

Dr. S. L. Honey Contesting Mayoralty

Two Running for Mayor Seventeen for Council

Dr. S. L. Honey in the Field Against Mayor J. P. Bartleman. Record Number of Candidates for the Six Seats at the Council Board. School Trustees by Acclamation.

There are two candidates for mayor and seventeen for councillors at the municipal election to be held on Monday of next week, Dec. 5th. At the nominations on Friday there were three nominated for the mayor's chair—J. P. Bartleman, the present mayor; Emil Brunette, councillor, and Dr. S. L. Honey, a former member of the council. Mayor Bartleman qualified before noon on Saturday. Councillor Brunette qualified for councillor in the noon hour and thus made it plain that he was not this year a candidate for the mayoralty. For a time some feared that the present mayor might be given an acclamation, as Dr. Honey had not definitely stated his intentions, though pressed by wide circles of friends to stand. Shortly after 8.30 p.m., Dr. Honey appeared at the town hall and qualified for the contest.

As will be seen from the list published elsewhere in this issue, there were thirty-four nominations for the six seats of the council board. Exactly half of the number qualified, and their names will appear on the ballot papers on Monday. The following are the candidates, in alphabetical order:

Narrowly Escapes Collision with Locomotive on Crossing on Wilson Avenue. Forced into Ditch.

Paul Lajeunesse had a narrow escape from death on Saturday afternoon when he was forced to take the ditch to avoid being struck by a switching engine which was crossing Wilson Ave. Lajeunesse was driving east on Wilson Ave. up from the river. He apparently did not see the locomotive until almost on top of it. He then was forced to swerve violently to avoid striking the engine. His car slewed off the road into the ditch and almost into Leblanc's Garage—appropriately enough.

Lajeunesse was not injured although the automobile was slightly damaged. He will face a charge of being drunk in charge of a car in police court tomorrow. The automobile was not owned by Lajeunesse but by a friend.

Burned When Tank Explodes

Kai Mansa Badly Burned About Face and Head When Acetylene Tank Explodes in Viking Electric Shop.

When an acetylene tank exploded in the Viking Electric shop on Saturday afternoon, Kai Mansa was badly burned about the face and hands.

The tank blew out at the top where most of the valves and regulators were. Mansa took part of the blast on his head. His hair was all burned off and his face and head badly scorched. When he threw his hands up to protect his face they were burned. He was immediately rushed to the hospital. He is recovering this morning.

On Thursday morning a call was received from 52 Mutual avenue south. The fire department responded. Cause of the minor fire was overheated pipes. At 11.20 on Friday at 117 Hollinger Lane, fire did damage amounting to about \$25. Cause of the fire was that the chimney was built around a joist in the house.

On Sunday there was a chimney fire at 161 Birch street south. Damage was small.

Fourteen Candidates for Township Council

Reeve Victor H. Evans Re-elected by Acclamation for Tisdale for 1939. Eleven Candidates Qualify for the Four Seats on the Township Council.

South Porcupine, Nov. 26.—(Special to The Advance)—Of the fourteen nominated for the Township of Tisdale council for 1939, eleven have signified their intention of contesting the four seats by qualifying on Saturday.

Victor H. Evans, reeve of Tisdale for 1938, will be reeve for 1939 also, his name being the only one submitted at the nomination meeting here on Friday last. He was declared elected by acclamation, an honour won by able and earnest service this year, and by the co-operation he won from the members of council and from the people in general.

Find Serig Slugged by Brosnans and Labreche

Convicted by Jury at Cochrane, Judge Sentences Brosnan to Two Years, His Wife to Fifteen Months and Labreche to Eighteen Months. Describe Woman as "Leading Spirit."

Convicted at the General Assizes of the Peace in Cochrane on Friday, of slugging John Serig with the intention of robbing him, Dan Brosnan and his wife, and Percy Labreche, were each given jail terms. Brosnan was sentenced to two years in Kingston Penitentiary, his wife Irene to fifteen months in the Ontario Reformatory and Percy Labreche to eighteen months in the same institution.

The jury deliberated for only ten minutes before returning a verdict of guilty. After the jury's decision, Brosnan made an eloquent plea, asking suspended sentence for his wife. His plea was disregarded by Judge Caron who described her as the "leading spirit" in the slugging.

The evidence was all in by four o'clock on Wednesday and on Thursday counsels made their argument. T. W. Lieberman, Timmins barrister, acted for the Brosnans.

Serig, who works at Paymaster, said that he first saw Mrs. Brosnan on October 26 in a Timmins beverage room. She asked him for a bottle of beer and then asked him to go with her. They took a car to the home of Pearl King, at 171 Pine St. S.

On arriving Mrs. Brosnan said she needed \$3. Serig gave her \$4. She went out and when she returned he asked her for his change. She asked him to come outside with her. He did so and as he did so Dan Brosnan struck him over the head with a piece of iron or steel. After hitting him Brosnan went through his pockets.

Mrs. Mary Brown testified that the Brosnans lived with her. She gave them a room and bed, rent free, she said. The three accused came to her house around 5.45 p.m. They were drinking wine. They left about 8.30 o'clock. The two men came in around midnight and Mrs. Brosnan arrived shortly after.

Timmins hockey fans have long been held in suspense over the situation of the Timmins Arena. For a long while it has been doubtful that the rink would open this season. Had it not, the Timmins hockey team would have been in a tough spot, having no place to practice and play home games.

It is reported definitely today, however, that the arena will be opened. It will be operated this winter under the direction of a group of local business men who have leased it from the owners.

Recently Fire Chief Alex Borland, acting under instructions from the Ontario Fire Marshall's Office, issued a Fire Marshall's Order on the manager of the Arena demanding that certain improvements be made to bring the building under the fire laws. Improvements were to centre mainly about the dressing rooms.

Word was received today just prior to going to press that the necessary changes will be made. Thus, complying with the fire laws, the management of the Arena will be able to open for business.

Buffalo-Ankerite and Hollinger hockey teams will play their home games in Timmins. Flooding operations have begun on the playing surface already.

Iroquois Falls to Have Election Battle

Two for Mayor and Nine for Council.

Iroquois Falls, Nov. 28.—There will be an election here this year. Three were nominated for mayor—the present mayor, T. J. Hogg, G. L. Cameron, ex-mayor, and W. Staples. The latter is standing for the council, leaving the battle between the mayor and former mayor.
