

# Stores in Keeping with the Modern Building Fronts

## Robert Simpson Have Handsome New Premises

Commodious and Well Equipped Quarters in the New Sky Building on Pine Street South. Modern Note Prevails in Store and Its Equipment and Arrangement.

A vitrolite front and the newest of lighting effects finish the new Robert Simpson Co. branch store in the Sky Block, Timmins. The front and the entire finishing of the store are of the most modern and up-to-date design, and Mr. Stull, manager of the branch office is very enthusiastic in his praise of the building.

A great deal of credit is due to Mr. Sky, said Mr. Stull in an interview with The Advance, in the artistic development of what he considers to be one of the finest buildings in the north country. The store, twenty-nine feet by one hundred and ten feet in depth, has a combined order office and main store. A complete life of furniture is beautifully displayed in appropriate setting in the main section of the store, several suits being arranged in the manner that they might be in the ordinary home.

The interior is handsomely finished, having the most-up-to-date lighting fixtures, artistically arranged in a cove ceiling. Both the walls and ceiling are finished in white plaster, and their pure colour directly flatters the gleaming hard-wood floors.

Large plate glass windows adorn the front of the store, and bear a lighting effect that does not cast a reflection, giving the passer-by correct vision at eye level. The Robert Simpson Co. may be plainly seen in black lettering on the prim-rose vitrolite, and the flame border adds a bright touch of colour that is very flattering to the exterior view of the store.

The long term lease that the Robert Simpson Co. has taken on this building, shows the faith they have in the North Country and especially in Timmins, where their sales are increasing each day. Mr. Stull, the local manager, is

especially competent in this work, having been employed in several worthy positions with the Robert Simpson Co. in the past years. ## Death of Pioneer of the North Land

Henry Cameron, Town Clerk of Latchford, Passes in Toronto.

Latchford, Nov. 9.—One of the oldest citizens of this section of Temiskaming in point of residence and a man widely-known throughout the district from his interest in municipal affairs, died in Toronto last week-end, when Henry Cameron, for two decades town clerk here, passed away in St. Michael's hospital. Mr. Cameron's health had not been good for the past three years and last month he underwent an operation. He appeared to be making progress, but late last week he suffered a relapse and death came Saturday morning.

Mr. Cameron was in his 59th year. He had made his home here for 34 years having come to Latchford in the first days of the Cobalt boom, and he had lived here since that time, with the exception of two years spent in Montreal. Born in Glasgow, Scotland, he had left the Old Country as a young man and, after spending some time in Southern Ontario at his trade of carpentry, came north. For 15 years he had been employed by A. J. Murphy, local lumberman, and for 20 years he had been clerk and treasurer of the municipality, an office he took over

Mr. Cameron is survived by his widow, three sons and five daughters. Of his sons, Robert is in Noranda and Donald in Kirkland Lake, while John is at home; the daughters are Mrs. Grant Eddy, in British Columbia, Mrs. William Neave and Mrs. Dalton Burns, of Latchford, Mrs. Albert Abbott, of Rouyn, and Miss Angeline, at home. Surviving also are Mr. Cameron's mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Cameron, who lives in Windsor, two brothers, Robert of Muldeck, and Donald in Windsor, and two sisters, Mrs. William Fleming of Sault Ste. Marie, and Mrs. Andrew Smith of Windsor.

The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon from his late home at Englehart, burial being made in Mount Pleasant cemetery at Haileybury. The body was taken from the home to the town hall at Latchford where Mr. Cameron many times had taken part

in municipal meetings. The public service at the town hall was conducted by Mr. Thomas Edwards, of New Liskeard, representing the Penitential Brethren, of which Mr. Cameron was a member. Members of the town council and many other citizens of the community were in attendance.
