### Northern Pioneer Passes at Ottawa

Mrs. M. C. H. Little Died Suddenly This Week.

Halleybury, Dec. 8.—(Special to The Advance)—Second member of a prominent Northern family to die suddenly within the last few months, Mrs. M. C. H. Little, wife of the well-known mining engineer and a sister of the late D. L. Jemmett, collapsed in her Toronto home on Sunday evening and passed away almost immediately. So far as friends here knew, Mrs. Little had been in her usual health until she was fatally stricken. Her husband was home at the time.

Funeral services for the deceased were held in Toronto on Tuesday afternoon and yesterday morning at St. Matthias' Anglican Church in Ottawa, where Mrs. Little's father, the late Rev. George Jemmett, was formerly rector. Burial was made in Beechwood cemetery, Ottawa, where other members of the family lived on Poplar Plains Crescent. D. L. Jemmett, who died here unexpectedly last summer, is buried.

Mrs. Little, the former Dulcibel Jemmett, had lived in Halleybury for years. Latterly, she had been spending the winter months in Toronto, where the family lived on Poplar Plains Crescent. They left Halleybury for the city only a few weeks ago. Mrs. Little had been actively identified with the work of the Women's Auxiliary of St. Paul's Anglican church here, with the golf club and other community affairs.

Surviving are her husband, a son, Harvey, and one daughter, Elizabeth. Mrs. Little also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Frank Jemmett, of Toronto, and Miss Georgina Jemmett, of Victoria, Ont., and a brother, Henry Jemmett, also living at Victoria, but a former resident of Halleybury, where the family was actively associated with the Northern Canada Supply Company. Two brothers, D. L. and R. J., the latter once of Timmins, predeceased her.
