

### Prospectors To Meet On Friday Evening

#### To Consider Reports on New Bill Regarding Mining.

The Porcupine Prospectors' Association is to meet in their club room at the Florio Hotel, 11 Spruce St. N., on Friday evening of this week at 8 p.m. The special purpose of the meeting is to consider the bill introduced in the Legislature by Hon. Mr. Leduc, Minister of Mines. It is expected that details of the bill will be available by Friday night, and that the prospectors thus will be in position to see what is being done to help the prospectors in Ontario and to advance mining in this province. It is likely that the association will send representatives to Toronto to further inform the government of the needs of the prospector, so that all information possible may be available when the bill comes up for discussion.

At the last meeting of the Prospectors' Association here a number of resolutions were passed and forwarded to the government. This resolution may be summarized as follows:

- (1) That the government in this province clear out creeks and portages.
- (2) That the prospector should receive everything on claims after they are patented, including trees.
- (3) That a prospector should be allowed to stake nine claims on a mining license, instead of three claims on license and six on proxy.
- (4) After a claim has been staked the prospector should be allowed four months to do his work instead of 90 days.
- (5) Prospectors to ask the Minister of Mines to act on Section No. 183 of the Mining Act and put it in force. This would encourage diamond drilling.
- (6) Re-cutting of boundary lines—last cut 42 years ago. Lines to be four feet wide. In this way the youth of the country would get employment and it would also help the development of prospecting.
- (7) Building of cabins and the cutting of trails should be allowed as assessment work.
- (8) Geological reports should come to the Recording Office first before going to the mines. The prospector does not want to be subsidized.

### Hospital Threatens Suit Against Cobalt

#### Cost of Indigent Patient at Toronto Institution Now Sought from Northern Town.

Cobalt, March 9.—(Special to The Advance)—The town of Cobalt is threatened with legal action by the Toronto General Hospital unless settlement is made of a claim by the institution, made in the case of a woman, who was under treatment for more than two months and who, according to information given the town council here, previously had received hospital care as a resident of another municipality. The authorities here are trying to find some trace of relatives of the patient, but enquiries so far have been without much result, although information given was that she is a former resident of Kapuskasing.

Settlement by next Wednesday is asked by the hospital, or suit will be started in the courts to collect the amount of \$123.75, a letter from the hospital intimates. The patient is Mrs. Mary Ann Fernland, who was in hospital for 65 days at a cost of \$12.25 per week, this amount of \$113.75 having for an additional \$10 given her, allegedly, to return to Cobalt after the town authorities here had refused to pay her railway fare back from the city. It is claimed the woman lived here eight months before entering hospital.

### Money Leaning on Its Shovel To-Day

#### John T. Flynn Gives Cause of Unemployment as He Sees It.

This is not an advertisement for Collier's Weekly. Yet we wish our business leaders and our public men would buy the current print of Collier's and read the article in it called "Scared Dollars" by John T. Flynn. In a vivid, striking way, it tells why money isn't being put to work, why it is lying idle in the banks, and why, as a consequence, business is bad. Says Flynn: "Jobs just don't happen—someone has to spend money to create them. And while we've as much money as we've ever had, it's not working. It's hiding in the banks. Why? Because private investment has collapsed in fear. Make it possible for money to flow from the banks into business, and employment will take care of itself. And again:

"Men are not the only things out of work. Dollars are out of work too. In fact, it's because the dollars are out of work that the men are out of work. Recently I ran across a bank in Knoxville, Tennessee. It had \$24,000,000 on deposit. Ten million of them were not working. They were lying around leaning on their shovels. The bank had half of its deposits in cash."

Why? The answer, says Flynn, is not the banks. They are not hoarding money. Hoarding money, for banks, is bad business. Their job, as business people, anxious to make money, is to lend money. They are waiting for people to come along and get it; to put it to work.

The people don't come along. They go to banks, not to borrow money, but to deposit money. Because they are afraid. Somebody has told them—everybody is telling them—that things are bad; that things are going to get worse; that the whole capitalist system is going to the devil; and that, consequently, they are likely to waken up one morning to find that their dollars aren't worth anything. So they hoard; are afraid to start anything, or to buy anything, or invest in anything. Money—and men—remain out of work.

John T. Flynn is writing of the United States. But what he says applies to Canada. We, too, are permitting ourselves to be paralyzed by fear. We listen to radio commentators and read sensational headlines telling of war. We decide, as a consequence, that there is going to be war; that we'd better "get from under". And when it's out a war, or war-mongers, it's modern plagues, reformers: the magic money people, the inflationists; the people who are talking about the "end of the capitalist system"; the Jeremiahs who go about telling us that Canada is "bankrupt!"

Such talk is not merely stupid; it's vicious. This country isn't bankrupt, nor anywhere near bankruptcy, and the capitalist system isn't collapsing. Through hundreds of years the capitalist system has stood up under strains and stress, adapting itself to new needs and conditions. It will do that again. Need there may be for changes, for improvements, but talk about its going down before Communism, or Socialism, or Fascism, or some other ism, is foolish talk. There isn't a chance in a million of this country going Fascist, or Communist. This country is going to remain what it is. It is going to stand by the capitalist system. And by democracy.

Canada can't do much about fear propaganda that comes from Europe. It can and should do something about fear propaganda at home. It should begin doing something about fear propaganda at home by giving short shrift to people who, in the role of amateur economists and self-constituted saviours, go about talking "bankruptcy" and predicting disaster unless we take up their pet projects. Most of these people, the majority of them in the kindergarten of politics and economics, betray by 90 per cent. of what they say that they don't know what they are talking about. Yet otherwise sensible people listen to them, and repeat what they say as though it were gospel, spread the propaganda of fear. That is why, here in Canada, our banks are bulging with idle money while people are out of work.

The time has come, we think, when Canada should snap out of this fear. The mines, forests, fields and fisheries of this country are as rich as they ever were; richer. And we have but 11,000,000 people. To talk about "bankruptcy" in the light of such things, is as nonsensical as it is cowardly; a betrayal of those who pioneered this country, and build it. Some people are talking, in fact, as though they didn't deserve a country.

### Kirkland Lake Man Acquitted of Murder

#### In Second Trial Jury Find William Macdonald Not Guilty.

Halleyburg, March 9.—(Special to The Advance)—On trial this week for the second time on a charge of manslaughter which followed a fatal altercation over a bottle of wine, William Macdonald, Kirkland Lake, late yesterday afternoon was acquitted by a Temiskaming Assizes petit jury which deliberated for nearly five hours before returning its verdict of not guilty to Mr. Justice Makins. Macdonald, who will be 52 years old on May 27 next, and who has a family of a dozen children, was before a jury and Mr. Justice Chevrier at the Assizes last September, when there was a disagreement and when corridor reports placed the jury at nine to three for acquittal.

Evidence in the case against the Lake Shore mine employee disclosed that on May 7 of last year Macdonald and Charles Munroe were in a dispute at Dane over the bottle, which Macdonald owned and which Munroe was accused of taking away from an automobile. In the scene which resulted, Munroe, the Crown alleged, was struck by Macdonald and died almost immediately, while accused contended Munroe had made the first move and that while he had struck Munroe it had been for his own protection. There had been considerable drinking, the evidence brought out, and Mr. Justice Makins, in discharging Macdonald yesterday, referred to what he termed accused's "disolute conduct" that day and advised him to leave liquor alone. The jury had taken a lenient view, his Lordship said, and might easily have reached another conclusion on the evidence.

Another Kirkland Lake miner will know his fate today on a charge of motor manslaughter, laid as the sequel to a collision between a car and truck at Swastika on October 9 last, in which Mike Zamolenski, who had gone with accused for a ride, was hurt and died six days later in hospital from meningitis, which developed from injuries received. Accused in this case is John Shkvirok, employee for five years of Kirkland Lake Gold Mines, and he also was injured in the collision, suffering a fracture of the skull and concussion. Zamolenski sustained a slight laceration of the brain and a severe fracture of the left cheek.

Shkvirok was returning to Kirkland Lake from Kenogami and on what one witness described as "a quite sharp bend" in Swastika village, was in collision with a truck driven by Mike Brosko, of Osseo, who was heading for Matheson. Shkvirok contended yesterday he had been blinded by the lights of the truck, but Brosko swore there was only one front light on the vehicle and that he had dimmed it as he approached. Crown witnesses alleged Shkvirok swung wide on the curve to cause the accident, which happened about 8.15 on a Sunday evening.

### Necessary to Re-register 'All Pistols, Revolvers, Etc.

Already a number in town and districts have re-registered revolvers, pistols, etc. This is necessary under an amendment to the Criminal Code. Even though revolvers, pistols, etc. were duly registered some time ago when a campaign to that effect was inaugurated, it is necessary to re-register them this year. The intention is to have a re-registration of all revolvers, pistols, etc. every five years, so as to facilitate the work of the officers of the law in curbing the menace of these weapons in the hands of people who may put them to improper purposes. The former registration was of material benefit in assisting the officers of the law in controlling the possession and use of firearms. The re-registration should be of still further value along this line. It is the duty of every good citizen to help uphold the hands of the officers of the law and they can do this by re-registering pistols, revolvers, etc., as requested. The re-registration should be made with members of the Ontario Provincial Police. The re-registration must be made between March 1st and July 1st, so the formality of re-registration may be made at any time now. Failure to re-register any of these weapons, not only means the placing of the owner in the liability of being fined for not re-registering, but also the weapons themselves may be confiscated. When costs are added to the fine, it will be seen that the best plan is to re-register before the last date mentioned in the notice issued by the Provincial Police. When to fine and costs are added the probable loss of the weapon or weapons, the expense seems too heavy to risk failing to re-register.

### To Address Business Girls Here To-Night

#### Miss Jacqueline Kennedy to be Guest at Banquet.

Miss Jacqueline Kennedy, representing the Canadian Federation of Business Women, arrived in Timmins this (Thursday) morning and will address a gathering of the local business girls at a banquet in the Fern Cottage Restaurant Dining room this evening at 8 o'clock.

In speaking to The Advance upon her arrival this morning, Miss Kennedy stated that there are thirty-six branches of the Federation in Canada, with at least one branch in each province and eleven in Ontario alone. vitamin resources, it would take from six to eight weeks for scurvy to occur. It was felt however, that in this time the children would secure some minute quantities of vitamin C, and therefore prolong the outbreak.

From a survey of these and similar cases it was stated that all townships who have been affected by the curtailed incomes during the past year, show a decided taxation on their resistance, to the breaking point, which has revealed itself by the outbreak of this uncommon ailment. In the majority of cases it was due to being unable to purchase the essential foods for living.

On discovery of this deplorable menace, the Health Officer took immediate action, and was successful in securing relief for all sufferers to the extent of giving the difference between what they earned in their pay envelopes, and what they would receive if they were wholly on relief. This action showed an immediate affective desirable change, although it is creating a great burden to the municipality and only affords a meagre living.

The merchants, particularly grocers, have extended credit beyond their means, and now face possible bankruptcy. Their predicament is such that

most wholesale produce is bought on a cash basis by them, if they wish to continue.

Many householders have for a long time had to revert to coal oil lamps for their light, and are unable to listen to radios, the electricity having been discontinued when they were unable to pay for it, and which caused them to forfeit this modern necessity and convenience.

In many instances last year's worn clothes had to suffice this year, and the fuel supply, so urgently needed in this sub-zero climate, is watched with vigil eyes.

Such an unwelcome situation seems to be a definite reflection on the repudiated wealth of Northern Ontario.

### SIR HENRY PELLATT DIES IN TORONTO LAST NIGHT

Sir Henry Pellatt, one of the best known financial men in Canada some years ago, died in Toronto yesterday, aged 80 years. For twenty-five years he was actively connected with the Queen's Own Rifles, of Toronto. He built Casa Loma at a cost of \$1,700,000, but the upkeep of this magnificent castle was so high that Sir Henry allowed the city to take it over for taxes. For years it was a white elephant on the city's hands, but in recent years the Kiwanis Club has taken it over as a show place for tourists and others and is able to make a little money from it as well as keep it from falling into disrepair.
