## South Porcupine School Hockey Team Banqueted

Intermediate Team the Guests of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Montrose. Boys Have Great Time. Other Items of Interest from South Porcupine and the Dome.

South Porcupine, March 29.—(Special to The Advance)—The young Intermediate School Hockey team was feted on Tuesday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Montrose, of Rae Ave. Their young son, Wilburn, has been playing on the team as goalie during the season. This team has done remarkably well this winter under the coaching of Mr. Simpson, of the Public School staff—out of twenty-four games—including juniors who are playing part-time on the team—they have only lost two.

As has been remarked before Mr. Simpson is teaching these boys more than the rudiments of hockey. They are taught to play the game and to be courteous to their opponents. This teaching, combined with the kindly interest the coach shows in each player, has, we feel sure, been more than partly responsible for their victories. On Tuesday seventeen boys with Mr. Simpson sat down to a real banquet at Mrs. Montrose's home. She had been to much trouble to provide everything that young boys love. **Police Court**  
Three drunks appeared before Magistrate Atkinson and paid \$10 fines on Tuesday.

Seven local men were found guilty of gambling on the Lord's Day and all paid \$10 and costs.

For failing to carry a driver's permit a car driver paid \$5 and costs.

The case of theft adjudged from last week was once more preferred. This involved the taking of a mackinaw coat from a taxi-stand; the accused being charged with it selling it later for a small sum. The owner of the coat testified that no permission had been given this man to take the coat. Accused was given 30 days in jail.

No number plates, plus no driver's permit, was the reason for payment of \$10 and costs.

One case of assault was settled out of court after payment of costs.

The main case of the morning concerned charges of assault against Joseph Bussiere, and Alfred Leblanc, and

"assault, causing actually bodily harm" against Alex Potapchuk and Bert Robillard. Leblanc pleaded guilty. Bussiere, not guilty to the charges.

On March 20th while driving in a truck on the highway in Whitney, the complainant, W. Dupuis testified a truck cut across the road in front of them causing them to stop. Bussiere got out of the truck, and opened the door of the Dupuis truck, and grabbed him by the coat, with Leblanc on the running board who said he was going to "fix him." Dupuis jerked away and ran up the road with Leblanc after him.

Leblanc on the witness stand stated that when on the highway a truck was about 30 or 40 feet ahead of them. He blew his horn to pass, but the truck persisted in hogging the road and did so for about two miles. Finally he managed to pull ahead and when he did he cut across the road to prevent the other truck from proceeding, to find the reason the driver would not give him the road. It was 7 p.m. and he had four or five men on the truck with him taking them to a camp to work.

Lajeunesse, who was in the cab with Dupuis, stated that Robillard pulled him out of the cab, punched his jaw and face, and "pretty well marked him up."

He later reported to Provincial Officer Gail who testified to the scratches and bruises on the man.

Popovitch, who was riding in front of the second truck, stated that the truck wanted to pass as the men were late, and he heard statements that they were going to find out what the matter was they were not given the road. He saw no fight, but did see Robillard holding Lajeunesse by the coat.

Foster, witnessing for Robillard, said he saw nothing. Recalled to the stand he still saw nothing.

"You didn't have much fun at this fight, did you?" said his worship, Jos. Bussiere was quite candid about the whole thing. "I wanted the road and wanted to find out why I could not have it. (There might have been a drunken driver). I opened the door, La Jeunesse made a pass at me, I hit him a good one." "Many good ones," said his worship.

"I told him to get out of the cab." "Why were you ordering him?" said the magistrate. "You had already made the driver afraid and made him run, I don't wonder, either."

Robillard said he jumped out of his truck the driver of the other truck ran away, he "never touch nobody," he did not hold complainant nor hit him.

Crown Prosecutor Caldwell, in reviewing the case did not feel justified in pressing for a maximum sentence. The men should not have done what they did, they were committing an offence against the law, but he hinted that the complainants were also violating the Highway Traffic Act. Therefore Magistrate Atkinson dismissed Robillard and fined both Robillard and Bussiere \$50 and costs or 30 days, and A. Leblanc who was "hogging on the outskirts but did not hitting"—\$10 and costs or 30 days.
