

Bisons Best Porkies In Power Contest

Schrieber's Shot Gives Bisons Hard Fought Win Last Night

Overtime Goal Wins Power Contest Between Mines League Leaders. Allan and Schrieber Tally For Winners. Maki Gets Dome Counter. Biggest Crowd of Year Sees Thrilling Exhibition.

Last night's contest between the Buffalo Ankerite Bisons and the Dome Porkies aroused more interest in the camp than any other game played this year. Fans have long been speculating on the relative strengths of the two league leaders and looking forward to their third contest. They have met three times this year. Two of the games ended in overtime ties. Last night's game was won 2 to 1 by the Bisons in the dying moments of overtime when Schrieber poked a goal home after a beautiful assist from Barney Morris.

The game ranked head and shoulders above any other game seen in the camp this year for thrills and as an exhibition of fast, exciting hockey. Both teams were at the peak of their form, and play throughout the sixty minutes was about even.

The largest crowd that has turned out to see a game this year watched play shuttle back and forth on the ice of the Timmins arena. They saw clever heady hockey played by the forward lines of both teams and heavy checking and skating on the part of the defencemen.

The two goal-tenders, Kemp and Brownlee, are deserving of special mention. They were the largest factor in keeping the score down to two goals to one. They both played sensational hockey and made saves which seemed miraculous.

Judging by last night's tilt it will be either the Dome or the Ankerite representing the Porcupine Camp when the season ends. The performances of both teams outdistanced anything seen in the camp this year.

The pro-Ankerite crowd went wild in the second period when Allan scored after six minutes of play. They could scarce forbear to cheer when Maki tallied for the Dome after nine minutes of the third period. Winning goal came after seven or eight minutes had been played of the overtime period.

Play was about even in the scoreless first period. Despite the fact that both teams were covering well in defence, forwards managed to get in close several times. It was then that Brownlee and Kemp showed to good advantage. Both veterans of the net were calmly efficient as they went about the important business of keeping the rubber disc out of the net.

Just as the bell rang to end the first period Pilotte hooked Huggins when he was in on the net alone. A penalty was awarded and a penalty shot.

The second period opened when Maki took the penalty shot for the Dome. His drive missed the net.

While Pilotte was in the penalty box the Dome staged a power drive. Huggins, Taylor and Nevins all were in on the net at different times but Kemp managed to prevent them from scoring. A good many of the Dome rushes broke on the Ankerite defence line.

Woon hooked Fasano and went off. While he was serving time, Morris circled behind his own net, passed diagonally to McKinnon who dashed up the side and passed across to Allan for the first Ankerite goal.

Dunn and Pilotte were sent off and the Dome board of strategy sent four forwards on the ice. No goal resulted from their desperate rushes on the Bisons' net. Horne and Patterson were penalized before the period ended. Just as it did end Huggins shouldered Allan as he came down with the puck and spilled him. He was penalized.

The Dome began the third period a man short but managed to stave off the Ankerite until he returned. Then Morris was sent off for spilling Nevins. While he was in the box Maki and Huggins went in on the Bison net. Huggins rifled a four foot pass to Maki and he found the corner of the net with the rubber to deadlock the score.

The Dome missed a beautiful scoring chance in overtime when three men closed in on the net with only Kemp to beat but muffed it when the end man mismanaged his shot.

Morris passed to Schrieber for the winning goal. Schrieber faked a shot and drew Brownlee out of his. He then lifted the puck into the twine.

Hollinger Breaks When Dome Scores Three During Penalty

Dinelle's Penalty Marks Breaking Point in Hollinger-Dome Game Monday. Four Hollinger Men Unable to Stop Dome Rushes. Second Game of a Double-Header. Winner Gets Four Points.

The break in the Hollinger-Dome game at the Timmins Arena on Monday night came in the second period, when Dinelle got a penalty for tripping Maki. During the time the little Hollinger pepper pot was off the ice, the Porkies rained three goals past Farger. They took advantage of the lead and from that time on were never threatened.

The game was one of a double-header being played that evening. It was a four point game.

One goal for each team was marked on the score sheet in the first period. In the second, largely due to Dome's activity while Dinelle was off the ice, the Porkies scored five to Dome's two. The visiting team outscored the home-sters two to one in the final session.

Hollinger drew first goal. Wilson passed to Denelle from the penalty line and the pepper pot batted it into the net. Four minutes later Dome equalized the score when Nevins came in from the blue line to pick up a loose puck and beat Farger to the draw. There were no penalties in the first period.

Dome and Hollinger took one each in the first seven minutes of the middle period. Dome counted when Huggins passed out from the boards to Nevins, who stabbed the rubber at the goal with his stick.
