The Porkies had no alibi for their held. unexpected defeat. They were beaten in a fast, hard-checking contest while features largely responsible for Miners' victory were, first, the work of Beare in the home nets and secondly, the way in which the line of Luney. The Miners had an edge on the play throughout the whole game. They played defensive hockey well and were deadly when they went on the ramp-

The first period was scoreless. In the second the Macmen scored one and in the third they outscored the Porkies three goals to two.

Beare, in the McIntyre net, was the best man on the ice. It was largely his work in goal that was responsible for the upset. He went through all kinds of aerobatics to nullify the Dome rushes and usually was successful. He had no chance whatsoever on the two counters which beat him.

First score came after six minutes and 12 seconds of the second period while Dunn was off the ice for tripping Tripp. Luney passed out from the corner of the ice after getting the puck from Baker. He passed right to Malone's stick and that worthy beat Brownlee cleanly.

Dunn was ushered off for tripping Tripp, Vail tripped Maki and was penalized, and Messett was given a minor penalty for tripping Vail.

The same line of Luney, Malone and Baker scored the first goal of the second period. Malone passed to Luney and the puck was skated off; Malone recovered and again gave the disc to Luney, who batted it into the net.
