So It Happens In London Too

The Communist Party in London England issued a circular to their members in the London area urging all Party members to join the society before the quarterly meetings at which elections to the society's principal committees will take place. "Even if you do not normally spend a farthing, membership is valuable... to take Marxist education into the whole London labor movement."

Firstly, the cooperative movement is for economic & educational activity, not political. Political & religious neutrality is a principle of the Cooperative Union of Canada.

Secondly, to enter a cooperative buying organization, not intending to buy, but to subvert the principles of toleration which permit you to enter is self-centered anti social conduct not producing mutual trust.

Thirdly, The CONSUMERS COOPERATIVE SOCIETY LIMITED in Timmins was founded in protest against the same tactics. It happens in London too; we hope they are as successful in countering it as we were.

To Drive Team of Wolves Into U.S.A.

Joe Laflamme, Noted Wolf Tamer, to Give Boston a Thrill.

Many a doughty Puritan Father of old, long before the time of the famous "Boston Tea Party" heard the howl of hungry wolves as they howled around the stockades of the Bean Town during the long winter nights of pioneer days. But to the modern, Harvard-accented Bostonian, the howl of a wolf is a foreign sound and it is probably decades since the hair-raising "yip" of a tawny gray lupus has echoed down the streets of that staid metropolitan centre.

But whether they know it or not, Bostonians are to be treated to just such a sight and such sounds as Joe Laflamme, famed wolf tamer of Gogama, leads his team of 11 put-bred wolves into Boston, February 3, for the annual sportsman's show. From there they go to New York and into a swing through other cities where the show will be staged.

In Sudbury yesterday to secure a special permit from the department of game and fisheries to keep his wolves and exhibit them on tour, Joe Laflamme spun many a yarn of his wolf training and proudly proclaimed he would have something to show the Americans they had never seen before, because "every one is a real wolf. I only had a few wolves in the team when I visited New York before in 1926, but this time, they are all real wolves and will be trained to run in harness."

The famed wolf tamer told of the days spent training his 11 wolves at his Gogama home, and how he hoped to have a lead wolf so trained that even the noises of traffic in Boston and New York would not cause it to bolt or revert to its wilderness ways and run amok.

Wolves From All Over
"I got my wolves from all over this year," declared Joe as he digressed to recount the good points of each individual wolf. "There is 'Calgary'. I got her from out in Alberta, and is she ever a real wolf. I hope to make her the lead on the team. She is gentle, too, you can feed her right out of your hand. But not 'Wolf', the one I got from Prince Albert. He is all wolf, and likes to nip your fingers."

"I have a bunch of pups, too," continued the wolf tamer extraordinarily, "and they are getting big enough to take a little 'nip' out of one. They don't all grab, and pull away though, as most people imagine. Some will hang on like a bull-dog, as one of my boys found out. He went into the pen and one of the pups grabbed his leg. I had a hard job to make it let go."

The 11 wolves are kept in a heavy wire-fenced enclosure near the Laflamme home in Gogama, where they are his pride and joy.

"As soon as the freeze-up comes, I will get them into harness and start to break them in," said Joe. "I hope 'Calgary' will make a good lead because she is so gentle and will not get excited in the crowds when I take them to Boston."
