

Victim of Deadly Gas Coniaurum Miner Dies

Mike Butkovich, Experienced Machine Man, Succumbs After Climbing Into Stope Monday Night, Allegedly Before Compressed Air Was Turned on to Dispel Fumes.

Mike Butkovich, 38-year-old father of three children died of carbon monoxide poisoning Monday night at Coniaurum Mine a short time after climbing into a raise from the 1250-foot level.

Butkovich, an experienced machine man, who had been in the employ of the company for eight years, had just come on shift and went into the raise before the compressed air was turned on to dispel gas from a blast made by the afternoon shift, according to a statement to The Advance by Mine Manager John Redington. His partner was proceeding to connect the air line below when the unfortunate victim collapsed from the effects of the deadly fumes. At the time he had climbed a distance of sixty feet into the raise which was located above a covered roadway. Immediately sensing what had happened Butkovich's companion raised an alarm and six other men working on the same level were rushed to the scene. From the position in which the victim had collapsed, the rescue crew experienced some difficulty in getting the man out and bringing him to surface. By this time all signs of life had departed and he failed to revive despite continuous artificial respiration and administration of oxygen.

The Mine Manager emphatically denied a statement in a local daily that nine men had been "gassed." "The story is absurd," Mr. Redington declared. He admitted that several of the miners engaged in the rescue had been slightly affected by gas but none of the crew had required hospital attention.

An investigation of the accident has been made by Mines Inspector E. B. Weir and an inquest has been ordered at a date to be set. It is the invariable rule to hold an inquest in each death in any mine. Butkovich lived in Timmins at 159 Pine street north.

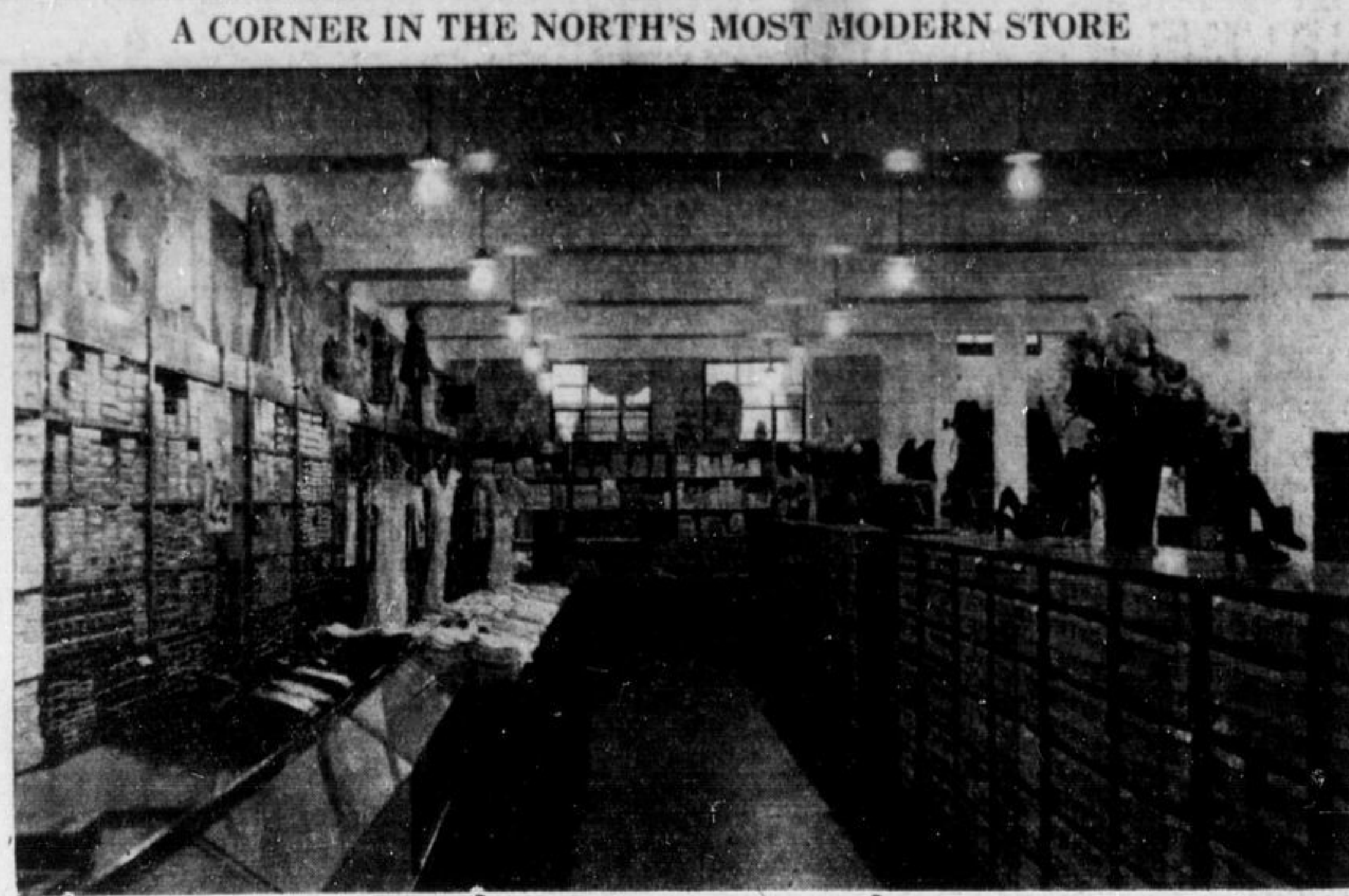
Pension Adjuster In Legion Address

Austin Neame, zone commander of this district, introduced Mr. Robinson in some very complimentary remarks, having known him for a great many years. Mr. Neame also outlined the work of the pension adjuster and was sure Mr. Robinson was filling the post to perfection.

Legion in general. "Some say," he said, "that the Canadian Legion is dying on its feet, let me answer this by saying that last year 88 new branches were granted charters in the Dominion and of these Ontario had the biggest of any province." Applications are received every day, but most are for "Club Privileges" under the L.C.A. and after careful investigation are turned down except in cases of special merit.

The speaker complimented the pension officer of the Timmins branch, W. A. Devine, for his fine work and assist-

ance. Swinging into the subject of Poppy Day he stated that it was essential that all work to make this year the largest in its history. Recent events have shown the citizens of Canada that the ex-servicemen are worthy of all consideration and support.

Bodies Of Two Men Not Found

No Trace Found of MacDonald or Wilson, Drowned in Watabeag Lake.

Despite eleven days of constant search, no trace has been found of the bodies of Charles MacDonald, of Timmins or I. Wilson, Ansonville public school principal, who drowned in Watabeag lake forty miles from Iroquois Falls a week ago last Sunday. An up-turned canoe bore mute evidence of the tragedy that had befallen the two men who were on a hunting trip. The only actual evidence of the double fatality to date is the finding of a cap believed to have been worn by one of the men. Provincial Constable George White, of Iroquois Falls is supervising the search and dragging operations. In view of the great depth of the lake and the cold water it is thought that the bodies may not come to the surface for a considerable time.

Pioneer of Kirkland Lake Dies in 88th Year

Morrisburg, Oct. 19.—Alfred Archambault, pioneer of Kirkland Lake district and veteran prospector, was buried in Morrisburg yesterday. He died Sunday at his home near Chrysler's Farm monument.

Alfred Archambault was born 88 years ago at St. Lin, Que., the birthplace of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. His father, Leon Archambault, was an intimate friend of the former prime minister. His mother was the former Apolline Locas.

The early part of the 20th century found him in Ontario's North Country, till prospecting. Later, he staked the Providence Gold Mine, which has since amalgamated with the Goodfish Gold Mines. His early prospecting companions were Harry Oakes and William H. Wright, and he knew the Kirkland Lake district when there was nothing there but a poor trail through the forest.

Mr. Archambault lived in Kirkland Lake for 28 years. From there he went to Ottawa, where he lived for seven years.

Early last spring he purchased the historic Casselman property near the Chrysler's Farm battlefield, four miles east of Morrisburg, and made his home there.
