Police Court

Two drunks paid \$10 and costs.

A speeder was fined \$10 and costs.

Two young lads were brought up on a charge of "being vagrants having no employment and no visible means of support."

Police Constable Graber testified that on Nov. 2nd in Schumacher around 2.30 a.m. he heard a crash in back of dry goods store. He saw these two lads, and found a broken window. One had held him a playful push from the other had crashed the glass.

The officer searched them and found one flashlight, two black eye-masks, a billfold, a new tie, and a sales book from a local bakery.

The boys were sentenced to 6 months each.

A case involving the theft of a car wrench and counter charge of radiator cap theft took up much of the court's time. Each person involved gave a reasonable statement and witnesses were called for both sides. Asked why he had not interviewed police regarding the theft, complainant made the statement "our police court is no collection agency."

Counsel for defence (Gardiner) wanted to bring other witnesses but Magistrate said:—"Sorry to chop you off, but there are other cases to be heard. Case dismissed."

BY-LAW NUMBER

Being a By-law for borrowing the sum of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00).

WHEREAS it is expedient to borrow, for the purpose of building and equipping new and adequate municipal offices in the Township of Tisdale, and new and adequate offices for the Police, Fire, Works and other departments conducted by the said municipal corporation, the sum of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00); and that is the amount of the debt intended to be created;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the said municipality according to the last revised assessment roll is Four Million, Three Hundred and Sixty-seven Thousand, Eight Hundred and Forty-five Dollars, (\$4,367,845.00);

AND WHEREAS the amount of the debenture debt of the corporation is Seven Hundred and Fifty-six Thousand, Two Hundred and Forty-two and Forty-one one hundredth dollars, (\$756,242.41), no part of the principal or interest of which is in arrear;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED BY THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF TISDALE, as a By-law thereof, as follows:

NOTICE (Copy of Proposed By-Law)

TAKE NOTICE that the foregoing is a true copy of a proposed By-Law of the Corporation of the Township of Tisdale, to be submitted to the votes of the electors at the same time and at the same places as the annual election for the Municipal Council, and the Deputy Returning Officers appointed to hold the said elections shall take the vote.

AND TAKE NOTICE FURTHER that the First day of December, A.D. 1938, at 4 o'clock in the afternoon at the Council Chambers in the said Municipality has been fixed for the appointment of persons to attend at the polling places and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk.

AND TAKE NOTICE FURTHER that if the assent of the electors is obtained to the said proposed By-Law it will be taken into consideration by the Municipal Council of the said Corporation at a meeting thereof to be held after the expiration of one month from the date of the first publication of this notice, and that such first publication was made on the 9th day of November, A.D. 1938.

AND TAKE NOTICE FURTHER that a tenant who desires to vote upon said proposed By-Law must deliver to the Clerk not later than the tenth day before the day appointed for taking the vote, a Declaration under the Canada Evidence Act, that he is a tenant whose lease extends for the time for which the debt or liability is to be created, or in which the money to be raised by the proposed By-Law is payable, or for at least twenty-one years, and that he has by the lease covenanted to pay all municipal taxes in respect of the property of which he is a tenant other than local improvement rates.

1. For the purpose mentioned in the preamble, there shall be borrowed on the credit of the corporation the sum of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00), and debentures shall be issued therefor in sums of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) each, bearing interest at the rate of Four and One-half Per Centum, (4½%) per annum, and having coupons attached thereto for the payment of interest.

2. The debentures shall all bear the same date and shall be issued within two (2) years after the passing of this By-Law, and may bear any date within such two-year period. The debentures shall be payable in Ten (10) annual instalments during the Ten (10) years next after the date when the same are issued; and the respective amounts of principal payable in each of the ten years during the currency of the debentures shall be such that the aggregate amount payable in each of the said years for principal and interest in respect of the said debt shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount so payable in each of the other nine years (9), of the said period, and the respective amounts of principal and interest and the aggregate thereof payable in each of the said ten (10) years during the currency of the debentures shall be as shown in schedule "A" hereto attached.

3. The debentures as to both principal and interest shall be payable at par at the principal office of the Imperial Bank of Canada in South Porcupine or in Toronto, in the Province of Ontario, Canada.

4. The debentures shall be signed and issued by the head of the Council or by some other person authorized by By-Law to sign and issue the same, and shall be signed by the Treasurer; and the interest coupons shall be signed by the Treasurer, and his signature to the said interest coupons may be written, stamped, lithographed or engraved.

5. During the currency of the debentures, namely, ten (10) years, there shall be raised annually by special rate on all the rateable property in the
