

# Annual Meeting of Association to be This Saturday

## Says the Weight, Numbers, Counted Against Cobalters

"Timmins Retained Poupore Cup by Shellacking Silver Team 15-0," is the Way that Cobalt Sports Writer Headlined His Story of Last Week's Game Here.

Many here will be specially interested in the Cobalt review of Saturday's game with Timmins H. & V. S. rugby team. Here is the sparkling story as told in The Northern News on Tuesday:

Timmins, Nov. 1.—Timmins High and Vocational Schools regained possession of the Poupore Cup, emblematic of the Secondary Schools Rugby championship, here on Saturday afternoon, when they defeated Cobalt High School by a score of 15-0.

Cobalt put up a game fight, but they were outkicked, outnumbered, outweighed and outplayed. Outnumbered because at the Timmins School there are approximately five times the number of boys from which to pick a team, outkicked because two of their fumbles, recovered by Timmins on each occasion, resulted in the only two major scores of the game for the Timmins team, outweighed by just about 12 pounds per man, and that counts for a lot in this game of rugby, and outplayed through a combination of the three preceding "outs."

Cobalt were much better tacklers, and time after time their tackweight ends, neither of whom will scale more than 140 with lead in their shoes, floored their heavier opponents when they tried to come around the end. On one occasion young Lake, who is the Timmins team, with ten other young fellows, tried to come around the end and he went down so hard that he did not again essay the same feat, and his booting apparently suffered, also as a consequence.

**Quivillon Hurt**  
The game was a clean one, and was beautifully handled by Referee Young and Umpire Wright. Only one man was forced to retire through injuries and that was Quivillon, Cobalt backfielder, who went into the game with a shoulder all wrapped up and in a harness, only to receive a leg injury in the third quarter, but after treatment and a rest he came back again. When he

was off, however, Cobalt had a chance to score through a kick, and he was the only kicker that Cobalt had.

Lake's long distance hoofing was the feature of the Timmins attack, and his long boots continually set Cobalt back. His forward passing was also a feature, for he completed five all for substantial gains. Cobalt, on the other hand, did not have much luck with their aerial attack, on only one occasion, making any substantial gain, and that was in the last play of the half when a Stesco to Brunette forward placed the ball on the Timmins ten yard line.

But to get down to the point scoring. Cobalt kicked off and Timmins were forced to kick. Cobalt lost some yards on a fumble on an attempt around the end and were forced to kick. On an end run Timmins made twenty round the end. Everard carrying the ball, Lake kicked over the line and Brunette ran the ball out fifteen yards before being downed. Munro made a nice gain of 25 yards around the end and an exchange of punts followed. Then with the ball on the Cobalt twenty a fumble on a line play gave Timmins the ball and before Cobalt could get settled down again, the ball was over for a touch. McLellan making the final play. The extra point was added by Lake.

**Score Three Rouges**  
The second quarter was tight, hard football with neither teams making any substantial gains, but Lake's heavier booting put the ball over the Cobalt line on three occasions, it being run out each time. Finally, however, Lake drove one high and for a single.

The third quarter saw Cobalt backed up on their own end but holding on grimly and Timmins were not able to make any substantial gains. It also saw Lake attempt two placements, one from directly in front, twenty-five yards out and the other from the same distance at a slight range. Neither scored but both were good for single points.

In the last quarter, Cobalt had one

good chance to score when an outside kick was recovered on the Timmins 25, but they could make no headway and the kick for a single point went haywire. Then Timmins, via a forward pass and a line play worked the ball down and Lake kicked again. This time the kick was muffed and a Timmins man fell on the ball just two yards out, Baderski taking it across for a touch on the second attempt. The extra point was again made by Lake, and this ended the scoring.

One feature of the game was the fact that Cobalt did not draw a single yardage penalty, while Timmins, on the other hand were penalized considerably, on three occasions drawing fifteen yard setbacks.

The crowd was a fair one, and, believe it or not, the sympathy of many, especially the older ones, was with the Cobalt team.

### Hockey League Organized For Northwestern Quebec

(From Val d'Or-Lamaque News)  
The temporary committee of the proposed Northwest Quebec Hockey Association meets at the Pioneer Club in Malartic Sunday afternoon to complete a constitution which it will present the same day to an assembly of representatives of the Harricana Association, the Cadillac-Malartic League and the Noranda-Rouyn town league.

The temporary committee is made up of Al Kadwell, president of the Harricana Association, Fred Murray, of Perron, and Lorne Miller, Noranda representative, who is also ex-officio repre-

sentative of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association. Bert Ganter, Malartic, has been acting as secretary of the committee.

Plans were discussed recently at a meeting in Malartic of various clubs and associations in Northwest Quebec, for the inauguration of an inter-association play-off system which would include all the active clubs and leagues in the gold belt.

At that time it was tentatively decided that it would be possible for all the teams to abide by C.A.H.A. rulings with the exception of eligibility restrictions. The Noranda representative favoured adhering to the October registration date and the requirement of every player to hold an amateur card. But this was looked on as impractical by other clubs and it now appears that a play-off system may be worked out without these requisites.

If the play-offs are undertaken it will mean that the leagues will have to shorten their schedules to permit the longer championship series.

In the Harricana Association there will be four teams and possibly five, if Val d'Or, up to now doubtful, decides to enter a team.

In the Cadillac-Malartic league, there will be four teams with the possible addition of Thompson Cadillac. The Noranda-Rouyn league is made up of all local teams, but because of better ice facilities in that centre, a heav-

## Three Nominated for the President of the N. O. H. A.

President Previously Nominated by Acclamation. Annual Meeting of Northern Ontario Hockey Association to be Held on Saturday of This Week, Nov. 5th.

The following is the report of the N.O.H.A., as given by The North Bay Nugget:

### Annual Meeting N.O.H.A.

When delegates gather in North Bay Saturday afternoon of this week for the 28th annual meeting of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association, they will be faced with a rather complicated situation in regards to the election of officers:

### Three For President

Nominations closed Saturday and a statement released here by Secretary-Treasurer W. A. (Bill) Thompson reveals that three men have been named for president, that only one man has been nominated for vice-president and one official, Dr. H. C. Nash, Sudbury, has been put forward for three different posts.

Possibility that the association will have its first contest in history for the president's position looms up from the fact that Lorne Miller, Noranda, present incumbent, Dean Kester, Timmins, and Dr. Nash have all been nominated. Mr. Miller has not yet indicated whether he will seek a third term. The established custom has been for a president to serve two years and then retire, with the vice-president stepping up. Mr. Kester is vice-president now.

### Named For Three Posts

In addition to being nominated for president, Dr. Nash has also been named for vice-president and the executive. His is the only name put forward for vice-president and should he decide to seek this position he would win it by acclamation. The constitution stipulates that a man can be nominated only for one office. Therefore, should Dr. Nash stand for president, the vice-president's position would be thrown open for nomination from the floor. Dr. Nash, should he be defeated for presi-

dent, could then be nominated for vice-president, but in the event he was also beaten in this latter contest, then he would be without a seat on the board.

Complete nominations are: President—Lorne Miller, Noranda; Dean Kester, Timmins; and Dr. H. C. Nash, Sudbury.

Vice-president—Dr. H. C. Nash, Sudbury.  
Executive—Fred Quesnel, Timmins; H. J. Reynolds, North Bay; J. L. Fulton, Schumacher; Tom Marston, Kirkland Lake; Dr. H. C. Nash, Sudbury; M. B. Auger, New Liskeard; and William Johns, South Porcupine. (Three to be elected.)

Secretary-Treasurer—W. A. Thompson, North Bay. Mr. Thompson is re-elected by acclamation and is starting his 13th consecutive year as secretary-treasurer of the N.O.H.A.

The officers will seek the meeting's approval of a suggested change in the terms of affiliation with the O.H.A. It is suggested that Article 6, Clause B be amended to read as follows: "That in the said play-offs the O.H.A. juniors will play the N.O.H.A. juniors best two games out of three and that the O.H.A. senior winner will meet the N.O.H.A. senior winner best two games out of three. These junior and senior play-off arrangements may be changed to best three games out of five. This is to be left to the discretion of the executive and providing the clubs concerned are agreeable to the latter. And for these inter-association games two referees are to be appointed, one nominated by the N.O.H.A. and one nominated by the O.H.A." If the N.O.H.A. approves this change, it will be passed on to the O.H.A. for the latter body's consideration.

Purpose of the amendment is to wipe out the present ruling that forces the N.O.H.A. senior champions from meeting the O.H.A. intermediate winners before they are allowed to take on the O.H.A. senior representatives.

Notice has been filed to add to the N.O.H.A. constitution regulations, the residence deadline of August 1 for transfers within the association. It is already in practice as a result of a resolution passed at the last meeting.

It is also proposed that this article be added to the terms of affiliation between the N.O.H.A. and Nickel Belt Hockey League: "The N.O.H.A. or the Nickel Belt Hockey League may at their own discretion discontinue the terms of affiliation by filing notice in writing with the secretary of either body 30 days prior to the date the terms of affiliation are to be discontinued."
