Mrs. F. J. Baine, who has been recuperating at the home of her parents in Cocksville, has returned home.

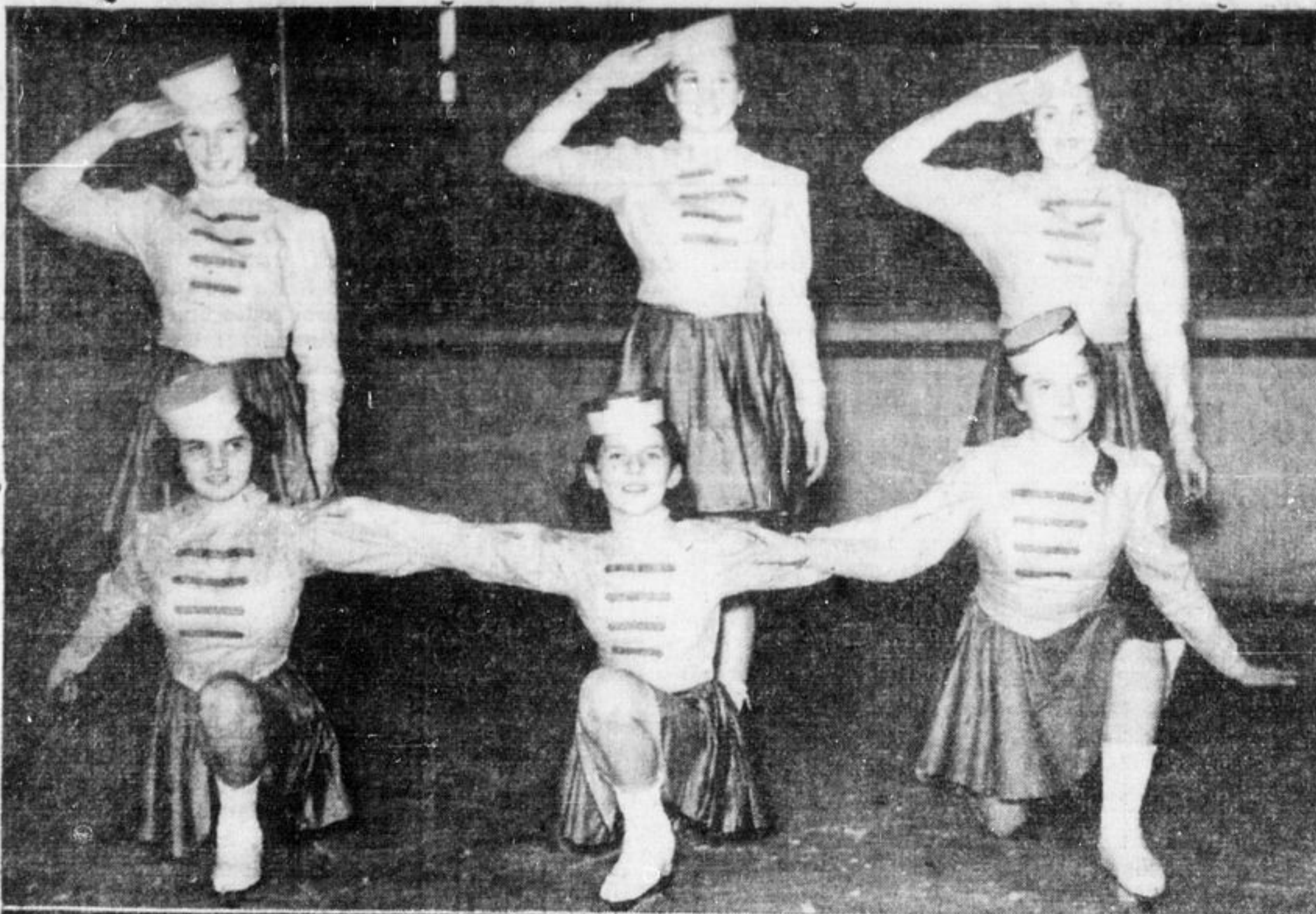

Respected Resident of South Porcupine Laid to Rest.

South Porcupine, March 29—(Special to The Advance)—The death of Mrs. Christina Spitz, wife of Mr. John Spitz, of Crawford St., which occurred on Sunday night last in the hospital, shocked and saddened all her friends. She had been ailing for some time but when pneumonia set in she was moved to hospital where, in spite of care, she passed away at 10:30 p.m. on Sunday. Our sincere sympathy is offered to her husband, and the three children, Celia, Buddy and Bobby who have lost a devoted wife and mother. The late Mrs. Spitz was a good friend and neighbour and did her duty in her little circle of friends as a good citizen. She will be missed from among them.

### Asks Canada's Help for Victims of War

immense territory, its teeming millions, and its fervent spirit, win this war. She felt that every civilized country, every Christian people must sympathize with China. How could Canada help? She suggested three ways: By providing money for food, shelter, medicine; by crippling Japan's finances by refusing to buy Japanese goods stained with the blood of innocent people; and by refusing to ship to Japan nickel, guns, munitions, and other materials to carry on the murderous war of aggression.

Following the address there was the usual discussion featured by the Men's Forum, Mr. Thos. E. Bailey and others taking part and making suggestions as to how Canada could show its attitude. Mayor Bartleman was called up and made a decided hit by referring to the fact that at a meeting of the town council that evening, a resolution had been passed asking the government to stop shipments to Japan from Canada of any materials that would aid in carrying on of their war of aggression.

Mr. Tester made an effective appeal for a generous collection, over \$100 being collected in a few minutes from the large audience.

Miss Loh Tsei was given great applause at the conclusion of her address. She left on Tuesday for Cochrane, where she spoke last night. During her visit to town she visited the Mines and

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other places of interest. She was given enthusiastic reception by the Chinese of the town and district, many of whom attended the address in the church, some of the leaders occupying places on the platform.
