Police Court News

Five dollars and costs was the fine imposed by Magistrate Atkinson on a car driver who did not carry his driver's license.

A drunk paid \$10 and costs.

The charge of theft of 10 cords of wood was preferred by one local resident against another. The contract given a wood cutter to cut wood and truck it to the owner's yard at a set price, from the bush, was gone into. Ten cords more had been paid for than delivered—and discovered afterwards to have been sold.

The magistrate after hearing witnesses for both sides dismissed the case, recommended that complainant take it to Division Court.

A case of defective brakes on a car brought out the following story. A collision between two Ford cars on Golden Ave. caused the constable—called to the scene—to try out the car involved, and he found the brakes



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workable. The car was taken to a local garage and repairs ordered, and the charge laid. The man's story was that he was coming from Connaught into Timmins for medical advice. At Hoyle, when stopping for gas, he found his brakes were ineffective. He got another man to drive the car slowly in and the accident occurred. He was quite honest about the brakes when the constable examined the car. Counsel for defence was asked by his worship what defence he could offer for having a car with defective brakes on the road—and where in the Traffic Act could he find that he could drive such a car on the highway? Counsel was forced to acknowledge there was no defence. The magistrate congratulated the defendant on his honest evidence. "It's such a shock when anybody tells me the truth," said his worship, "that it takes me a month to get my nerves in shape again!"

However, the minimum fine of \$10 and costs was inflicted against the car owner, and under a "reckless driving" charge the driver was fined \$20 and costs, and his license suspended for 30 days.

Northern Veterans to Hold Re-Union

Likely to Have Re-Union at Kirkland Lake This Summer.

Tisdale Supports Sudbury Road Plan

Other Business at Meeting of Township Council.

South Porcupine, Dec. 1st. Special to The Advance)

A regular council meeting was held on Monday in the council chambers with Reeve and all Council members present.

After correspondence was read and dealt with—a lady interviewed Council regarding taxes, the matter was left in abeyance.

No relief was granted to an applicant and council registered a protest to the Workmen's Compensation Board regarding its decision concerning a township resident who was hurt some time ago at a Red Lake mine.

A grant of \$200 (as last year) was made toward a skating rink for S. S. No. 2.

The following resolution was passed: "This Council endorses strongly the action of the Sudbury City Council in urging the construction of a direct road between Timmins and Sudbury. That work on the proposed road be commenced immediately since a complete survey had already been completed." The construction of the road would assist in relieving the unemployment situation during the winter months.

A letter received from the Domes Mines concerning a sidewalk to be also used for bicycles, on the Dome Rd. offered co-operation for construction of same, using crushed rock as a sub-base. This offer was accepted and referred to 1939 Council for immediate action.

The Engineer was instructed to bring in a statement on the road South of town, and Councillor Fairhurst is to see the Government representative re same.

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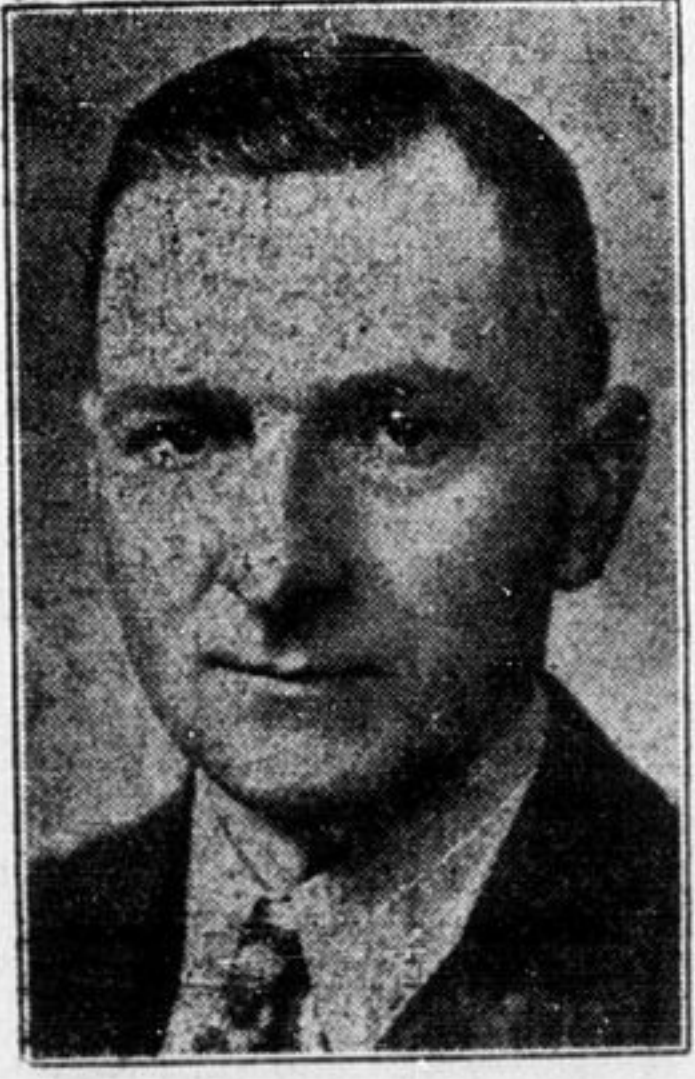
