Salt.

Soak gelatin in cold water five minutes; then dissolve in hot coffee. Add sugar, a dash of salt and stir until dissolved. Pour mixture into a mold and chill in refrigerator until set. When ready to serve, unmold onto platter and serve with plain or whipped cream.
