China to Fight to **Ultimate Victory**

Chiang Kai-Shiek Gives Chinese Attitude.

A despatch from Chungking, China says: China will continue to fight until "ultimate victory" is won, General Chiang Kai-Sheik promised his people this week in a proclamation ascribing culars in writing of their claims togeth- abandonment of Hankow and Canton to military strategy.

The commander-in-chief, while declaring his armies were systematically drawing the enemy deeper into the interior, promised that Hankow's fall would prove the forerunner of Chinese -84-85-86 offensives along every front.

Says Retreat Planned

The provisional capital was abandoned according to plan and in complete order, Chiang contended. Chinese generals were said to be under instructions to lure the Japanese away from the coastal zones, where superior war supplies and equipment gave the invaders

Chiang held that the Chinese had not regarded Hankow as a decisive battleground, but merely as a stragetic field of operations to delay the Japanese with the greatest cost to the enemy while defence preparations were made farther to the West. This strategy had proved successful and the Japanese had suffered heavily before Chinese troops finally abandoned the city.

Canton lost all military value after the Canton-Hankow railway was cut. China's troops consequently evacuated the southern city and withdrew to positions farther inland, where the fate f the war is to be decided.

Final Result Important According to Chiang's proclamation the Chinese command is more interested in the final outcome of the conflict concerned-than over the defence or loss of particular cities. He declared: "Even at the outset of the war, the

Had he inquired he would have found that in addition to the 1,150 regular fire-ranging staff the department has for fire protection purposes the following: Fire pumps (power) 572; fire hose, 1,700,000 feet; fire pumps (hand), 2,500; motor boats, 39; motor trucks, 109; aircraft, 28; steel lookout towers, 117; wooden lookout towers, 89; permanent telephone lines, 4,100 miles; radio stations, 55; together with thousands of axes, shovels and other miscellaneous fire-fighting equipment.

"There are also several hundred buildings for the housing of personnel and equipment. During the last four years we have increased the staff by 200 men, 72 pumps and over half a million feet of hose; we have also added seven additional fire protection aeroplanes, some of which are equipped with two-way radio communication. We have added 34 steel towers, connected with various headquarters by telephone or radio, and considerable mileage of telephone lines.

"The government has also spent many millions of dollars in the construction of roads and highways throughout Northern Ontario, which is an added assistance in obtaining quick action when fires occur. This equipment has all been used to good advantage, as evidenced by the record in the Thunder Bay district, in which logging operations have been carried on more extensively than in any other part of the province.

"Reports show to date that, while they have had 177 fires, not more than 2,000 cords of pulpwood was lost, and private property only to the extent of a half-dozen telephone poles."
