Largely Attended and Many Floral Tokens.

A very large number of friends were present to pay their last respects to the late Charles Hitch, Hollinger Police Chief, on Tuesday morning, when funeral services were held at the Church of Nativity at 9 o'clock. The late Mr. Hitch was a valued and respected member of the community, having been for seven years the head of the Hollinger police force.

Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Fr. Leo Madry and the Rev. Fr. Roney, and pall-bearers were: Inspector Creasy, of the Ontario Provincial Police (Halleybury); Constable Braney, of the Ontario Provincial Police; Constable Melville, of the Hollinger Police; Constable Craig, of the Hollinger Police; Inspector Olson of Timmins Police; and Chief Gagnon of the Timmins Police.

A guard of honour was formed by the police of the district, all police officers being present from the Dome, Ankerite, Pamour, Golden City, Paymaster, Mounted Police, Provincial Police, South Porcupine, Schumacher, Timmins and Hollinger Police.

The late Mr. Hitch collapsed on the street about 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, and died in the office of Dr. Boutin a short time later. He had been in apparent good health, although only a short time before his death he mentioned that he had felt rather ill.

A notable record in police work was acquired by the late Mr. Hitch. Although only 54 years of age, he had served with the London Metropolitan Police, Scotland Yard, as Inspector of Police at Regina, secretary of the chief of police at Medicine Hat, deputy chief at Regina, and lastly as chief of police at the Hollinger Mine.
