Commission and see what could be done. This met with general approval and Mr. Devaney was appointed a delegate to go into the question fully with Sir Adam Beck. A resolution was also passed asking the council to investigate fully the causes of the break in the light and power services.

Referring to the break in the light and power services which Timmins "enjoyed" or otherwise, twenty years ago The Advance said: "An accident last night to one of the transformers caused the lights in Timmins and Schumacher to go out at 8.30 and there was no more light or power until after 5.30 p.m. today (Wednesday). As a consequence this issue of The Advance is delayed. Candles and lamps had to be requisitioned last night in the stores, hotels, etc. The theatre had to close soon after the show opened, and last night and today the inconvenience and loss through the accident have been very noticeable, emphasizing the modern dependence upon electric power and light for industry, business and general use. The power company's staff was hard at work from the time of the accident to repair the injury. A couple of transformers were borrowed from the Pienaurum Mine and installed today so that the service could be resumed. It is only fair to add that there have been mighty few serious interruptions in the past twenty years with the power service. The times when the power has been off may be set down as few and far between.

One of the leading articles in The Advance twenty years ago was a front page editorial suggesting the possibilities of airships as a means of rapid communication between the different parts of this North and Old Ontario. At first the airship could be utilized with advantage in this country of long distances. Mail and passenger service could be maintained at first and later the scheme enlarged to take in other branches of transportation. The Advance pointed out. It was suggested that if either of the governments, Dominion or Provincial, had the courage to pioneer in the work of airships for transportation purposes in this North Land, the result would be generally advantageous.

The Loyal Orange Young Britons instituted their lodge in Timmins just twenty years ago. Sudbury Harness Meet on Day of Royal Visit

Sudbury, May 12.—Announcement of a four-event harness race meet for Monday, June 5, royal visit day in Sudbury, was made Tuesday by the Nickel City Driving Club. Purses totalling \$1,600 are being offered, according to plans made by Henri Elie and George Gaene, president and secretary of the club. At least 20 horses are expected to enter the races on the track east of the city. Races are the 2:28, 2:22, 2:17 and free-for-all.

Particulars have been sent to Toronto and other southern racing centres. Since the local meet precedes the stake season in Southern Ontario, it is expected a good entry will be received from there.

Northern horses are expected from Little Current, Chelmsford, Rouyn, Que., New Liskeard, Kirkland Lake and Timmins.

The race meeting will see the start of discussion on a new circuit for Northern Ontario horsemen from the Gold Belt have been trying for some time to make an agreement on reciprocal meets with owners in this section. There will be a meeting to discuss formation of such a circuit.

Henri Elie's Peter Bidwell is a denite starter for the June 5 meet. Cliff Bradley, of Little Current, is another interested owner. Jim Brown of New Liskeard, is reported ready with six horses.

Reference was made in The Advance twenty years ago to a record made shortly before by D. D. Chisholm's diamond drilling outfit, when 300 feet of open ground was drilled through in less than 6 days at the Penn-Porcupine property.

The Advance of May 7th, 1919, noted several changes in the T. & N. O. timetable as it affected Timmins for the summer schedule, chief among the changes being the fact that No. 47 arrived here at 5.40, and that the morning train left here 10 minutes later than previously, the new time being 6.35.

There was only a small attendance at the meeting of the Timmins board of trade held on May 6th, 1919. In commenting on the meeting The Advance that week said: "On account of the lights being off through the accident to the transformer, the meeting was held in darkness until the undertaker kindly brought up a single candle. The light, or rather the lack of light gave special point to the question introduced by Mr. T. F. King who thought something should be done to relieve the burden of electric light rates in town which totalled about two-thirds the amount paid out in taxes. He pointed out that lights in places like Toronto cost 5 cents per kilowatt hour, while here 12 cents was the rate, with a 9 cent rate if paid before the 10th of the month. He mentioned the extra rate here was altogether too much while the service was not what it ought to be. Some relief was necessary, he thought, and he asked the town council to take the matter up with the Hydro-Electric

league, and H. W. Hooker, Timmins, the Secretary. Home and home games were arranged.

"Word reached town Wednesday morning of this week," said the Advance twenty years ago, "that the body of Clarence McDowell, of South Porcupine, had been recovered from the Montreal River this morning. He was drowned in the river above Elk Lake on Thursday of last week. He was about 35 years of age, a prospector, and well-known and liked in the Porcupine camp. The remains will be brought to South Porcupine for interment."

A heading in The Advance of May 7th, 1919, showed that sports had their difficulties twenty years ago just as they do today. The heading said: "Football Postponed to the First Fine Day." In 1919 the match opening the season, which had been scheduled for May 3rd, had to be postponed on account of the unfavorable weather. That does not sound like "twenty years ago," but so it was. The line-up for the Timmins team was given as follows: Trimble, goal; Staples and Hoole, backs; Mullen, Sheridan, Hodge, half-backs; Garons, Twaddle, Roberts, Stevens and Collins, forwards. J. White, referee.

In the District Football (the N.O.F.A.) there were six teams in the league. These were: Timmins, the G.W.V.A., Iroquois Falls, the Dome, Cochrane and McIntyre. The first game was scheduled for May 24th.

May 20th has been arranged as follows: There are to be four beacon fires as follows: (1) Whelpdale Rocks—3rd and 4th Troops; (2) Rocks at end of Birch St.—1st and 8th Troops; (3) West Side of Golf Course—5th and 7th Troops; (4) Mackay Claims—2nd and 6th Troops.

"The wood for the fires has been donated by the Hollinger and will be delivered when and where desired. Inform E. Wheeler on this point."

"The fires should be lighted about 8.30 so as to reach their peak at approximately 9 o'clock. (Before leaving fires, Scouters should arrange for extinguishing them.)

"After beacon fires, a torch-light parade is planned. (Have each boy make two coal oil torches; one for parade from outskirts of town to meeting point, and one for joint parade.)

"At 9.30 all sections will meet at Ball Park and form up for torch-light parade through town to Hollinger Park (cyanide). Here a royal salute will be fired and troops dismissed.

"Points to be remembered:

- (1) Each beacon is in charge of Scouters and troops as stated. DON'T LET YOURS FALL DOWN.
- (2) Beacon must be extinguished.
- (3) Time your incoming parade to meet at Ball Park as near 9.30 as possible.
- (4) Have each boy make two torches. (Rags bound well with wire on end of stick about 4 feet long and soaked in coal oil are very suitable).
- (5) Day's programme under direction of Scouters. (Suggest hike with cooking, tracking, observation, etc.)
