Sketches of Candidates in Municipal Election

Brief Biographical Notes on the Various Candidates for Municipal Honours This Year. Review of Each Candidate, So That the Voters May Know Them Better.

For the interest and information of the electors The Advance has prepared brief biographical outlines of the various candidates who are running for municipal office in the election which will take place on Monday.

There are two aspiring to be Mayor in 1939—the present Mayor J. P. Bartleman and Dr. Lee Honey. Seventeen are running for Council. Following are thumbnail sketches of the candidates.

FOR MAYOR

James P. Bartleman

Has been Mayor of Timmins for the past three years and in municipal life here for five. . . . Was elected to Council in 1934 and re-elected in 1935. . . . Ran under the Conservative banner for the Provincial legislature in 1937 but was defeated by Charles Gallagher, the present member. . . . Is an old timer in the camp. . . . Came from Kelso before the railway was built. . . . Has large real estate holdings in Timmins. . . . Was in the insurance business here for many years but sold out after he entered municipal life. . . . For years acted as a manufacturer's agent for mine supplies. . . . Is a member of the Sons of England. . . . Married. . . . No family.

Dr. Lee Honey

First recollection is fishing beside a little stream north of the Town of Mitchell, in Perth County, Ontario. . . . Moved to Port Perry when fourteen. . . . Worked for a year in each province west of Father and mother still live there. . . . of Quebec to gain general merchandizing experience. . . . Enlisted with the Winnipeg Light Infantry in 1915. . . . Served overseas as Sergeant Instructor and soldier in the line. . . . Commissioned with the 44th Battalion of Winnipeg Infantry on the field. . . . Entered dental college with his younger brother in 1919, after the Armistice. . . . Thereby followed a family tradition there being eight dentists in two generations of Honey. . . . Financed self through college by various methods, one of them being a summer spent underground in the Dame Mine where he mucked and

nipped steel. . . . Came to Timmins in 1923. . . . Has served four years on the Town Council and is active and well versed in municipal affairs. . . . Married a nursing sister who was overseas from Lindsay. . . . Has two children, Barbara, 13, and Donald 10.

FOR COUNCIL

Emil Brunette

Well known in Timmins and district, Emil Brunette has been in Timmins for more than eighteen years. . . . Came here from his birthplace, River Joseph, Quebec. . . . Worked in the Hollinger and in the bush before starting in the taxi business which now is operated by his brother. . . . Was one of the Town's leading automobile dealers before leaving this line of business. . . . Is an agent with a brewing company. . . . This year was top salesman in Ontario for the Canadian Brewers' Association. . . . Received a trip to Europe as a prize.

Has been a member of Council for the past three years. . . . Was nominated for Mayor this year but did not qualify. . . . Is a director of the French Club. . . . Was one of the candidates endorsed by that body this year. . . . Is a member of the Lions Club and the Knights of Columbus. . . . Attends St. Anthony's Church. Favourite pastime is attending to his model farm in Quebec. . . . Is married and has two children.

William Roberts

"Bill" Roberts is running for Council for the second time. . . . Came to Timmins in 1923. . . . Is a shift boss at the Hollinger. . . . Went overseas when he was sixteen years of age with the Royal Welsh Fusiliers. . . . Born in Bridgend, Wales, near the place from where Tommy Farr, the famous Welsh scrapper originated. . . . A member of the local I.O.O.F. lodge. . . . Attends the United Church. . . . Is married and has one child. . . . Mrs. Roberts is well known in Timmins for her musical ability.

Paul-Emile Piche

Running for his second term as Councillor. . . . Has had his candidature endorsed by Le Cercle Francais Canadien. . . . Has been in Timmins since 1919 and in charge of mill office at the Hollinger for the past ten years. . . . Previously worked in the mill in Hollinger. . . . A Liberal in politics and member of the local Liberal Association. . . . Is married and has two children. . . . A prominent member of the French Club and a Director of St. John the Baptist Society. . . . Attends St. Anthony's Church.

Born in St. Agathe Des Monts, Quebec. . . . Attended school here and is a graduate of the Timmins Business College.

William W. White

Twenty-four years ago Mr. White came to Timmins as a member of the Hollinger electrical staff. . . . Still holds a position on the Hollinger staff. . . . A married man, Mr. White has one son, William A. White, a man of twenty-three years who also is in the camp. . . . One of the original members of the Timmins curling club and still a devotee of the stone and broom. . . . An ardent bowler in the summer and a member of the St. Matthews Bowling Club. . . . Is running for Council, not because he wants to particularly, but because he feels it is the duty of every citizen worthy of the name to do so if he feels he can contribute something to his municipality.

J. V. Bonhomme

Although in close touch with municipal affairs, J. V. Bonhomme is making his first bid for office. . . . Born in Papineauville, Quebec, thirty-six years ago he was educated in St. Alexandre College, Quebec. . . . Also completed a business course at La Salle Academy, Ottawa. . . . Has been in the camp ten years and is proprietor of an insurance business here. . . . Was for some years manager of his father's insurance business. . . . His nomination has been endorsed by the French Club. . . . Is a director of the St. John the Baptist Society and also a director of the French newspaper, La Voix Populaire. . . . Vice-president of the Lady Laurier Hotel Company. . . . Has an interest in the new Cartier Theatre.

Henry F. MacNamara

The Advance was unable to get in touch with Mr. MacNamara before going to press but learned from a reliable

source that he was born in Sydenham in the Ottawa Valley. . . . Been in Timmins about ten years. . . . Is in the contracting business. . . . Before going into business for himself he worked with Hill-Clark-Francis. . . . Is making his first bid for a seat on the Council. . . . Is married man with family.

J. W. Spooner

One of the youngest candidates for a seat on the Council, J. W. Spooner, twenty-eight years of age, was born in Massey, Ontario. . . . He had been seven years in the camp. . . . During that time has been engaged in the insurance and real estate business. . . . Before coming to Timmins he lived in Halleybury, where he worked in the Royal Bank. . . . Is a married man with two children, a boy of eight and a girl of two years. . . . Secretary of the Cochrane Riding District Liberal Association. . . . Attends the Church of the Nativity and is a Knight of Columbus. . . . Is president of the Timmins Life Underwriters' Association.

Peter Lacroix

Born in St. Grace, Quebec, Peter Lacroix is making his second bid for a seat on the municipal Council. . . . He ran in 1935 and polled a large vote, although he was not elected. . . . One of the camp's pioneers, he came here in 1910 and was placed in charge of the

Hollinger bunk house. . . . He has been in the hotel business for many years. . . . Was interested in the Lady Laurier Hotel, where he was manager. . . . Attends St. Anthony's Church and is an active member of the French Club. . . . Is married. . . . Mr. and Mrs. Lacroix have one daughter, and in addition, have adopted several children and given them a good start in life.

Len Cousins

Is making a bid for re-entry into municipal life after an absence of a year. . . . First elected to the Town Council in 1936 and re-elected in 1937, he ran for Mayor in 1938, and was defeated in a four-cornered contest. . . . During the time he was on the Council, as Chairman of the Public Works Committee he was instrumental in having many of the old wooden sidewalks replaced with composition ones. . . . He also was largely instrumental in introducing mail delivery to Timmins. . . . He was Chairman of the Police Committee in 1938 and took a very active interest in the T.P.A.A.A. Born in London, England, he came to the north many years ago. . . . When the first mill was started at the Hollinger in 1912 he was in charge of solution. . . . He had been operator in the Buaflo Mine, Cobalt for three years prior to that time. . . . Attended the coronation of King George V in London in 1911, and when the boat stopped at Le Havre on the return trip, Mr. Cousins learned of the great fire in the Porcupine camp—his future home. . . . A Liberal in politics, Mr. Cousins holds office in the local Liberal Association. . . . He is a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Sons of England. . . . Attends the Church of England. . . . Married. . . . Has two children.

Arthur Tessier

Born in Calumet, Quebec, Arthur Tessier spent his time in Montreal before coming to Timmins eight years ago. . . . There he did insurance and general office work. . . . Since arriving in the camp he has worked in the mines. . . . Was educated in the Montreal Seminary and Laval College. . . . Is Vice-president of the McIntyre Union of Mine Workers, local No. 274. . . . Was a member of the delegation which went to Toronto to interview the Department of Labour with reference to holidays with pay for miners. . . . Attends Notre Dame des Lourdes

Born in Plymouth, Devonshire, in 1908. . . . Entered the British General Post Office as a messenger boy in 1921. . . . Became postman. . . . Qualified as an assenting clerk and telegraphist. . . . Was Assistant Secretary of the Union of Postal Workers. . . . Resigned and came to Canada. . . . Is President of the Porcupine Trades and Labour Council. . . . Is married and has one child.

Tom McNeil

President of Local 241 of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers' Union, Mr. McNeil has been active in labour circles in the camp for many years. . . . Born and brought up on a farm near Sydney, Nova Scotia. . . . Started work in the steel industry in 1909 and continued to work with steel until 1922, when he came to Timmins. . . . Began work at the Hollinger and still works there. . . . Was a member of the delegation which recently interviewed the Department of Labour at Queen's Park, Toronto on behalf of the miners in their campaign for holidays with pay. . . . Is married and has six children.

John W. Flynn

A pioneer of the Porcupine camp, Mr. Flynn helped blaze a trail through the bush and over the site where now stands the Town of Timmins. . . . He came here twenty-eight years ago and opened a hotel, the Union Hotel. . . . The first store on Second avenue was opened by this pioneer. . . . Always interested in mining, he has done a lot of prospecting and now is the owner of a valuable property in Deloro Township. . . . This is his first fling at municipal politics although he has closely followed Town affairs for many years. . . . Born in Ottawa. . . . Now retired. . . . Is a married man. . . . Attends Church of the Nativity.

Wellington Armstrong

First came to the Porcupine in 1919. . . . For two years worked at various jobs in the camp. . . . Left and for eight years was a Union Organizer in another part of the country. . . . Returned to the North and Timmins in 1929. . . . Is at present Organizer in Timmins for the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers. . . . Was elected to serve on the Public School Board in 1928 but unseated through having been listed as separate school supporter. . . . Born in London, Ontario. . . . Is very much interested in his labour work and makes it his hobby.

Eugene Lafontaine

As the name indicates Mr. Lafontaine is from French-Canadian stock. . . . Born in Mattawa forty-three years ago. . . . Served three and a half years with the Canadian forces overseas. . . . Was awarded the military medal for valour. . . . Travelled extensively

Was a member of the delegation which interviewed the Hepburn government on behalf of the miners who pay for the miners. . . . Is Secretary of the Timmins Citizens League. . . . Is at present employed on construction work.

Homer Gauthier

A native of the North and a resident of Timmins for the past eleven years. . . . Born in North Bay. . . . Served on Timmins police force for three years. . . . married man with family. . . . President of the Timmins Citizens' League and Vice-President of Le Cercle Canadien Francais. . . . Has been active in labour circles and is making his third appearance as a candidate for Council. . . . Was defeated in 1936 and 1937. . . . A Catholic, Mr. Gauthier is a member of the St. John the Baptist Society and the Holy Name Society. . . . Employed as Manager of a local butcher store.

Edward Cyr

Born in Mario, Quebec, Mr. Cyr is of French and Irish stock. . . . A farmer's son, he came to Kapuskasing when he was 16 years of age, where he worked on construction. . . . Came to Timmins in 1919 and started in at the Hollinger. . . . Worked there until 1924, when he got married and went south to Windsor and Detroit. . . . Back to the camp in 1929. . . . Has worked

for four years at the McIntyre. . . . Two years on police force. . . . After the time on the force went back into the Hollinger. . . . Is married and has three children. . . . Is a property owner. . . . Attends St. Anthony's Church and is a member of the French Club. . . . Was nominated for Council twice before but never qualified until this year.
