James P. Carson was born in Austin, which is in Pontiac County, Quebec, in 1853. For the greater part of his life he farmed in that community. It was there that Arthur G. Carson and his brothers and sisters were born.

The only time Mr. Carson, senior, was even in Timmins was in 1916, when he came here to visit his son, who is one of the "old-timers" in the Porcupine Camp.

Mr. Carson is survived by his wife three sons, Arthur, of Timmins, Harry, of Ottawa, and Clarence of Austin; two daughters, Mrs. George Palmer, of Austin, and Mrs. Harry Palmer of St. Armand, Quebec. There are also grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Mr. Carson was a member of the United Church and it is from that church he will be interred.
