

# Porkies Oust Sudbury To Win Colin Campbell Cup

## Porkies Win Junior N.O.H.A. Crown by Third Period Rally

Won Four to Three at McIntyre Arena on Friday Night Against Sudbury Legion. Harris and Andrews Good

A third period rally in which they outscored Sudbury Legion three goals to one, won the Northern Ontario Hockey Association junior "B" title for the South Porcupine Porkies on Friday night in the McIntyre Arena. The game was considered by many of the more than a thousand fans who attended, to be one of the best titles of the season, even including the senior league.

Coming from behind a one goal handicap at the end of the second period the South Enders won the match 4 goals to 3. Final goal of the game was scored by Sudbury and the Legion made a desperate effort to deadlock the score in the last seven minutes but was unsuccessful, largely due to the excellent net-minding of Lone.

Each team notched one in the first frame. After thirteen minutes of play Hamilton and Galardo went up the ice on a rush. Galardo passed wide and Hamilton circled the net and flipped the disc in.

One of the prettiest and most finished goals of the game scored three minutes later by Brown, to deadlock the score. The speedy Porcupine wingman circled behind his own net, rounded the defence and stickhandled his way through back-checkers to close in on the Sudbury goal and score. The goal was made more difficult by the fact that Doran was off the ice at the time.

Bolk, Doran and Hamilton were penalized in the first session for tripping Pirie, slashing Linton and tripping Brown, respectively.

Only goal of a penaltyless second period came when Hamilton, Sudbury, picked up the puck after breaking a Porcupine rush. He skated in fast, stickhandling his way through the defence, drew Lone out of position and bulged the twice with the rubber.

Big period of the game was the third. Fifty-five seconds after the opening face-off Andrews and Harris came up together. Andrews passed shortly after they hit the defence and Harris skirted the opposing huskies and beat Thompson with a low shot to again tie the score 2 to 2.

South End went into the lead by a margin of one goal when Harris picked up a loose puck inside the Sudbury blue line and counted with a high shot. The homesters took another goal lead when Andrews hooked the puck into his possession at his own penalty shot line, sailed down the ice and drove a stinger into the corner.

At the twelve minute mark Nazari passed out from the side to Sudbury's McGinn. Planted in front of the net McGinn let fly a sizzler that evaded Lone.

Throughout the whole game the type of hockey sparkled. It was fast, aggressive and hard-checking. Teams were about evenly matched and it was only because the South Enders were a shade more aggressive that they came

out on top.

Then, as you come to the last period of the Patrol meeting, you light the council fire and gather around it for a friendly palaver.

What's that?

Yes, I know that there is no fire place in your Patrol den and that you can't very well start a fire in the centre of the floor. That certainly shouldn't stop you!

I was referring to the kind of artificial camp fire which every Patrol ought to own as a part of its more important equipment.

You will have no difficulty in making one.

On your next hike collect a few, two or three inches thick, dead-wood sticks and cut them in various lengths with your axe. You will need eight pieces all told—two fifteen inches long, two twelve inch sticks, and two each ten and eight inches.

Place the two longest on the ground a foot apart, and nail onto them the two sticks next in length, forming a square. On this foundation build with the other pieces a regular log cabin

## Don "Count" Grosso Signed With Detroit Wings Friday

Speedy Blue Devil Left Winger Puts Name on Dotted Line to Play for Wings. No Terms Announced. Manager Jack Adams Said Has Been Negotiating for a Long Time.

Don "Count" Grosso, flashy left winger with the Lake Shore Blue Devils signed up with the Detroit Red Wings on Friday. Manager Jack Adams of the Wings, announced that the brilliant winger would play in the Detroit-Chicago game on Sunday.

No terms were announced by Adams but he said that he had been negotiating for some time to get Grosso under agreement.

"I saw him play in Toronto and he is a pretty good hockey player," Adams

said of Grosso. "I have been watching him for a couple of years and he certainly is developing along the right lines."

Adams said that he would sign Grosso for service on the Wings and not on Detroit's farm team, the Pittsburgh Hornets.

Grosso, the leading scorer in the Kirkland Lake group this year, has long been sought by professional teams. He has always spurned their offers before.
