

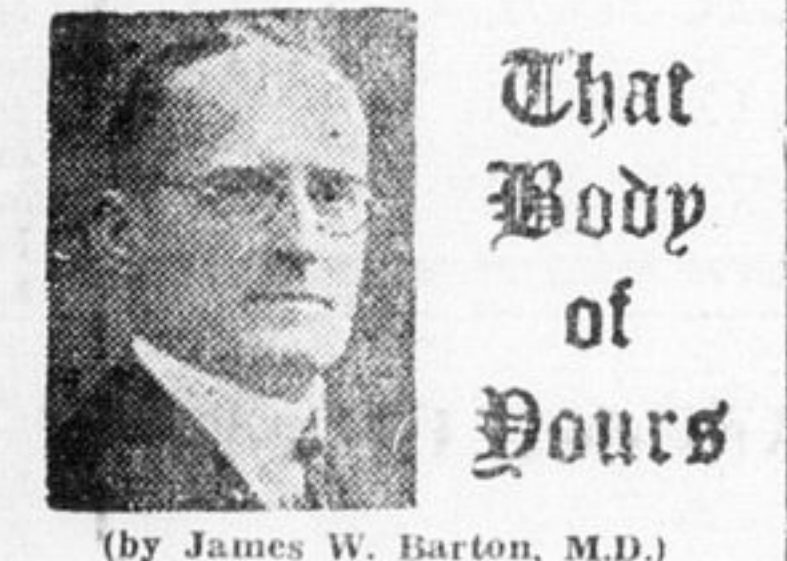

**That Body of Ours**

**The Intense Search for Cause and Cure of Cancer**  
 For those who have loved ones suffering with, or who have died of, cancer, it brings no comfort to know that while the cause of cancer is unknown, it can be cured in its earlier stages by the use of radium, x-rays, and surgery. What they cannot understand is why the cause of a disease that has afflicted man from the beginning of history has not been discovered in these days when other fatal diseases are now being conquered. They cannot be blamed then if they wonder whether or not serious work is being done with the hundreds of thousands of dollars annually spent on seeking the cause of cancer.  
 It will thus be a matter of satisfaction to read of the work being done by just one cancer research organization—The British Cancer Campaign. Lord Horder reports that last year's work showed that schemes of research were being conducted over a wide area. Attention was drawn to the work of Dr. Alexander Haddow at the Royal Cancer Hospital from which it appeared that the application of tiny doses of certain cancer-producing chemicals would cause a definite decrease and sometimes complete disappearance of

tumors present in animals. This giving of small doses of a chemical which in large doses caused increase in growth and symptoms, and in small doses caused a decrease in growth and symptoms is not uncommon in medicine.

In the northern part of England Prof. W. E. Curtis and Dr. Frank Dickens also found the above facts to be true. These two research workers were also seeking to learn the effects of ultra short wireless waves. They have shown that the curative effects of these waves in the experimental treatment of cancer was brought about by the heat they manufactured within the tissues. This heating was of a special character as it could be controlled—the temperature could be raised to any desired level and kept there as long as desired. By this method a high degree of success has been secured in the treatment of animal tumors.  
 "Every line of research that gave promise of helping the present forms of treatment—x-ray, radium, and surgery—received full and careful consideration by the campaign."

When we remember that in the United States, Canada and Europe, in fact throughout the world, these careful and thorough investigations are going on we must admit that the search for the cause of cancer and the cure is being vigorously pushed.

**Taking Important Positions at Toronto and Ottawa.**

Four popular and competent members of the Timmins High and Vocational School staff will leave the school at the end of the present term, to take new positions at Toronto and Ottawa. They are Mr. J. E. Grabb, Mr. J. W. Fawcett, Mr. J. M. Robbie, and Mr. C. G. Chapman.  
 Mr. J. E. Grabb has been in charge of the physical culture department of the boys' training at the school since September, 1935, and has given the students an opportunity for much better work-out in this field.  
 Mr. J. M. Robbie, who joined the staff of the school in September 1937, is a teacher of English, and has conducted the dramatic efforts of the pupils in the past two years, while Mr. C. G. Chapman is teacher of music. He has been at the school since September, 1937, and during that time has made the High and Vocational School orchestra into a feature of the school which is well-worthy of mention, and a source of pride to both the students and the staff of the school.

**Yugoslavia At Present In Awkward Situation**

(The Spectator (London))  
 The fourth party to the Balkan Entente, Yugoslavia, is equally threatened by Italy's action. A captive in the Adriatic, she is exposed to attack on the north and the south though, like Greece, she has received emphatic assurances that Italy's intentions are wholly pacific. It is even believed that Italy wishes to maintain her intact as a buffer against Germany. Yugoslavia's exposed position, however, has prevented her from taking any diplomatic initiative; her own precautions have been confined to mobilizing two annual classes of reserves, manning her frontiers, and attempting to ensure that she can face the crisis without danger of internal disunity. The meeting on Monday between the Croat deputy leader, Dr. Kosutich, son-in-law of the murdered Stepan Raditch, and leaders of the Serb opposition, continued the negotiations which took place before Easter between the Croat leader, Dr. Matceh, and the Yugoslav Prime Minister M. Teskovich. They have been so far successful that it is now hoped that a solution of the Croat question will be found in the near future. The grant of home rule to the Croats would deprive the Axis Powers of a valuable instrument for disrupting the Yugoslav state. But Yugoslavia is in so difficult a position, with one Axis Power on her northern frontier and another on her southern, that she can hardly be expected to do more than play for neutrality.

**Drayton Urges Agreement in Case of Abitibi Company**

**Says It Is Time That Receivership Was Dropped.**

(The National Review, London)  
 France is settling down to work. Capital is returning, factories are opening and the excellent hardworking French are facing their problems with all their usual courage. They are big problems. Incompetent Ministers have let down the French Air Force, slack local governments have allowed Paris to be surrounded by factories filled with foreign workmen, three hundred thousand Spanish refugees remain in the neighborhood of the Pyrenees and can only be re-absorbed slowly into their own country. So much has happened in the last few years that it has been forgotten that one of the acts of the Spanish Republican Government which led to the war was that the prisons were opened and all the criminals released. These are now on French soil,

and the difficulty of keeping order in the districts invaded by them is greatly increased by their presence. "You understand," said a Frenchman the other day, "all the good ones will go back to Spain, and we shall be left with the others." France has now received the criminals of three countries—Italy, Germany and Spain. It is too much. We can understand the eagerness with which dictators throw their undesirables out of their countries, along with those who merely disagree with them, but it is hard on France that three revolutions on her borders should have given her, besides the political refugees, the crooks from Italy, Germany, and now Spain.

Montreal, May 3.—Sir Henry Drayton, chairman of the Abitibi Power and Paper Bondholders' Defensive Committee, said in a statement on the present situation in the company's affairs: "It is to be hoped that the different shareholders and creditors will come to a reasonable agreement which the bondholders can accept."  
 Sir Henry said he had to consider the problem of the huge company, which has been in receivership for several years, from the standpoint of the small bondholders and not from the standpoint of a large corporation whose Abitibi entry is only one of hundreds of items.

The fact is that to the extent that voting rights are not specifically asked, the voting rights may be exercised by an unknown person or company to be known as the escrow agent, who alone may have the right to vote all shares not voted by the real owners. It is well known that only a moderate percentage of shareholders normally attend meetings; the practical effect will be that this unknown escrow agent will have virtual control of the company for three years.  
 "Small bondholders are not in any way interested in who gets control of the company—what they want is their principal, interest and arrears of interest. They need to get it in a definite form which will enable them easily to sell at least part of their holdings as their condition from time to time requires. They need also the interest—they need also to retain their rights as mortgagees."  
 "The small bondholders—at least up to the present—are invited to take a jump in the dark; on the other hand it is obvious that it is time Abitibi was taken out of receivership."
