"I am desired by the Home Secretary to inform you that on Armistice Day, 1920, flags were half-masted until the conclusion of the Funeral Service for the Unknown Warrior, and in 1921 and 1922 flags were half-masted only during the Two Minutes' Silence, but since 1923 it has been the practice for flags on all Government buildings to be flown at full mast on November 11th. Armistice Day is regarded as a commemoration of a great occasion in the national history, not as a day of national mourning."

#### The Output of Platinum

Canada produced 259,228 ounces of platinum and allied metals in 1937. more than half the world output of 470,000 ounces for that year. The successful development of the coppernickel mines near Sudbury has been largely responsible for the increased Canadian production of metals of the platinum group, as the ores of these mines contain a notable amount of platinum metals and are the chief source of the Canadian output. A few ounces are also obtained from the rivers of British Columbia and small quantities are recovered as an impure B.C. Since 1934 Canada has been the residences. leader in the world's production, displacing Russia, which previously held in a metal container with water-tight first place. The other principal producers are Russia, South America (Colombia), and South Africa.


