

# Camp Racquet Aces Win First Tourney at Kirkland

## Sweeps Board in Women's Section of Northern Tourney

Porcupine Racqueters Carry Off Top Honours in Women's Singles, Main and Consolation, Women's Doubles and Mixed Doubles. Mrs. Grady and Mrs. Sturgeon Outstanding. Men are Runners-up in Men's Singles, Doubles.

The Porcupine Badminton Club carried off top honours in Sudbury on Saturday in the first Northern Open Tourney. Winning the ladies' singles, the ladies' doubles and the mixed doubles, the Schumacher racqueters did woman work to sweep the board in the women's division. The Nickel Belters came back strong in the men's category to take most of the events.

Mrs. R. E. Sturgeon of Schumacher defeated Miss Young of Sudbury to win the Labeze Lumber Trophy in the ladies' singles event. In the women's doubles Mrs. J. Grady and Mrs. Sturgeon defeated Miss K. Young and Mrs. J. W. Kinty to win the Cochrane-Dunlop trophy. The Birks-Ellis-Ryrie Trophy, indicative of the Mixed Doubles title, went to Mrs. Grady and G. Shields.

In addition to placing on the top rung of two main events Mrs. Grady went on in the Consolation singles to defeat Miss N. Regan of Sudbury St. Joseph's.

A stiff battle decided the Men's Singles event. Bert Simms, Copper Cliff, came through to win 18-13, 15-12, to defeat Gordon Shields, of Schumacher, who was formerly a Davis Cup tennis spare for Canada.

Semi-finalist in the Men's Doubles was another Gold Belt team R. Sturgeon and Gordon Shields. The Sudbury pair, George von Zuban and Ovide Gauthier were forced to the utmost to defeat the Schumacher doubles team 15-8, 12-15, 15-12.

Following the tournament a Northern Ontario Badminton Association was formed. The Porcupine club bid for and won the right to hold the 1939-40 tourney at the club in Schumacher.

First officers of the new association are: R. Sturgeon, Schumacher, president; Bill Plewman, Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., vice-president, and Irving Keegan, Sudbury, secretary-treasurer. A representative is to be added to the executive from each district. John Richardson, veteran tennis and badminton enthusiast at North Bay, is the association's representative to the Canadian Badminton Association.
