## S. Porcupine Honours Occasion of Canadian Tour of King and Queen

Town Gay with Flags, Bunting, Lights and Other Decorations. Monday Proclaimed Civic Holiday. Ceremony at High School on Monday. Other News of South Porcupine and the Dome.

South Porcupine, May 17.—(Special to The Advance)—Every housewife this morning who possessed a radio in South Porcupine left her work to listen to the arrival of the Royal Pair on Canadian soil, and we would like to wager that all felt as we did—and all were stirred with the same loyalty and pride that brought the emotional tears close to the surface.

God Save the King!

South Porcupine, although not included in the royal itinerary is showing its patriotism by hoisting flags and displaying bunting.

Portraits of the Royal Family are to be seen in every store window.

The Mascioli Theatre is gaily bedecked with strings of flags from roof to street outside, gay, cheerful, and patriotic.

Strings of bunting from the town hall across to the fire hall strive with the coloured lights with which Tisdale beautifies itself every summer and Christmaside, to show the township's loyalty. Flags are flying from flagpoles on all the important buildings, and from some of the less important ones.

And Monday is proclaimed a Civic Holiday.

There is to be no programme for this day sponsored by the town, but invitation is given to all (and it is hoped that all will attend) to be present on Monday morning at 9 o'clock at the High School where a ceremony and service is to be observed. All the clergy and ministers of town have been invited to be present and take part in this patriotic demonstration.

Our Girl Guides and Boy Scouts in uniform will participate in the ceremony of flag raising.

The Students' Council of the School have set aside a sum out of their funds to purchase shrubs and spruce trees for the beautifying and improving of the school grounds. Some of these will be planted at the ceremony and will remain and grow as souvenirs for all time of the King's visit—a nice idea, and a splendid gesture as coming from the students themselves.

Should a very large crowd attend, and the day be fine all the service will be held on the school grounds. Otherwise the auditorium will be used.

Special invitation to all to take part in this—the only Tisdale official tribute to the special occasion—is earnestly given by the authorities.

A similar ceremony and service will be held at 10 a.m. at the Schumacher High School.



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
