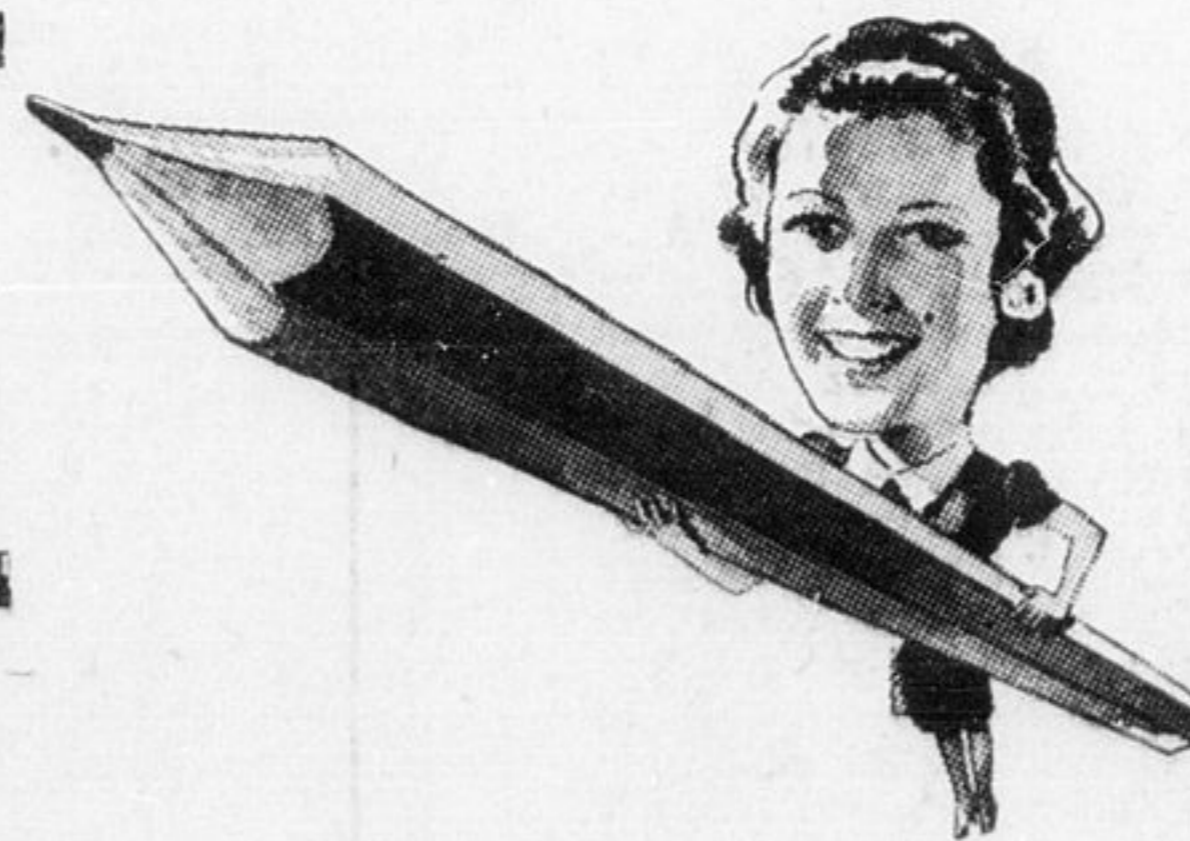

Important Reports at Meeting of the Legion

Chairman of Various Committees Pay Much Attention to Their Work. Legion Hall to be Available for C. A. S. Telephone Bridge. Preparations Completed for Election of Officers.

One of the largest attendances of the fall season was chalked up on Monday at the general meeting of the Canadian Legion Branch 88. With Walter Greaves, president, in the chair the meeting got under way with the solemn ceremony of "honouring those who sleep."

Minutes were read and passed without discussion and three comrades took the initiation and became members of the organization. Correspondence was of a varied nature and was placed on file.

Reports of committees—Sick, reported by L. Mason, showed several members on list, but none seriously ill. T. Harris, Schumacher, reported on his territory only one, of long standing, still being indisposed. Entertainment—Geo. Nippers, told of forthcoming events. Smoker Saturday, Dec. 3rd, Bill Dacton, chairman, with a long list of surprises. A. Bellamy, secretary, in his report showed that for the three months the committee had turned in over \$100 to the branch treasurer from its activities. Mention was made of stogie in Oddfellow's Hall, Saturday Dec. 17th, and all comrades were urged to make a drive on the Christmas Cheer tickets. Poppy Committee—A. Neame made this report. This has already been published in The Advance. He wished the branch to express its thanks to the ladies for their great work. This was carried through. Pensions—W. A. Devine reported. Since last meeting one W.V.A. had been granted and one pension increase of 10 per cent. been secured through his work.

General business did not cause much discussion. It was decided that the Legion hall be available for the C.A.S. telephone bridge party and it is ex-

pected that a number of tables will be made up by members. All bridge players were asked to give this their fullest support.

Details of the coming election for branch officers were outlined. Those wishing to stand for election this year must have qualifications in by tonight and ballots must be in post office for secretary's collection by Monday evening, December 16th. Ballots to be counted at general meeting that date. An election committee was appointed. A full list of candidates will be published in Monday's Advance.

Austin Neame, zone commander, presented a meritorious badge to W. Nicolson, late secretary of Matheson branch (but now of Timmins), for his untiring work in the organizing and maintaining of the branch there. The presentation was made on behalf of the Matheson branch. W. Nicolson in reply to the address of A. Neame, said he would write them his thanks, but was ready to assist the Timmins branch should the members ask him for any duty.

A review of the provincial command meeting in Toronto was also given by A. Neame.

Bellamy, active secretary of entertainment committee, and long-time worker of the branch; Jack Farrar, official standard-bearer and an original member of the branch. 182 Have Attended at Finnish Classes

Successful Free Classes in English by Finnish United Church.

The fall term of the free English language school for Finnish-speaking adults of the Porcupine camp ended in Timmins Monday, Nov. 28. The South Porcupine school will hold its last session of the fall term next Tuesday, Dec. 6. These classes in English language, conducted by Rev. A. I. Heinen, under auspices of the educational activities of the Finnish United Church at South Porcupine and Timmins, during the past two years and a half have been a great success. In all a total of 182 different persons have attended the school. Of these 96 persons attended the classes held in Timmins and 86 persons in South Porcupine. The school in Timmins has been held every Monday and Thursday at 10:30 a.m. and 2 p.m. in the Finnish United Church Manse, and from 7 to 9 p.m. in the church building. The school in South Porcupine has been conducted in the high school building every Tuesday from 7 to 9 p.m. In addition to the old pupils, many of whom have attended the school during the previous years, eight new pupils registered during this fall term in Timmins, and twenty-three new pupils in South Porcupine. Several of the old pupils have not missed one session of the school during the past two years and a half.

The spring term of this school will open about the middle of January. In

addition to the five classes now taught, a new class for beginners will be opened both in Timmins and South Porcupine.

O.H.A. Refuses Direct Play- Off Plan of Northern Ontario

Concede Appointment of North-South Play-off Officials by Joint Executives. Insert Six Months Notice Clause in O.H.A. and North Affiliation.

Northern Ontario Hockey Association senior winners will have to meet Ontario Hockey Association Senior "B" winners this year before they can advance into the Allan Cup playdowns.

Attending the O.H.A. meeting in Toronto recently, Northern delegates, which included Dean Kester, of Timmins, President of the N.O.H.A., Lorne Miller, Noranda, and W. A. Thompson, North Bay, secretary, made application for a direct play-off between north and the south. Their application was refused.

Northern plans were to have Senior "A" and "B" winners play off in O.H.A. territory before meeting the Northern Ontario winners. A two-out-of-three series will decide the winners of the O.H.A. "B" and the Northern champs. It was decided to carry the same system into junior hockey. The O.H.A. had intended introducing a resolution giving them full power over the choice of officials for these games but it was decided that the executives of the O.H.A. and the N.O.H.A. would jointly choose referees.

Affiliation between the O.H.A. and the Northern Ontario Hockey Association continued with addition of a clause requiring six months' notice by either party in case of dissolution.

Teams competing in the intermediate "A" division of the Ontario Hockey Association this season will do so with the knowledge the winner may not play

for the Allan Cup—emblem of national senior supremacy. The meeting here Saturday rescinded the privilege of the intermediate "A" champions to enter the senior playdowns because of lack of time.

The rule changes included a clause that penalty shots will be called against goalkeepers instead of minor penalties. Frank Farrell, of Niagara Falls, argued to no avail that this might tend towards abuses by netminders, such as tripping of opposing players.

Seniors Bring Revenue

A "waiver" system was adopted whereby a player, whose place of residence had no team, did not have to play with the O.H.A. club nearest his residence, as in former years. By the new ruling, a player may perform with any club in the district providing clubs nearer his place of residence waive claims to his services. The waivers must be renewed annually.

Dean Kester was appointed to the executive of the O.H.A. It is usual to appoint the N.O.H.A. president or member of the O.H.A. executive.

Treasurer George S. Dudley, of Midland reported a profit of \$1,107 on the year's operations, leaving the association with a cash in the bank of \$4,105 and \$8,000 in bonds. He pointed out the largest source of revenue was from the senior "A" series and from that division's playdowns.
