### Lack of Militia in North is Deplored

Dr. Armstrong, of Haileybury, Speaker at Meeting of Kiwanis.

Haileybury, April 13.—(Special to The Advance)—Deploring the lack of militia units and the apparent apathy of the citizens towards their military, Dr. E. F. Armstrong, of Cobalt, on Monday night told fellow comrades of the Great War, gathered for the annual Vimy banquet here that if war came now Canada would not be in one third as good a position as she was 25 years ago to take her part in Empire defence. The Cobalt dentist, who was colonel commanding the 159th battalion when that Northern Ontario unit went overseas in 1916, made a plea for some definite proposals for defence and something of the same spirit which he said actuated the men of the Dominion in 1914, "if we are going to hold high the torch which our fallen comrades have handed to us." Dr. Armstrong proposed the toast to "Our Fallen Comrades," which was responded to in silence, after which Bugler W. H. P. Lewis sounded "Last Post" and "Reveille."

### Production at Moneta for the Month of March

Production of Moneta Porcupine Gold Mines for the first quarter of this year is officially announced at \$264,019 from 15,585 tons for average recovery of \$16.94 per ton, compared with \$270,184 from 14,238 tons for average of \$18.97 per ton in the last quarter of 1938 and \$257,211 from 13,794 tons for average of \$18.65 per ton in the first quarter of 1938.

Since mill was started on Jan. 1, 1938, total recovery to the end of March has been \$1,280,172.
