

Porkies Prove Strength With 13 to 1 Victory Saturday

Porkies Use Macmen to Mop Up South Porcupine Arena

Commit Mayhem on McIntyre Miners to the Tune of Thirteen Goals to One. Dome Attacks Smash Through Disorganized McIntyre Defence. Score Six Goals in the Final Period.

to The Advance)—The Domes-McIntyre game in South Porcupine on Saturday night was not an exhibition of hockey, it was murder on a large scale. The Porkies set a charge of powder under the Macmen and blew them high wide and handsome all over the South End Arena. Final score of a one-sided contest was Domes, 13, McIntyre, 1.

Had the Miners been matched against the Toronto Maple Leafs or the Chicago Cubs could hardly have been trampled worse than they were by the South Porcupine representatives.

Dome laced three goals home in the first period, three in the second and seven in the final canto. Long McIntyre counter came after thirteen minutes of the last period. Kenty Cooke and Vail co-operated.

Near the end of the game McKay, Dome defenceman, mixed it up with a couple of the Macmen. His offense was considered enough to have him penalized a game. He will not participate in the next contest in which Dome plays.

As might possibly be inferred from the score, the Dome team was the stronger. Throughout the whole contest the South End team carried the play. They drove hard into McIntyre territory time and again and scored goals almost unopposed.

Clark, in the McIntyre goal, got hardly any support from his defencemen. He was not in the best of form himself but was hardly responsible for the large number of goals counted against him. Dome forward lines found no difficulty in breaking through the McIntyre defence lines and the Schumacher forwards did probably no efficient back-checking.

In addition to the weakness of the Macmen, the Domes had the confidence to continue to add to the score. The Macmen, on the other hand, were playing under the mental handicap of a sure lost game.

Messett and Huggins added substantially to their scoring record with four and three goals respectively. Dunn and Reynolds each got a pair, and Nevins scored one. The only McIntyre goal was scored by Kenty.

Precision and timing featured the Dome offensive. The principal reason why the Dome leads the standing, namely the use of simple but fast plays with plenty of short passing, was well to the fore on Saturday. The Dome attacks left the McIntyre defencemen stunned and useless.

After ten minutes of the first period the scoring began. In the next ten minutes Messett, Huggins and Nevins scored for the Dome. Dunn assisted Huggins and Taylor and Maki were the other men on the fast chairman passing play which resulted in Huggins' first goal. Nevins took a pass from Huggins to get his counter.

Dunn scored unassisted in the second. Reynolds took a pass from Maki and Gordon assisted Messett to count. Play was heavy in the second and checking rough. Penalties were given McKay, Kenty, Vail, Messett, Simpson and Cook.

First goal of the third came after four minutes when Huggins took the puck from Maki, who had received it from Nevins. Huggins shot on a true. Messett followed with two goals, one.

Revise Hockey Schedule to Conform to Play-off Dates

N.O.H.A. Officials Meet Here Friday. Decide to Shorten Schedule. First Four Teams Will Play Off in Finals. Will Play Four Point Games to Make up for Eliminated Contests.

A change in the Mines League hockey schedule of which more than thirty games have already been played, was made on Friday when W. A. Thompson, Secretary of the N. O. H. A. came to Timmins to confer with Dean Kester, N.O.H.A. president, and other officials. The change was made in order to have the schedule finished in time to have a champion declared at a date not later than that on which other sections of the association finish their play-offs.

The change has eliminated six home games. Each of the teams in the camp will now play nine instead of ten home games before concluding the schedule. In order to make up for the loss of games, six four-point games will be played.

Official practice has been to award two points for a win and one to each team in the case of a tie. Since Friday's decision a win will mean four points, in six of the games, and a tie two points for each team.

On two occasions teams will play double-headers. Games will be played in two different rinks.

At the meeting on Friday the play-off system to be used was decided. The teams standing first, second, third and fourth in the standing at the end of the schedule will play off. The first and third teams will play home and home games, goals to count. The second and fourth teams will do likewise.

The semi-final games will be played on February 14 and February 16.

The winners of the semi-finals will play home and home games, goals to count for the title. Games will be played on February 18 and 20.

When a winner has been declared it will meet the winner of the Kirkland Lake section of the N.O.H.A. in home and home games, goals to count.

Temporary arrangements have been made to play the first game of this final series here at the McIntyre Arena on February 23 and the second game at Kirkland Lake on February 25.
