The first event of the district's skiing year will be the holding of a ski school at Copper Cliff, January 20-21, for the training of instructors for clubs of the southern zone of the Northern Ontario section.

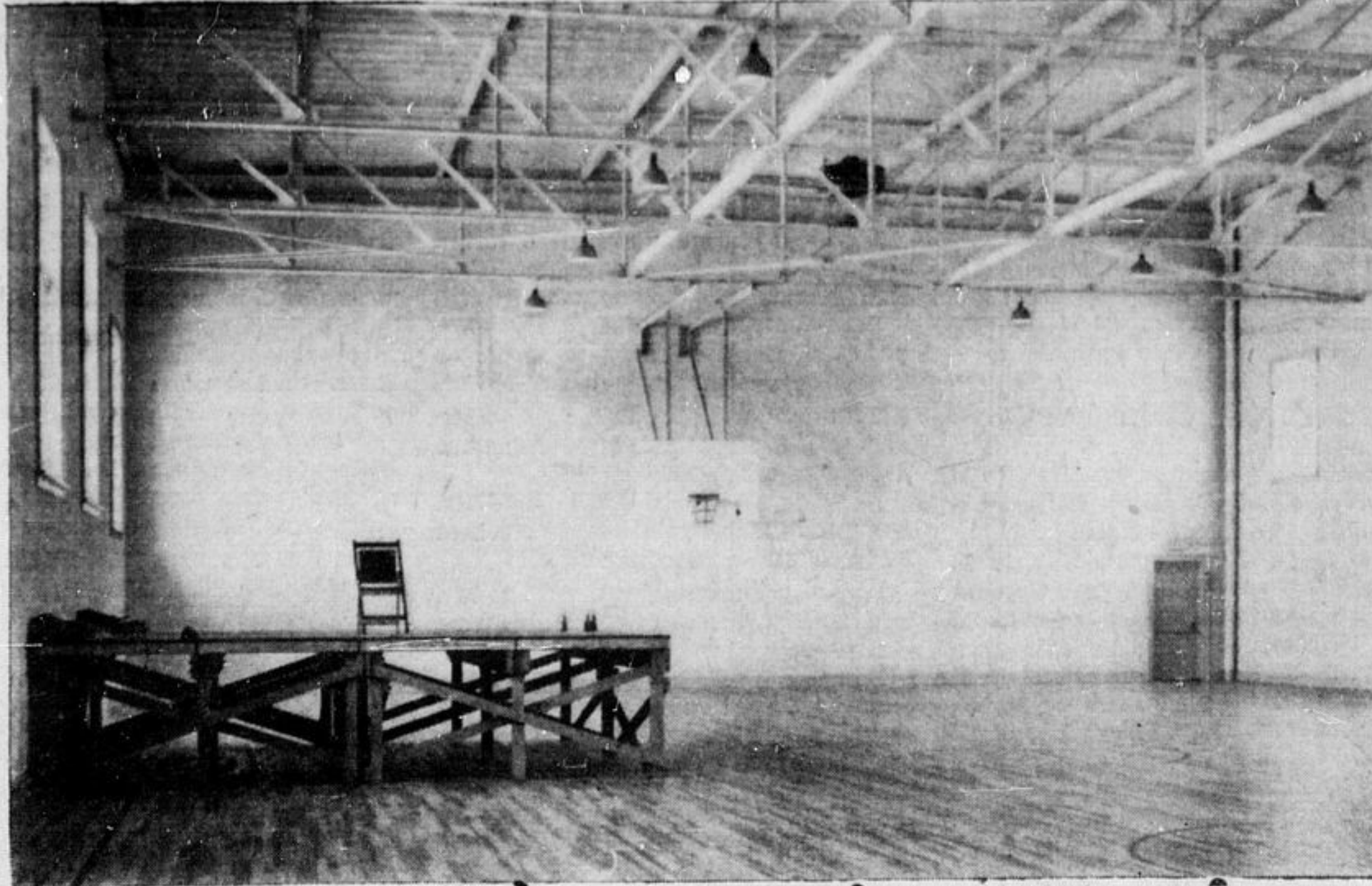

The school will open Saturday afternoon with first classes for the new instructors. That evening an informal gathering is expected to be held at Copper Cliff Community Hall, where visitors will have a chance to become acquainted with district followers of the sport.

Sunday morning the classes will be continued, with a break for a mid-day luncheon. That afternoon a test will be held on the club grounds to wind up the affair.

Cal Sproule, of the Copper Cliff club, will be one instructor for the school. Others are expected from North Bay, Clubs at North Bay, Creighton, Levaak, Coniston, Frood, Sault Ste. Marie, Sudbury, Timiskaming and Copper Cliff.

Dome and Ankerite Deadlock Pamour Trounces the Macmen

Hard-Fought Contest Between Old Rivals, Dome and Buffalo-Ankerite, Ends in Deadlock. Second Game Sees Dynamiters Soundly Trounce League Leading McIntyre Macmen. Games First in New South Porcupine Arena

The new South Porcupine Arena opened last night when the Dynamiters were hosts to the Ankerite club, and Pamour roughly entertained the Macmen. The Dome-Ankerite clash ended in a 5-5 tie while the other contest ended in a victory for Pamour.

Just as they did last year when they came from behind to beat out Dome, Ankerite again pulled the game from the fire in the last minute of play and emerged on even terms with the mighty men of Dome. Blond Bill Maki, starry centre for the Dome did his best to win the game by himself but his magnificent effort fell short by one. He counted for four of his team's five goals. He was undoubtedly the best man on the ice last night.

It didn't take Maki long to get started last night as he banged in the first goal to be scored in the new arena after only three minutes of play. Nevins and Frank Huggins set up the chance.

Ankerite tied the count three minutes later when Kucher rounded the net to pick up his own shot and drilled one past Brownlee that was smoking.

Kucher's penalty in the second period gave Dome the chance it had been waiting for and the boys counted two goals before he got back in the play. Both goals were scored by Bill Maki on passes from Frank Huggins.

A minute after Kucher came back, Morgan gave Ankerite life when he banged in Jack Young's pass to make the score three to two. Penalties to Maki, Hepworth, Woon, Morris and Nevins in that order made the rest of the period interesting.

In the opening minutes of the third period Morgan scored again for Ankerite to tie up the game. Morris gave him the pass, Godin drew a penalty and Ross rose to heights bordering on sensational to stop the waves of Dome players who attacked.

Just before the teams reached the half-way mark the Dome team went on another spree that everybody thought had put the game in the bag. Cyclone Taylor came to life and raced down the ice with the speed of a meteor and from the Ankerite blue line he drilled his shot at Kemp. The shot did everything but knock Kemp down and while Kemp was still trying to figure it out Bill Maki slipped in to flip in the rebound. A couple of minutes later Charlie Dunn tried to duplicate Taylor's effort and after taking his pass he fired, then raced in and banged in his own rebound.

Play continued at the torrid pace that it had started at with Ankerite pressing hard for goals. With only a minute and fifteen seconds left Dome looked like sure winners but two lads

on the Ankerite front line had other ideas about the game. The two lads were Barney Morris and Hughie Allen. They had played a hard game and along with Ray Morgan they eased into the hero spot. The first goal came from the flashing blade of Hughie Allen's stick on a pass from Morgan and the last goal with only fifty seconds left was scored by Morris on a pass from Allen.

League Leaders Find Bisons Tough Obstacle to Overleap

Defeated Seven Goals to Two in Friday Night Game. Hepworth Ties Score in First Period, Adds Two in Second and Scores Again in Third.

The league-leading McIntyre Macmen tripped and fell hard over an obstacle in their path to the Mines League crown on Friday night when they met up with the Buffalo Ankerite Bisons. The Macmen fell hard and when they came up and examined their bruised shins they found that a 7 to 2 loss had been chalked up against them in their own balliwick.

The Macmen started out well enough. Both their goals were obtained in the first twelve minutes. When the Bisons began to check hard and often, however, the men from the big ice arena in Schumacher fell back. From then on it was Ankerite all the way. Jack Hepworth tied the score before the first period was ended after a goal by Hughie Allen. In the second Hepworth, who had one of the best of his many good nights this year, made victory fairly certain by adding two more corners, both of them on assists from Barney Morris.

Hepworth scored again in the final canto to put the game on ice. He tallied on a pass from Allen. Barney Morris, who played his usual consistently good game, got the next and before the period was ended Morgan got the seventh Bison counter of the evening.

First goal of the game came after the Macmen staved off an Ankerite attack during the time Lone was in the penalty box. After Lone was back on the ice Murphy and Pozzo joined forces in a scramble. Murphy shot into the meele, the puck hit someone and bounded into the net.

At this point the Macmen looked good. Never ceasing to drive, they got their next counter about five minutes later. Lone picked up a pass from Sparky Vail and drove the bootheel past

Kemp for the second of the evening.

Kemp, Ankerite goalie, had a hand in the scoring of the first Bison goal. While the Macmen were ganging in on his net, he took the rubber on his stick and hoisted it up the ice. Allen took it while it was travelling fast and carried it in to flash the first one for the Bisons. Less than thirty seconds later Barney Morris laid the puck on Hepworth's stick and he darted in to score the equalizing goal.

Barney Morris made the plays for both Ankerite goals in the second. In both cases he gave the lead to Hepworth and the speedy winger made good on them.

Breaking away while all the Macmen were up the ice, Hepworth got his next tally in the third period. He passed to Allen who gave it back to him at the proper moment.

Allen assisted again a minute later. He forwarded the puck to Barney Morris who buried it in the net. Final goal came after the fifteen minute mark when Morgan shot from a difficult angle on Young's assist.

Beare, in the McIntyre goal, played good hockey and near the end of the game, when his defence crumbled on him, he was forced to outdo himself to keep the score from mounting higher.

Three Schools in New N.O.S.S.A. Basketball Loop

Timmins, Noranda, Kirkland Lake Will Compete in Northern Circuit.

Kirkland Lake, Jan. 3.—For the first time in the short history of N.O.S.S.A. competition, separate Northern and Southern Section schedules have been arranged for the yearly competition in the Senior basketball race, which has as a final prize the Patton Cup now held by the High and Vocational School.

The Northern section includes Kirkland Lake, Timmins and Noranda. These teams will play double home-and-home schedules in the next two months with the winner clashing with the Southern group champion for possession of the Patton Cup for 1940.

Noranda has entered the league for the first time in history and from all accounts will field a strong team. Timmins and Kirkland Lake, both tried squads, will comprise the other two teams and their rivalry on the rugby field will be continued in the hoop game. Schumacher, which has participated in the week-end tournaments, of the past has not entered the newly-formed set-up, but will view the games from the sidelines.

Start January 12

The first game of the schedule is carded for January 12, when the local cagers journey up to Noranda for an important tilt. Coach Ralph Thornton has been drilling his team for well over a month, and expects the boys to come through with flying colours. Five players from last year's championship squad will form the nucleus of the new team. They are Douglass Martin, Lyle Wilder, Freddie McNaughton, Bill Andrews, and Gordon Duffy. Over 15 new players have been trying out for the remaining few positions.

The first home game for the local hoopers will be on the 19th when Noranda plays the return game. This will be played, following the debate between Kirkland Lake and Schumacher which will be held at 7.30. Noranda then journey up to Timmins to play the blue-and-white the following evening.

The strong Timmins team, which will be minus the impressive Ron Lake, will clash with the maroon-and-white here on the 26th. This will be the first game between the two, and will give in a fair measure the relative strength of the two squads. Timmins then continues its jaunt to Noranda to play on Saturday the 27th.

Schedule for the rest of the games will be announced later.

All local games will be played in the new spa's gymnasium at the High and Vocational School. There is a large seating capacity, and also a balcony to accommodate around 200 fans. The schedule for the girls' basket-

ball season will be announced in a few days. Home-and-home games are also played in this league.
