Wright-Hargreaves Drop Out Of Senior N.O.H.A. Company

Desertion of Imports and Inability of Manager Jess Spring to Fill Gaps, Forces Smart Kirkland Lake Team to Retire This Year. Lake Shore and Toburn Left.

The Wright-Hargreaves hockey team, always a threat in the old Mines League and the more recent Gold Belt League for the N.O.H.A. will not be there for the face-off in local puck wars this season.

The decision came after a meeting of the Wright-Hargreaves Mine Athletic Association, at which the members of the Association agreed to withdraw the black and white team from Gold Belt activities for the season.

Jess Spring, who took over control of the hockey squad last season, returned from the south after an unsuccessful attempt to sign up players to bolster a team weakened by the resignation of some imports in the past week or so.

Wright-Hargreaves has always been a name feared in both the old Mines League and in the Gold Belt Hockey League. In the inter-mine circuit the black and white teams won the silverware three seasons running. They took possession of the trophies and shield in 1933-34, did the trick again in 1934-35 and made it a "hat-trick"—three in a row in 1935-36.

Entering the Gold Belt in the fall of 1936 the Hargreaves crew was a little too weak to measure the strides of the Lake Shore, Tekima and McIntyre squads but, climaxed a year of upsets, Chuck Jemmett's charges defeated McIntyre in an important game to send Tekimas into the finals with Lake Shore.

Last season with the Teks out of the way it was a Lake Shore-Wright-Hargreaves natural battle all the way down the schedule. Jess Spring, serving his apprenticeship at the Hargreaves helm, guided his troop to the finals with Lake Shore. The Shores took the series two straight, by scores of 3-2 and 4-0, to win the Gold Belt championship and take possession of the Lorne Millar Trophy.

Join the Falcons
Since last spring players have been congregating at the mine but a few of those counted on for heavy duty this

season left and created gaps which proved hard to fill. Now Wright-Hargreaves joins the Falconbridge Falcons, the team which dropped from the Nickel Belt loop this spring, after the graduation of players to other climes.

With basketball also on the shelf, the association will be devoting its energies to inter-departmental games in the gym and on the rink.
