Game Body Hopes to Stock 220,000 Fish

All services commence at 7.30 p.m.

Plan to Provide Watchmen and Fish Wardens.

In the past two years the Porcupine Fish and Game Protective Association has put about 12000 speckled trout in lakes, streams and rivers of the district between Porquis Junction and west as far as the Townships of Mountjoy, Godfrey, Shaw and Tisdale. That information was brought out late last week when the annual meeting of the Association was held in Schumacher.

If future plans of the Association mature, it will this year stock streams with 20,000 speckled trout, 160,000 pickerel and 100,000 lake trout.

The Association also has a plan whereby watchmen would be provided for lakes and streams. These watchmen or department wardens would watch streams and wound be allowed to supply fishermen with bait, meals and shelter.

Large scale maps are in the process of manufacture. On them will be shown locations of fishing spots, means of transportation.

Mr. J. R. Todd, newly elected president of the organization, said today that if the public was patient he felt sure that within the next two or three years waters of the Porcupine area would be well stocked with fish.

The Association has recommended to the Department of Game and Fisheries that Kraft Creek be kept closed for a further two years. It is the intention of the Association to replace the old beaver dam on the creek with a wooden structure in order to make a larger body of water for stocking.

This with one or two other small dams will take some financing. Although the Association has a surplus it will need more money and is asking members to remit their azmual \$1 fee.

K. Joseph's Store, at East Malartic Destroyed by Fire




