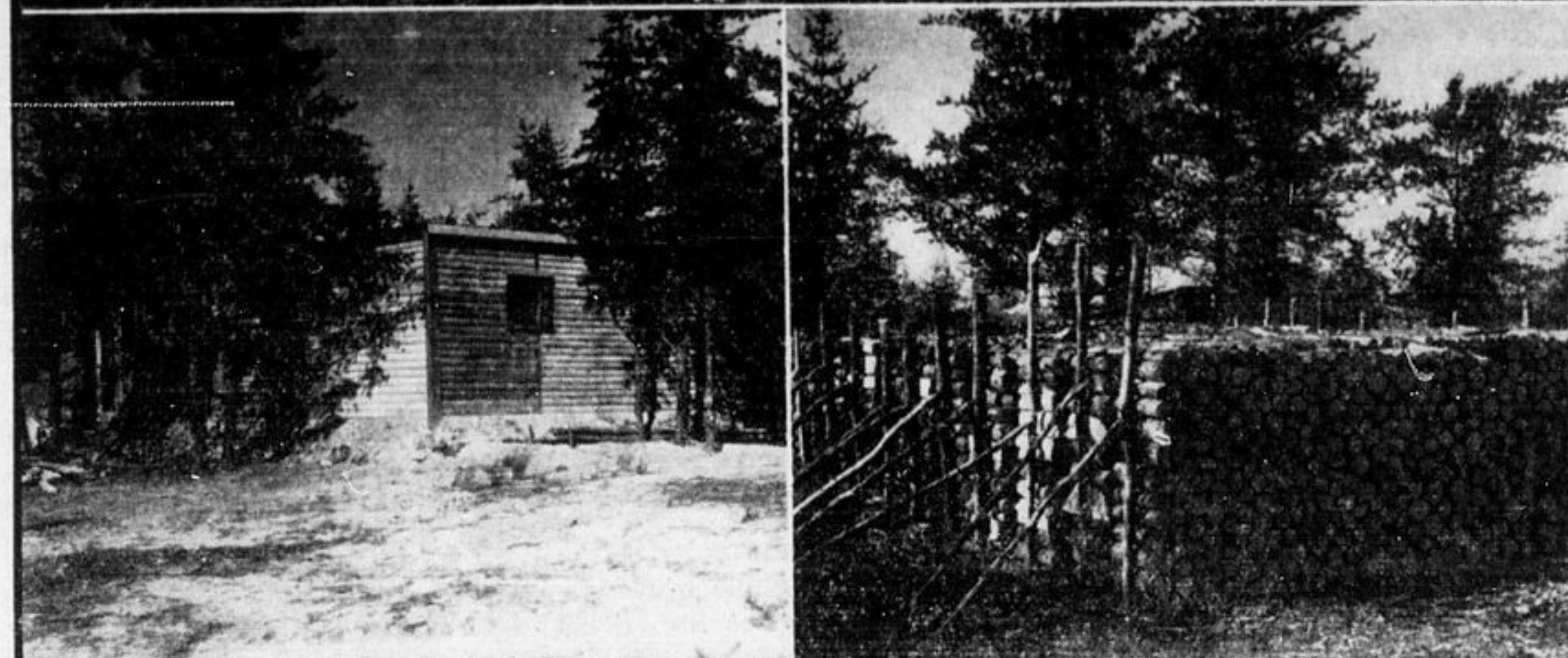

## SCENES AT TIMMINS' OWN "SHACK TOWN"



These are scenes from the "shack town" that is in existence on the outskirts of Timmins—at the property of the Empire God Mines. There are quite a number of houses erected. In Timmins it has been decided to open a class in Finnish language for English-speaking people who wish to learn the Finnish language. Several such requests have been made by English-speaking citizens of Timmins, and the Finnish language class opened on Monday at 11 a.m., 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. in Timmins Finnish United Manse, 20a Elm St. N., and will be continued every

### Says Prospectors Soon to Be Using Seismograph

Prospectors in Canada's north will soon be toting seismographs in their packsacks. The seismographical instruments originally developed to record and locate earthquakes are now being adapted for locating mineral deposits.  
Dr. John Patterson of dominion meteorological bureau at Toronto, expects a big increase in their use in Northern Ontario.  
Prospectors wishing to explore the mineral possibilities of new territory nowadays put a charge of dynamite as deeply as possible into the ground and station seismographs at a distance. When the charge is set off the instruments record the type of vibrations and their frequency. From these recordings experts are able to determine the type of soil or rock or underneath the surface. With increasingly accurate recording mechanisms the seismograph will be able to locate the richer ores all prospectors hope to strike.  
A seismograph may be designed for any specific purpose, he explained, such as to record the vibration caused by a train passing over a bridge. Analysis of vibrations is useful to engineers in every branch of construction.

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## Stiff Sentence Given For Reckless Driving

George Veino, Whose Car Struck Child Playing in Yard, Fined \$100 and Costs and Has Driver's License Suspended for Two Years. North Bay Man Gets Year for Stealing from Railway Cars.

Convicted on a charge of reckless driving, George Veino, of Timmins aged eighteen, was fined \$100 and costs and had his license to drive suspended for the next two years by Magistrate Atkinson in police court here Tuesday. Veino was the driver of a car that on the afternoon of Saturday, September 10, sideswiped a second vehicle on Wilson avenue and careened across the sidewalk into the yard at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Leppan, striking their 2½-year-old son. The little lad laid in hospital in a semi-conscious condition for days suffering from concussion of the brain. Hospital authorities report that his condition is now much improved and the little boy was able to be taken home Tuesday afternoon.

Charged with illegal possession of liquor, Mike Muhvich, 71 Balsam street south, was remanded for a week on bail of \$300.

**Drunks More Numerous**  
Eight drunks who had apparently "called at the bar" too often, all pleaded guilty to intoxication charges and with the exception of Harry O'Shaughnessy who took three months and costs with an alternative of thirty days.

**Traffic Charges**  
Edgar Pariseau and John Cybulski were fined \$10 and costs for operating motor cars with defective brakes, with Albert Vallee and Joe Renta donating a like assessment for speeding. Eight others were fined \$1 and costs for illegal parking. William Merinchuk, charged with drunk driving, was remanded for a week.

Dr. M. J. Kelly, who examined Veino at the request of police after the accident, told the court that while he would not swear that he was drunk, the accused was not in full possession of all his faculties.

Other evidence was produced showing that the brakes on the car were in good working order and the vehicle capable of being driven even after crashing into the verandah of the Leppan house.

Veino, in the course of his evidence, told the court that he lost control after striking a car on the street.

Magistrate Atkinson, in passing sentence announced a general increase in penalties and lengthy suspension of licenses in all charges of reckless driving, particularly in the cases of young boys where liquor is involved.

**Given Year at Hard Labour**  
Lawrence Vallinquette, who gave his home address as North Bay, pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking and entering T. & N. O. cars between Ramore and Matheson and was sentenced to one year in jail at hard labour. The charge was laid by S. Richardson, T. & N. O. constable stationed here.

**Remand Receiving Charges**  
Charges of receiving stolen goods against Julius Siskind, Hugh Pierce and William Pigeon, were adjourned for a week at the request of the Crown. Theft counts against Rene Lebrun and Henry Latour and three juveniles, in connection with the receiving cases, were also remanded for a week.

**Failing to Remain**  
Henry Timm, charged with failure to remain at the scene of an accident, was granted a week's adjournment. Timm is alleged to have struck a car parked on Commercial avenue last Friday night, causing damage estimated at \$150.

**Stealing—Beggings**  
William Perron, convicted of stealing a flashlight and socks from a local department store, was given thirty days in jail. Henry Savageau got the same medicine for begging. Fernand Timm, also charged with theft, had his case adjourned until next week.

### Timmins Man Met Storm in the States

Mr. Geo. Hogg Had Experience of Seeing Results of Hurricane.

Mr. Geo. Hogg, president of the Timmins Horticultural Society, returned last week from a holiday in the United States. He had been touring the country and having a most enjoyable time. Last week he was enjoying the notable beauty and interest of the Catskill mountains when the storm that did such havoc in the Eastern States hit the part of the country in which he was staying. Bridges were collapsing and tiers falling on the roads when he went to the Albany station, and the town was all flooded. The Hudson river was swollen until it was six feet higher than normal. When going to the depot there was two feet of water in the streets, with the cellars flooded and people busy pumping out the water. Before he left the power had been cut off for twenty-four hours. For twenty-four hours there was only canned food to eat, no water for drinking purposes and no power for cooking purposes. The trouble followed a terrific rain accompanied by so much wind that it might well be called a hurricane. A small creek in the Catskill mountains rose eight feet and washed out the bridge over it. The villages all along the mountains were all flooded. Mr. Hogg took a climb up one of the mountains and water was just rolling down to the valleys below taking all in its path. The roads and pathways were practically blocked with trees that had fallen. New York City was badly hit by this storm. The summer resorts on islands near the city were literally washed away. There was considerable interference with train service on account of the storm. While it was quite an experience to see the effects of the storm at close range, Mr. Hogg was glad to get away from the damaged country and reach a part of the country where the dry land deserved the name.

### Concert Association Not to Function This Season

Owing to the difficulty of securing a theatre for the concert events this season, and also because of the discouraging results in the drive this year, the Porcupine Canadian Concert Association has decided not to function this season. This was decided at a recent meeting of the executive of the Association. The Concert Association in the past three years has given the camp a notable service in providing concerts presented by outstanding Canadian artists at very small cost. Many will regret that this service will not be continued this year. A number have already paid the membership fees for the new season's concerts, the campaign for membership having been carried through several months ago. All thus who paid the fees will be able to secure a refund of the money, as there will be no concerts this year. All members of the association who have paid for the coming season are asked to call at the Canadian Bank of Commerce. On presentation of their season's ticket they will receive the return of their money.
