New Sky Building is Credit to Architect

B. Kaminker, of Timmins, Has Built Fine Reputation in Short Time.

The completion of the new Sky building on Pine street south, the formal opening of which took place to-day, is of outstanding credit to the architect and construction superintendent, B. Kaminker, of Timmins. During his short residence in Timmins Mr. Kaminker has established for himself an enviable reputation in his chosen profession.

One of the younger school of architects, Mr. Kaminker entered the course of architecture in the faculty of applied science and engineering at the University of Toronto in 1926. In the year 1928 he won the Mathers and Haldenby prize for architectural design, graduating with honours in 1930.

At the completion of his studies, Mr. Kaminker spent considerable time gaining experience with different firms of architects. On the staff of Wickson and Gregg, he worked with them on the plans for the new Toronto Public Library on St. George Street, and with Raymond Collins on the plans and building of Western Sanatorium.

While in private practice in Toronto he planned and supervised construction of the Mount Sinai Hospital and built

the Helena Rubenstein cosmetic salon and factory.

Since coming to Timmins two years ago Mr. Kaminker has supervised erection of a number of buildings in the Porcupine, including the Korson Building, Schumacher, Bucovetzky Building, Sky Building, St. Catherine's Wine Company Building, the latter now under construction here, and a number of private dwellings, among them Dr. Magder's residence in Kirkland Lake, Mr. Sam Fishman's residence, Balsam street, Inspector Art Olson's residence, Patricia Boulevard and Mr. Jack Wilder's residence, South Porcupine.

All Should Unite To Make Canada Secure

Advice of Gerald O'Mera to B'nai B'rith Society at Kirkland Lake.

Matters pertaining to the continued welfare of our country, but little regarded by Canadians, were discussed by Gerald D. O'Mera with the members of the B'nai B'rith Society at the first of its regular monthly meetings of the winter season Wednesday.

The members of the Jewish Service Club were asked by the noted solicitor and former reeve of the township to think seriously of current world affairs and to unite with other races, creeds, and peoples, to "make this country, one secure country, a haven for us and our children."

He referred to the "crisis" just past in Europe, as he warned the club that measures of propaganda and communications did not leave Canada entirely safe from the danger of attack.

"We have seen in Europe totalitarian powers which have no regard for the rights of those who support them or the minorities. Things have come to a sorry pass when great and powerful nations such as Great Britain and France have been compelled to bow to the will of the tyrant, when we see the will of the tyrant, when we see the will of a man such as Hitler imposed on a peace-loving people," the speaker declared.

Were Too Complacent

Mr. O'Mera referred to the trip which he took to England two years ago. At that time he said he considered the English attitude too complacent. They have awakened to their danger now, he thought.

Bringing the discussion of world problems near home, Mr. O'Mera told the members of the club that the race to which they belonged had been singled out for oppression.

"There have been oppressors who pushed out their frontiers, we have seen conquerors before," he said, naming Napoleon as one. "But there has never been one such as Hitler."

"He's our Nero's Nero," Mr. O'Mera declared. "We have to go far back to early history to find any parallel to actions such as his."

"In countries like Germany, civilization has become only a by-word. His actions have become a danger to the whole world," he continued.

Swastika Over Andes

The speaker referred to the problem which United States, and ourselves were facing in the "Swastika over the Andes." The United States had begun serious measures to stop the flow of Nazi propaganda in South American countries in the past few months.

Showing why Canada could no longer depend on the protection of those natural barriers, the Atlantic and Pacific Ocean for defence, Mr. O'Mera recalled the flights of a German bombing plane to New York not many weeks ago in the short time of 11 hours. In addition to that, the flight of the Russian fliers from Moscow to Los Angeles was another demonstration of how modern science had annihilated space.

"Those who refused to recognize the possibility of an attack by a foreign country on Canada were scorned by the speaker's words. He claimed there were many dictators who

looked upon Canada's spacious wheat fields and mineral resources with rapacious eyes, and pointed out the dangers of a country as sparsely populated as ours is ignoring the danger of such rapacious glances.

"Such action by other countries comes within the realms of possibility," Mr. O'Mera declared.

The speaker went on to demonstrate how such action had been carried on in other countries which fell under Hitler's coveting glance. First, he said, certain elements were injected into the countries, and minor incidents were encouraged which were magnified by Germany. Then the conqueror marched in to protect the rights of these oppressed people who had been stirring up the trouble.

"What we require is unity," was his declaration. He rapped the excessive provincialism and nationalism which is found in some parts of Canada, referring specially to the actions of one large body in the west who actually went as far as to enquire into the means and ways of secession from Canada.

"To achieve the nationhood which is her destiny, she must have unity," said Mr. O'Mera as he asked members of the B'nai B'rith to do their part in wiping out the antagonism which can be seen in different parts of the country.

"Let all classes, creeds and parts of this country consider themselves as one nation."
