

Sportsmen Endorse Moral Re-armament

Twenty-two Prominent Athletes Add Their Weight to "Bunny" Austin.

Toronto, May 2.—Calling for national teamwork in all sections of Canadian life and giving a lead by combining in a statement embracing practically every branch of athletics, twenty-two outstanding Canadian sportsmen have put their weight behind H. W. "Bunny" Austin and the campaign of moral rearmament in which the Davis Cup star has been giving such vigorous leadership.

"Twenty-five years ago the cream of Canadian sportsmen gave all they had in the service of their country. Courage, endurance, and self-discipline were called out of a cause which demanded every sacrifice.

"Is there a cause to-day great enough to demand these same qualities—a cause which self-interest and sectional pride can be lost? We believe there is, and we feel impelled to join with such outstanding British sportsmen as "Bunny" Austin, George Syston, Jack Beresford, Len Harvey, and H. W. Abrahams, in supporting the world-wide programme of Moral Re-Armament.

"Pride, selfishness and greed, the enemies of peace, are the active enemies of sport. The principles of Moral Re-Armament—honesty, unselfishness, and clean living—are the principles of every sport worthy of the name. We believe that Canadian sportsmen can give a lead by accepting first for themselves and then for Canada these principles of Moral Re-Armament.

"Sport has long been accepted as a random force, mighty in its power to capture the imagination and emotions of millions, but largely unrelated to the issue of a world struggling daily for its security. This force properly directed can change the thinking of our people. By starting with themselves and then through discipline and teamwork, to which they are accustomed, the followers of every line of sport can forge a mighty weapon to cut through the prejudice, suspicion and fear in the life of our country.

"To provide this spirit of Moral Re-Armament for Canada is the greatest sporting opportunity of our time."

Noranda May Play in Proposed Quebec Ball Loop

League in Northwestern Quebec is Now Being Planned.

If present plans materialize, Noranda Senators will be doing their baseball chores in the proposed Northwestern Quebec Senior Baseball League, which will be directly affiliated with the Temiskaming Baseball League.

A. J. "Fawney" Oumet, president of the Twin Cities club in Noranda, announced last week that he is making plans for the organization of the new provincial loop. If it plays a schedule this year, the winner will be matched against the T.B.L. southern group champion before the league finals are entered.

The proposed league would include teams from Noranda, Beattie, the Malarts, and possibly Val d'Or, and Lemagne, which would suggest a line-up of at least five squads. All clubs and districts have been asked for their various opinions on the league and returns have been encouraging.

Receive Local Approval. Locally, team managers here would like to see a league formed on the Quebec side of the border as it would eliminate the lengthy journey to Noranda for home games with the Copper Kings. If the circuit is successful it will leave Lake Shore, Wright-Hargreaves and Toburn in the Southern section of the T.B.L. with a similar number of teams in the Northern section in the Porcupine.

Plans are still in the formulative stage in Noranda but Mr. Oumet feels sure that the various centres will come to bat with good teams when "play ball" is sounded. A meeting will likely be called soon and definite word on the league will be known.

Providing the other teams find it impossible to enter into such an arrangement this year, Noranda will enter the Southern Group along with the three local teams, to make it a four cornered race for this section's championship.

Britain Offers Rumania \$23,000,000 Arms Credit

Chenier's highest runs were 38 and 22, and Marson's highest was 18 points. The exhibition of trick shots was one of the first seen in Timmins. Mr. Chenier will play again tonight. His opponent in to-night's snooker or billiard games has not yet been chosen.

Junior Marksmen Will Hold Final Round Soon

Montreal, May 3.—Finalists in the 16th annual championship match of Dominion Marksmen's junior Small League were announced here this week, winding up a long siege of elimination shoots.

Highest score of the opening shoot was fired by New Brunswick's champion Saint John Vocational School which turned in an aggregate of 1,491 points out of a possible 1,500. They were only six points ahead of Brockville Collegiate Institute and Vocational School, which led a field of 81 teams competing for Ontario's berth in the nine-team final shoot.

Of the 169 teams competing in his sporting rifle event, the highest scoring team for each province won a berth in a final round to be held this month.
