

Porkies Rout Coniaurum Saturday Night

Bisons Smother Hollinger In First Four Point Game

Bisons Outscore and Outplay Hollinger Green Shirts in Arena Here on Friday. Play in First Period Equal and Then Bisons Take Next Two Cantos. Fasano Scores Five Goals. Morris Also Good.

Buffalo-Ankerite outscored and outplayed the Hollinger here on Friday night in the second four point game of the revised Mines League Schedule. The Bisons tacked four points to their standing with an 8 to 3 victory.

Reason for the four points was a decision resulting from a meeting of N.O.H.A. officials in Timmins recently. In order to finish the schedule in time to have a winner declared at the same time as other sections of the N.O.H.A. it was decided to eliminate half a dozen games.

In order to make up the loss of points from the six games, four instead of two points will be awarded for six other games. The second of these four point games was played on Friday.

Play in the first period was about equal although the Ankerite scored two goals to Hollinger's one. In the last two sessions however, the Ankerite was well out in the lead. In the second the Bisons counted four goals to Hollinger's one and in the third outscored the green shirts two to one.

With five goals, Fasano was the best man on the ice. In addition to his scoring ability which came largely through his agility and heady play-making around the nets, Fasano played generally good hockey. Morris, Pilotte and Schreiber were the pick of the Ankerite team.

Willmott and "Winkie" Wilson were good for the Hollinger. Weakness of the local mine squad seemed to be in allowing the Bisons plays to crash through defence lines and in lack of back-checking on the part of the forwards.

Morris, who played a good all-round game, assisted Fasano score the first. After 10 minutes of play he passed from the blue line to where Fasano was parked in front of the net. A minute later Hollinger scored the tying goal. Cordick blasted a shot at Kemp, who threw it out to the corner. In the corner Cordick passed it out to Darrach in front of the net.

Allan scored a solo goal for Ankerite before the period came to an end. He picked up a loose puck at the blue line and stickhandled his way through the Hollinger defence to drive the puck into the upper right hand corner of the nets. In the dying moments of the period Allan came close to scoring another but he missed the net by a fraction of an inch.

Hollinger scored the first goal of the second and the only one it counted during the period. Darrach took Willmott's pass, skated over the blue line and shot between the defencemen. The puck never left the ice and slipped into a lower corner.

While London was off the ice Fasano came in from the blue line and rifled the rubber through a maze of players' legs. How it got through and passed Mayowski was a mystery. Hollinger sent every man up the ice but one, and again the Ankerite broke away. Patterson scored on McKinnon's pass.

Donelle was off the ice for tripping Richer when the next Bison goal was counted. McKinnon passed out from the corner to Schreiber. While Donelle was still off Schreiber passed out to Fasano for another goal.

Darrach was penalized for slashing, London for tripping, and Morris for hooking. When Donelle flipped Richer he was sent to the box.

Opening the scoring in the third, Fasano got a pair of goals in less than a minute. The first came while Wilson was off the ice. Schreiber fed the puck to Fasano as he was sailing by the net. The second came when the Italian boy was fed the puck by Morris.

Morris and Fasano Lead the Bisons to Victory Thursday

Flyers' Famed Last Period Recovery is Futile Against Ankerite Strength. Third Period Spotted With Fights and Arguments. Ankerite Has Won Four Straight Over Coniaurum.

Buffalo-Ankerite's dynamite twins, Sammy Fasano and Morris, led their team to a 5 to 3 victory on Thursday night when it tangled with the Coniaurum Flyers in the McIntyre Arena. The game featured two periods of fast hockey and a third session in which players, officials and spectators mixed it up in a grand jamboree.

Coniaurum's famed last period recovery did not work on Thursday night. The power of the Ankerite was too much for the Flyers and they were forced to concede a defeat. The loss on Thursday gave Bisons a clean four wins over the Flyers.

The combination of Fasano and Morris was the poison which soured the Flyers' outlook on life. Fasano usually gets the goals and has the assists fed to him by Morris. They were a fast travelling pair and should prove very valuable to the Ankerite before the play-offs are finished.

Allan and Morris made the play that gave Fasano the first goal. Allan shoved the puck into the corner where Morris picked it up. He passed to Fasano who was passing the net in somewhat of a hurry. Fasano pulled Clarke and counted.

While Jerry Neddow reposed in the penalty box, Ankerite got the first goal of the second period. From a gangling attack Laflamme picked up the puck and passed to McKinnon, who was standing in front of the net. The Coniaurum counter in the second came when Patterson was in the penalty box.

South Porcupine, Jan. 28.—(Special to The Advance)—Dome Porkies routed Coniaurum Flyers on Saturday night in the South End Arena. Sixty minutes of mediocre hockey came to an end with the home team on the long end of a 10 to 2 count.

The Flyers managed to hold the Dome scoring down to reasonable proportions in the first and second period but allowed the powerful league leaders to get away from them in the third. In the final canto the Dome-ers rapped seven goals past Paradis in the Coniaurum nets.

His T.P.A. counter was soon evened when Skidoff took the puck from Kosiek's skate and tallied for the South Enders. Brown got the second South Porcupine goal of the period.

Moore and Kosiek worked together for two of the second period T.P.A. goals. "Dinty" was the scorer and Kosiek got both assists. In addition to his assists, Kosiek got a goal during the period. He was assisted by Kalenchuk.

The third period scoring record was listed "Doran, Doran, Howe." Doran got the first two on fast heavy plays that baffled the T.P.A. defencemen and the third came when Howe dashed in on a solo effort.
