

Bisons Win Title and Right to Meet Lake Shore

Ankerite Eliminates Pamour and Takes Title by One Goal

Wins Four to Three in Saturday Night Match With Dynamiters at South Porcupine. Game Ended Hard-Fought Play-Off Series. Ankerite Counted Three Before Pamour Registered on Score Sheet.

The Ankerite advanced into the finals for the title by defeating Conistrom Flyers in two straight games.

The first game of the play-offs between the Dynamiters and the Bisons ended in a tie. Decision was deferred until the second game on Saturday night.

The game did not go into overtime although it threatened to do so during every minute of the last period. In the first frame the Ankerite tallied twice. Each team got a goal in the second period and in the last session the Pamour got two to Ankerite's one.

Leading scorers were Hughie Allan, bespectacled Ankerite forward, and Marshall, burly Pamour defenceman. Each got a pair of goals. Morris, Schreiber and Hannaberry were the other scorers.

Len Schreiber's goal after four and a half minutes of the third period was the one which won the game for the Ankerite. It checked a Pamour rally from the end of the second and beginning of the third periods, during which two consecutive markers were counted, and put the Ankerite two goals ahead.

Saturday night's match was a close, fast, hard-checking contest all the way through. It was played before one of the largest crowds that has ever jammed into the South Porcupine Arena.

First goal came after close to ten minutes of play. Bentley, who played an outstanding game in the Pamour goal, stopped three successive Ankerite shots before one of Allan's driving shots got by him. Four minutes later the second goal of the period was scored. It also was notched by Allan. He took a pass from Fasano at the side of the net.

Mayes and Marshall went down the ice after an offside break-away and very nearly left a Pamour mark on the score board. Kemp was the saving factor.

Allan missed a couple of opportunities to tally in the first and Fummerton bailed one good opportunity when he lost control of the puck almost at the crase.

Third consecutive Buffalo-Ankerite tally was scored by Barney Morris on Allan's pass. Allan battled the puck from the blue line and Morris took it right in front of the net and evaded Bentley.

A minute later Pamour scored when Woods passed out from the side to Hannaberry in front of the net.

Len Schreiber was sent off for carrying his stick high and the Dynamiters staged a gangling attack—which attack began a series of penalties. Woods was banished for dumping McKinnon and Mayes given the nod for charging into Morris with his stick high. Before the period ended Zuke joined the congregation in the penalty box for pulling Fummerton down on the ice by the arm.

After the face-off Pamour staged a rush to open the third period's play. Marshall picked up the disc outside the blue line after a Pamour attack on the Ankerite goal had been broken up and let go a drive. The puck whistled between Richer's legs and found the lower corner of the net for an entirely unexpected goal for the Dynamiters. Schreiber's goal came a couple of minutes late Fasano passed out from

the corner who shot through a tangle of legs and sticks. His drive got into the twine to give the Ankerite four goals.

Marshall was sent off for tripping Morris and the Ankerite applied the pressure. One dangerous rush came when Morris and Zuke came up together. It was only an acrobatic gyration by Bentley that saved. He saved again when Fasano shoved a pass over to Allan.

Pamour's final goal was scored at the fifteen minute mark. Fummerton picked up a loose puck at centre ice, skated across the blue line and beat a lone Ankerite defenceman. He then passed to Marshall who skated in fast from centre to beat Kemp with a shot which hardly left the ice.

A minute later McArthur came up on a solo rush. He shoved the puck between the Ankerite defencemen and skated around them to pick it up again. Kemp came out to clear and as he hit the puck his stick flew out of his hand. Pamourites argued for a goal but it was not allowed.

Later, Barney Morris put the puck into the Pamour net on a pass from Allan but it was called back as offside.

Frood Takes Three Goal Edge In Nickel Belt Play-Downs

Winner of Best Out of Five Game Series Meets Winner of Lake Shore and Ankerite Series. Sudbury Teams Have Each Won Game and Deadlocked One. Series Has Been in Progress Since February 13th.

After three games, at the conclusion of which Frood and Creighton were tied for the championship of the Nickel Belt Hockey League, Frood took a three goal edge by reason of a 5 to 2 win in Sudbury last Friday night.

Winner of the best three-out-of-five game series in the nickel district will meet the winner of the Lake Shore-Buffalo-Ankerite home and home game series for the championship of the N.O. H.A.

First game of the series to decide the title-holder in the Sudbury district was played on February 13. Frood won 3 goals to 2. On February 17 the two teams met again and played to a 1-all tie. The Frood lead was wiped out when the two teams met again on February 20 and Creighton won 4 to 3.

Last Friday night's game was the first contest in which any sort of a decision was reached. The three goal edge gives the Frood a healthy margin in a league where title-aspiring teams play one tie and each win games by one goal.

To date on the round Frood has twelve goals and Creighton nine.

Gordon Black won the consolation event. His rink defeated that of Alf Prout.

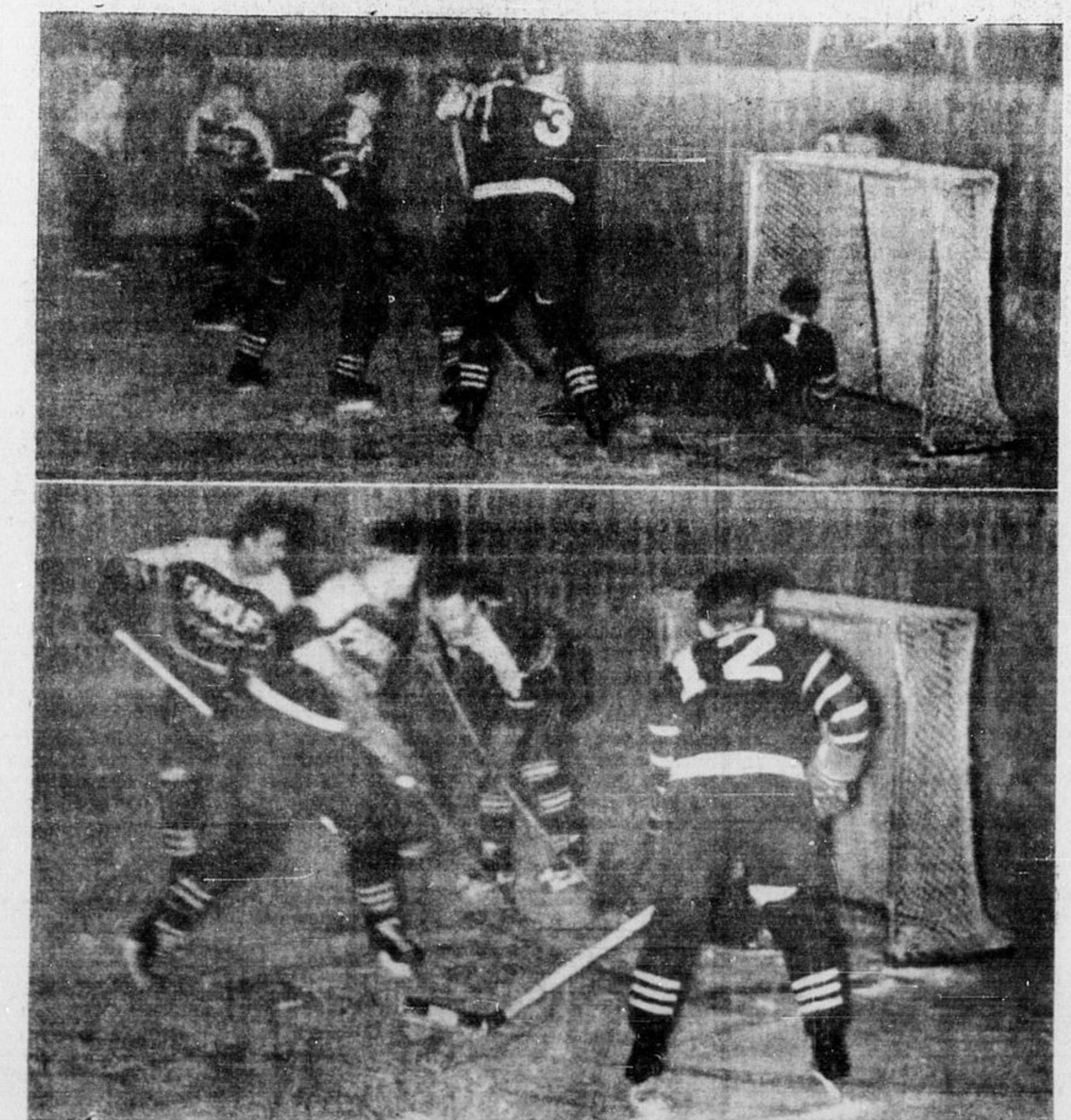
In conjunction with final games a social event was held on Friday night. Musical entertainment was provided and curriers and their wives got together in a gay time.

Pamour and Ankerite Deadlock The First of the Camp Finals

Result of Final Contest Deferred Until Saturday Game. Ankerite Thrusts Manage to Pierce Strong Pamour Defence. Dynamiters Take Two Goal Lead in the First Period.

The contest to determine this year's Mines League Hockey champion began in the Timmins Arena on Thursday night. When the first game was played the teams were exactly where they were before it started—deadlocked. Decision as to the titleholder was merely deferred until Saturday night.

Most surprising team in the league this year has been the Pamour Dynamiters. All season they have fluctuated between third and fourth place in the standing. In the semi-finals the Pamourites, held the highly-rated Dome Porkies to a tie in the first game and outclassed them in the second.

Judging by Thursday night's game the Dynamiters were hoping to do the same thing to the Ankerite. In any event they deadlocked the first final tilt four goals to four.

Pamour outscored the Bisons two goals to one in the first period. In the second the shaggy Ankerite Buffalo lowered his head and crashed through to tie the score. Each team tallied in the third and final canto.

The powerful combination of Mayes and Marshall, which stopped the best of the Dome frontal attacks was not equal to the smooth skating sallies of the first Ankerite line. Mayes and Marshall stopped their share but they did not succeed in getting all the line-piercing thrusts of the Fasano-Morris-Allan trio.

Mayes opened the scoring after four minutes of the first period. He shot from the blue line and Kemp, the Ankerite goalie, stopped the drive. However, the puck dropped from his pads and rolled slowly and tantalizingly into the net.

A half a minute later another was notched for the Pamour. Woods drove from inside the blue line and Kemp went down on the ice in a split to get the puck. It got into the goal from between his legs.

First retaliatory Ankerite goal came at the seven minute mark. Fasano took the puck from a face-off and shot from inside the blue line. The puck struck Mayes' skate and caromed into the back of the pamour net. It would have been a perfect shot in a billiard table but on the ice it was more of a fuke goal than anything else.

The second period opened fast with Ankerite driving hard to make up the one goal lead held by the Dynamiters. The first goal however, put the Pamourites two in front. LaRoche took the puck from Hannaberry, and from about twenty feet out, let go at the net. The disc went into the goal and LaRoche, thrown off balance by the shot, went flat on his back.

A minute later the Ankerite Counted the first of three consecutive goals. Barney Morris passed to Fasano to bring a fast-travelling Ankerite play to a conclusion. Fasano shot and Bentley took the rubber on his pads. Skating close to the goal Morris picked the puck from out of a scramble and scored on a shot.

Hannaberry's penalty was responsible for the Ankerite goal which deadlocked the score at the end of the second period. He was sent off the ice for tripping McKinnon.

Ankerite board of strategy immediately sent five forwards out on the ice. They were Fasano, Morris, and Allan

and Schreiber and Laflamme. They barraged the Pamour goal with shots and finally one of them got past the hard working Bentley. Fasano, Morris and Schreiber came down together. Schreiber got the final pass when in a scoring position and he pushed the puck by Bentley.

It was goal for goal in the third period. The first was scored by Barney Morris on a pass from Schreiber. Morris was parked in front of the net and Schreiber raked the puck out from the side. It was a perfect centre pass and Morris carefully drew Bentley and poked the puck in behind him.

At the ten minute mark Hannaberry took a pass from Fummerton and scored against Ankerite's second line. The pass was a long one—from the corner.

When five minutes of the period remained five Ankerite forwards again took the ice. They worked hard to get a goal but Bentley and the Pamour defence, Mayes and Marshall, worked just as hard to thwart them. Result was a draw—no goal.
