

Magistrate E. R. Tucker Presents Flag to Legion

Cochrane, Nov. 9.—When the Cochrane branch of the Canadian Legion B.E.S.L. paraded to Memorial Park for the Armistice Day services here, they

will be headed with a new flag which has just been presented to the branch. The donor is Magistrate E. R. Tucker, an overseas veteran himself who has evinced a great interest in war veterans' associations, and as head of the Cochrane War Memorial Committee in

1935 brought to a most successful completion one of the finest war memorials in the North, in creating a beautiful park, bandstand and memorial cairn at Lake Commando here. He has again come forward to assist the Legion as chairman of the committee for arranging the services November 11.

The flag of blue and gold bears the Union Jack in the upper corner and on a golden band against the blue background, the name and number of the branch is shown. The fringed border and tassels are in gold and an extension pole and case are also included in the splendid flag outfit.

It is expected that a formal presentation and consecration service will be held at a later opportune date.

Kirkland Lake, Nov. 9.—Edward Labine, 35, an employee of the Wright-Hargreaves Gold Mine for the past ten years, was instantly killed at 3 o'clock on Tuesday on the 1,000-foot level of the mine while blasting.

The dead man was married and had three children. He had been a resident of the district for years.

No funeral arrangements have been made, and no date has been yet set for the inquest. The scene of the accident has not been disturbed, awaiting investigation by Mine Inspector P. Tower.

Should Flags be Flown at Half-Mast Armistice Day?

It is frequently asked whether flags should be half-masted on Armistice Day. Some appear to be under the impression that because the day is observed with remembrance particularly of those who died, flying the flag half-mast is a proper procedure. The same question has been raised in Britain, and the British Empire Service League was not content to give an opinion on the question. Instead, the matter was referred to the Home Office in London for a ruling. The following is the reply of the Home Office:

"I am desired by the Home Secretary to inform you that on Armistice Day, 1920, flags were half-masted until the conclusion of the Funeral Service for the Unknown Warrior, and in 1921 and 1922 flags were half-masted only during the Two Minutes' Silence, but since 1923 it has been the practice for flags on all Government buildings to be flown at full mast on November 11th. Armistice Day is regarded as a commemoration of a great occasion in the national history, not as a day of national mourning."

Mrs. Harold Wilson Schumacher, Dies

Took Ill on Eve of Intended Return to Schumacher.

Schumacher, Nov. 9.—(Special to The Advance)—The many friends of Mrs. Harold Wilson were sorry to hear of her death in a Montreal hospital. Deceased was a daughter of Mrs. Greer and the late Archie Greer, of North Clarendon, and was in her 26th year. She lived for six years here prior to moving to Shawville a few months ago. She and her husband decided to come back to Schumacher to live, and the sad feature was that the day she was due to arrive here her mother got word she was very ill. Her mother left at once by car and got there only a few hours before Mrs. Wilson died.

The funeral which was a very large one was held on Sunday afternoon. The service was conducted by the rector, the Rev. T. E. R. Nurse, at St. Paul's Church, Shawville. Interment was made in St. Paul's cemetery. She leaves to mourn, her husband and her mother, and four sisters.
