Play-off Hopes of McIntyre Dashed by Ankerite Bisons

Buffalo-Ankerite Bisons kept their record clear on Friday night when they met the McIntyre Miners in the Timmins Arena. Scoring three times in the second period the Ankerite won 3 to 1.

Close and hard checking featured play in the scoreless first period. McIntyre was out to score and desperate in the attempt to register a win over the Ankerite and get into the play-offs. However the Bisons were too strong. The Macmen were further felled by the stellar work of Kemp, in the Buffalo goal.

McComb drew the official ire in the first when he tripped Zuke and sent him sprawling. He was banished for a minor penalty.

First goal of the game came when Kerr made the play for McKinnon to score. Kerr slipped a forward pass to McKinnon and the Ankerite forward rifled it into the net past Beare.

Shortly after Hughie Allan checked the puck away from a McIntyre player and raced away alone to make his shot good for a goal. Sammy Fasano drilled the last goal home almost at the end of the period when he took a set-up pass from the very efficient Barney Morris.

Final goal of the game came in the last period when the husky McIntyre defenceman, Murphy, got the puck and smoothly sailed in to beat Kemp.

Fasano, Schreiber and Morris were penalized in the second period. However the game was clean and referees were called upon only occasionally.

Rouynite Has Sword of Geo. Washington

H. deVillers Proud Owner of Historic Sword Won by Ancestor.

Rouyn, Que., Feb. 11.—A sword once carried by George Washington in battle and handed by him to a French-Canadian soldier as a token of surrender is the prized possession of a Rouyn man, Horace deVillers.

Washington, then a 21-year-old officer in the Virginia militia, had been sent across the Appalachians from the English coastal colony to drive the French back into what they considered to be French territory. He had succeeded in occupying a fort near the present site of Pittsburgh when a party led by deJumonville attacked. Washington's men drove them off and of the three or four who escaped, deJumonville was one, returning through the wilderness to Montreal and telling his sad story to deVillers. His brother immediately raised a force of 500 men, 300 of whom were Indians, and led them through the 600 miles of forest that separated Montreal from Washington's fort.

Having no such number of fighting men at his disposal, Washington surrendered and, following the custom of those days, handed his sword to the conqueror, deVillers. That is the story as the deVillers family has known it down through the years, as passed from lip to lip. History agrees in most of the details.

The weapon had lain forgotten in a trunk in Mr. deVillers' Rouyn home until when he saw a document published in Montreal that recalled the only time the father of the United States surrendered. Down through the generations, from eldest son to eldest son, the sword and its story have been passed. Its shining, graceful blade of fine English steel, protected by a leather scabbard that is now rotting away in dryness, the sword bears the arms and French mottoes of the British Empire, etched deeply into the metal. "Honi Soit Qui Mal y Pense (Evil to him who thinks evil, Order of the Garter) and 'Dieu et Mon Droit' (God and My Right, motto of the British Kings) are still quite clear. Two large script letters 'G.R.' (Georgius Rex) are followed by the Roman numeral 'III' for the reigning king of Washington's day.
